Why do you work?

Is it to make money to support yourself? Is it so you can provide a home and food for your family? Is it because you want some meaningful way to spend your time? Is it to follow the pattern others have given you? Is it so you can make money to contribute to the church? All of those have value. But each is not enough to work with compelling purpose and resulting joy. I'm guessing you sense that.

What if your work was genuinely godly? I don't mean simply that you do your work with honesty and integrity. You should be doing those things. But what if "genuinely godly" means your work reflects the character of God. As our God is a creating being, so are you. Not in precisely the same way God is—he spoke, and all things came into being. You create within in creation. Or perhaps more accurately, you unfold that creation. You discover the way God has designed his world to work. You discern the best way to respond. And as you do you bring glory to the original Creator. You delight in his work of creation as it reflects his character.

To be godly in your work means to do this intentionally and carefully.

But further, it also means to see God at work in you as you work. The redemptive power of Jesus affects all that you are: your heart, your mind, your will, your emotions . . . and your work. That change our Savior is working in you will inevitably affect the way you engage your vocation. You become more disciplined, more creative, more dedicated, and more importantly, less reliant on your work to give you meaning.

Anabaptist theologian, John Howard Yoder, once explained to a Calvinist theologian, Richard Mouw, the difference between anabaptists and Calvinists in the way they look at the world. The Anabaptist, Yoder said, looks at the world first as fallen. Sin has radically corrupted the world, Jesus came to save us out of it, and one day we look forward to the time when this world will be no longer. Calvinists, on the other hand, look at the world first as created by God (affirming the goodness of creation), with the eventual hope that when Jesus returns, he will set all of creation free from the corruption of sin.

That is our hope. That is why we work.


Thursday Morning Men's Bible Study

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month.

Domestic violence, intimate partner violence, and domestic abuse (all synonyms) are not terms found in the Bible. In fact, "abuse" or "abused" is only used four times in the ESV translation. Domestic abuse is a pattern of behavior in a relationship used to gain power and control over another person. In doing so, it destroys the personhood of an image bearer of God. There is a word used in the Bible which speaks to this misuse of power and authority.



Oppression.

Oppression and its other word forms are used 99 times in the ESV. In the Bible oppression is spoken (Psalm 10:7; Isaiah 59:13), threatened (Psalm 73:8), written (Isaiah 10:1), heaped (Jeremiah 9:6), practiced (Jeremiah 22:17), and wrongly trusted and relied upon (Isaiah 30:2). Oppression's purpose is to control, dominate, and subjugate another human being, group, or nation. It is wrong in the Lord's eyes and He has repeatedly commanded His people to help the oppressed.

Redeemer's organized response to this call is the Domestic Abuse Care Team (DACT). The DACT exists to give hope and healing in the name of Jesus to those affected by domestic abuse. We are committed to encouraging awareness within our congregation of the destructive and secretive nature of domestic violence, compassionately walk with women who are in destructive relationships, and equip more women to do the same.

This team meets monthly considering ways to educate our congregation through book studies, speakers, events, and other local ministries while also working with church leadership to grow in our understanding of how to best care for individuals and families affected by oppressive relationships.

The DACT currently consists of Mary Bont, Jane Heemstra, Mary Kamps, Tracy Langerak, and Kendra Overbeek. Though currently an all-female team, our desire is to grow this ministry using the gifts and compassionate hearts of our brothers in Christ as we both seek to reflect His heart for the oppressed and oppressor alike.

This October, as part of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the DACT will be sharing statistics of the prevalence of domestic violence on the fellowship hall television screens, displaying resources near the library for those interested in learning more, as well as providing pamphlets in church mailboxes and at the welcome table debunking common lies women in oppressive relationships are told or hold true for themselves.

If you suspect you or a loved one, a co-worker, or a friend is in an oppressive relationship, any member of this team would be humbled to confidentially hear your story and walk alongside in support as we try to reflect our Savior's love for the hurting. WHEN PRAYER IS HARD

"Father, please send your angels to protect my mom." I spoke this prayer on night ten of my mom's fierce battle with Covid. Five hours later, she was dead. Have you ever received a resounding "no" to heartfelt prayers? Have you prayed prayers for days, months, and years and seen no evidence of change at all? Prayers for the return of a wayward child, prayers for freedom from deeply rooted sin patterns, prayers for relief from chronic pain? Perhaps with David, you have cried day and night but heard no answer and found no rest (See Psalm 22:2). In such seasons, bitterness or cynicism threatens to mute our tongues. How do we pray when prayer is hard?

Three Crucial Practices

Three crucial practices help us to pray when prayer is hard: learning the language of lament, which deepens faith; leaning into community, which grows hope; and listening for God's declaration of his unfailing love, which expands love for God and for others.

Learning the Language of Lament

When prayer is hard, learning the language of lament can help us to emerge with a stronger faith. As Pastor Mark Vroegop explains, "Lament is a prayer in pain that leads to trust."[i] Lament not only expresses our faith in the goodness of God, it also strengthens our faith in its expression.

