Hematidrosis: Is Sweating Blood Real?

What is hematidrosis?

Hematidrosis is an extremely rare condition in which you sweat blood. It's also known as hematohidrosis and hemidrosis. It's so rare that many people don't know it exists or if it's real. But sweating blood has been seen throughout history. The Bible mentions Jesus sweating blood while praying before the crucifixion. Leonardo Da Vinci wrote about soldiers sweating blood before battle.

While these may or may not have been real depictions, hematidrosis is a real condition. Blood sweat can occur on any surface of the body. The face and forehead are common locations.

Learn more about why sweating blood happens and how doctors treat it.

Hematidrosis is an extremely rare condition in which you sweat blood.... In rare instances, the flight-or-fight response can trigger the rupture of capillaries in the body. Capillaries are tiny blood vessels located throughout tissue [and] are also located around the sweat glands. In cases of severe fear or stress, these tiny blood vessels can burst and cause blood to exit the body through the sweat glands.

Important Question

So why is the Apostle Paul telling us about the humble, self-sacrificial love of Jesus?

Just as Christ humbled Himself in self-giving, life-giving love for others, so we too are called to humble ourselves in self-giving, life-giving love for others.





I love this prayer, also, because of the indistinctness of it. It is "Father, forgive them." He does not say, "Father, forgive the soldiers who have nailed me here." He includes them.



Neither does he say, "Father, forgive the people who are beholding me." He means them. Neither does he say, "Father, forgive sinners in ages to come who will sin against me." But he means them.



Jesus does not mention them by any accusing name: "Father, forgive my enemies. Father, forgive my murderers." No, there is no word of accusation upon those dear lips.



"Father, forgive them." Now into that pronoun "them" I feel that I can crawl. Can you get in there? Oh, by a humble faith, appropriate the cross of Christ by trusting in it; and get into that big little word "them"!
