Important Point

You will learn as you begin to follow Jesus that He is going to ask you to deepen your understanding of all kinds of things: God, yourself, & evil.

"The Satan" = "the adversary" (1 Pet. 5:8-9)

- Satan is the leader of fallen angels (Rev. 12:9)
- Satan's tactics involve lies & deception (John 8:44)
- Satan masquerades as an angel of light. (2 Cor. 11:14
- Satan hates humanity b/c he hates God, and humans bear the image of God (Gen. 2-3)
- Satan leads the whole world astray (Rev. 12:9)







It is not surprising that Satan would go after Peter. After all, he was the leading disciple the first among equals. Peter was the first disciple that Jesus called, the first to confess him as the Christ, and the first to get out of the boat and walk on water.



If Satan could destroy Peter, he could destroy them all.... The devil wanted more than Judas and more, even, than Peter; he wanted all the disciples....

Important Question

Why does Luke record this question in his historical biography of Jesus?

This is a cautionary tale about the dangers of spiritual pride and arrogance, but Peter's story of failure is not the end of his story. Rather Peter's story is taken up into the story of Jesus.







The burden of this anchor verse is Jesus Christ's sheer solidarity with his people. All our natural intuitions tell us that Jesus is with us, on our side, present and helping, when life is going well.



This text says the opposite. It is in "our weakness" that Jesus sympathizes with us.... "Sympathize" here is not cool and detached pity. It is a depth of solidarity....



In our pain, Jesus is pained; in our suffering, he feels the suffering as his own.... his heart is feelingly drawn to our distress....



Our pain never outstrips what he himself shares in. We are never alone. That sorrow that feels so isolating, so unique, was endured by him in the past and is now shouldered by him in the present.






Consequently, he is able to save to the uttermost those who draw near to God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.








"To the uttermost" in Hebrews 7:25 means: God's forgiving, redeeming, and restoring touch reaches down into the darkest crevices of our souls, those places where we are most ashamed, most defeated.




More than this: those crevices of sin are themselves the places where Christ loves us the most. His heart willingly goes there. His heart is most strongly drawn there.



He knows us to the uttermost, and he saves us to the uttermost, because his heart is drawn out to us to the uttermost. We cannot sin our way out of his tender care.... Christ's heavenly intercession is the reason we know he will save us to the uttermost.

Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised —who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us.





If I could hear Christ praying for me in the next room, I would not fear a million of enemies. Yet the distance makes no difference; He is praying for me.




Let's rejoice that Jesus wants to use people who have failed like us — precisely because we are NOT defined by our failures.






He said to him a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Tend my sheep."




