FROM THE PREACHER'S PEN

In a 2018 article in the Guardian, the question is asked can we choose our own identity? The article states "Isn't it up to her? What could be more personal than the question of who she is — what she is? Isn't your identity, as people often say, "your truth"? The question is straightforward; the answer is anything but. And that's because a seismic fault line runs through contemporary talk of identity, regularly issuing tremors and quakes. Your identity is meant to be the truth of who you are."

Who are we? Who determines what I am, who I am, what my purpose in life is? If one seeks these answers apart from a Biblical perspective on life, one will only and always end at arbitrary, subjective, and confusing conclusions. That is, if my identity is determined not by a source outside of myself, but it rests completely on how I feel, then everyone is free to decide if they are male or female, cat or dog, even whether they are 30 or if they are 3.

Thankfully the source of our identity is also the source of sanity in the midst of ever increasing confusion. God is the one who determines not only my objective identity, but my purpose, and my value. Jesus speaking of His followers says you are the salt of the earth...you are the light of the world.

As the salt of the earth, the church collectively preserves God's objective moral standards. Jesus places on us the responsibility to preserve morality in the midst of unspeakable moral decay eroding the culture. The culture's standards change as rapidly as do the opinions of the people that make up the culture. This is seen most clearly in politics. Those running for office, if they desire to be elected, must say what the culture wants to hear. Donald Trump just came out and was clearly wavering on the issue of abortion. Why? As abortion becomes a normalized practice in our culture, politicians must adapt, or face the likely chances they will not be elected to public office. Yet Jesus is King, He is not running for office and He certainly does not need man to bestow any authority upon Him. As such, His standards by which the church is tasked with presenting to the world never changes in an ever changing world.

Jesus also calls His followers to be cities upon a hill. Imagine you are a traveler in the first century, wandering thru the endless expanses of wilderness returning home. HUMILITY

It's a defining characteristic of any Christian. You know someone is humble by how they live. It is easy to look at someone and recognize if they are humble or not. But how humble are you? If you just answered in your head that you are pretty humble, or maybe even really humble, chances are you are not humble. You see, a wise Sunday school teacher once taught me, "The second you think you are humble, you aren't anymore."

To be honest, Church I think we all need a lesson in humility. Our American culture today is always demanding that we look out for ourselves. We are entitled. We are deserving. We owe no one anything. When everyone deserves and is entitled to everything, chaos ensues. The attitude that Jesus advocates for is lost. Sadly, this lack of humility creeps its way into the Church as well. In some ways, it is not so much creeping as it is marching right in and parading itself around to great applause! Instead of thinking about new folks coming into the Church, too often we plant ourselves on an opinion that we will not budge on. This results in many lost opportunities to share the Gospel with others. What if us sacrificing our preference for something means salvation for someone else? Isn't that change worth it? Isn't in that instance laying down our pride worth it?

By the way, this is serious stuff. In James 4:6 the Bible tells us clearly, "God opposes the proud, but gives grace to the humble." I don't know about you, but I don't think as Christians we want God to be opposing us... Any relationship with Jesus starts with humility. When you come to Christ you must ADMIT that you are the one that is messed up. You are the one caught in your sin. Jesus brings us out of that horrible place. However, once we are saved, in order to continue a life for Jesus, the attitude of humility has to continue. Church, once we think we got this life figured out on our own, we will fall.

Let us not forget Proverbs 16:18: "Pride goes before destruction, a haughty spirit before a fall." I think one of the best examples of a person being put in their place and being reminded of who God is and his greatness is in the book of Job. Don't get me wrong here, Job was a righteous man, he loved God. He obeyed God. But for so many chapters in the book of Job we either hear Job constantly contemplating why these terrible things have happened to him, or we hear his friends give their meager attempts at explaining to Job their opinion on why these things are happening to him. Most of it doesn't get Job anywhere until God Himself finally speaks in the final chapters. Job 38:1-4 says this:

Then the LORD spoke to Job out of the storm. He said: "Who is this that obscures my plans with words without knowledge?

Brace yourself like a man; I will question you, and you shall answer me. "Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me, if you understand.

You can imagine the Lord's BOOMING voice ripping through the sky, Job's face in total shock and awe. "Oh yeah, God knows more than I do." That is the simple reality of it, what we must be willing to accept. You and I don't know everything, as much as we would like to think we do! Peter would tell us in 1 Peter that we need to "clothe ourselves in humility". In what areas do I need to be more humble? In what areas do you need to be more humble? Let us look to God's Word, compare ourselves with Jesus, and it will become pretty clear where we need to change.
