Rule of Prayer: A way of ordering our lives around a daily pattern of prayer and reading of Scripture.

We should strive for a prayer life in which we "pray without ceasing."

The Lord's Prayer

Key is that Jesus taught this prayer to his disciples – Matthew 6:5-8 and Luke 11:1,5-13

Pray then like this:

"Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name.

1º Your kingdom come,
your will be done,

on earth as it is in heaven.

1º Give us this day our daily bread,

1º and forgive us our debts,
as we also have forgiven our debtors.

1³ And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil.

Matthew 6:5-8