Prayers of lament often process through four categories: turning to God, naming the grief, asking persistently and boldly for help, and expressing restored confidence. Lamentations, Jeremiah's lament over the fall of Jerusalem, illustrates each of these categories.

Rather than turning away from God when relief from suffering doesn't come, lamenters turn toward God. Jeremiah addresses his complaints to God in raw words few of us would dare to utter aloud: "You have wrapped yourself with a cloud so that no prayer can pass through" (Lam. 3:44 ESV). Lamenters name their grief, refusing to minimize their suffering: "I am the one who has seen the affliction under the rod of his wrath; he has driven me and brought me into darkness without any light" (Lam. 3:1). Arguing that their current experience doesn't seem to match their understanding of God's goodness and mercy, lamenters ask persistently and boldly for help. Jeremiah keeps crying for help, "Remember, O Lord, what has befallen us; look, and see our disgrace!" (Lam. 5:1). In doing so, he expresses his firm conviction that "no one is abandoned by the Lord forever" (Lam. 3:31). Not always, but often, lamenters turn from complaint, expressing restored confidence that the Lord will redeem and restore again. Jeremiah's turn comes in the familiar assurance: "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness" (Lam. 3:21-22). As Vroegop asserts, lament "stands in the gap between pain and promise." [iii] Learning to lament helps when prayer is hard.

Leaning into Community

When prayer is hard, leaning into community strengthens our frail and vulnerable hope. Prayer was never designed to be primarily a solo activity. The Psalms were written and sung corporately. The Lord's Prayer was given to the

disciples by Jesus to pray together. When unanswered prayer mutes us, we need others to answer for us, to point us back to the God who redeems and restores.

Because being a member of the Church means we hope for one another, we must depend on the body of Christ to fulfill its calling to "Bear one another's burdens..." (Gal. 6:2). When we are weak, we acknowledge that weakness and rely on the body's strength to lay us on the mat and lower us before Jesus' tender care. Dr. Jerry Sittser, who lost his mother, wife, and daughter in a car accident, explains how community strengthened him in his season of grief:

"Sometimes some members of that community [the church], even through time and space, carry others.... I remember very vividly my inability to sing and pray...in the months and, really, years after the accident. I decided to let the church sing and pray for me. I do the same for others now. I sing for them; I pray for them."[iii] When prayer is hard, and we allow others to "sing for us, to pray for us," our vision of hope expands.

Listen for God's Declaration of Unfailing Love

When prayer is hard, it is often because we think God has not heard or answered our prayer. God *has* spoken, "Wait," or "Not yet," or "No," but we have often talked over God, refusing to listen. If we learn to listen in prayer, we will learn to recognize the song line of redemption, God singing His love over us.

We hear this song sung most loudly in Jesus' seemingly unanswered prayer in Gethsemane. The night before He was to die on a cross, Jesus poured out his troubled spirit in prayer. As he imagined bearing the wrath for our sin and enduring separation from his beloved Father, he sweated blood. He spoke His deepest desire to God, "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me..." (Luke 22:42). He finished the sentence, "Nevertheless, not my will but yours be done" (Luke 22:42).

How did God answer Jesus' prayer? If we lean in and listen carefully, we notice two answers. The first and more obvious is "No, I cannot let the cup of suffering pass from you. You must die for my people's sins so that they may become my children." But the second answer, the one we often miss, is "I will comfort you in your suffering." Just after Jesus' prayer, Luke tells us, "And there appeared to him an angel from heaven, strengthening him" (Luke 22:43).

As we listen to God's profound declaration of His love for us, our doubts fade, our hope brightens, and our capacity to love God and others expands. We become people of strong faith, confident hope, and extraordinary love.


Since that dark night three years ago, I've thought often about the prayer I uttered for my mom's protection. What if God did answer my prayer? What if, as my mother slept, an angel came? What if that angel led my mother gently to her Father, where she would know a safety and security she had never known on this earth? Though I can't say for sure, I dare to believe, I dare to hope—my prayer was answered.

It's part of the human condition to desire something we don't have. We've all experienced that moment when we've looked at social media or glimpsed our neighbor's life and wanted what the other person had. Perhaps for you, that discontent is rooted in a deeper ache. Maybe you pray for healing or resolution in a difficult relationship and find yourself in a season of waiting. Discontent with our circumstances may feel like just another struggle that appears to only affect ourselves, but the Bible says that an inability to control our desires and find contentment can lead to serious consequences (James 4:1-2).

As Christians, we know that all our desires are ultimately met in Christ and will be fully realized in eternity. Yet, God commands us to be content with the position, place, and material blessings He has given us now—in this broken, often sorrow-filled world. Finding true contentment in Christ is not easy, but one of the blessings of being part of a community of believers is that we can grow in godliness together, encouraging each other as we move toward heaven.

That is why this year's theme for the women of Redeemer is Contentment. Over the course of the year, you'll see this theme highlighted in various ways—through events, write-ups like this in Redeemer Life, and hopefully in conversations with one another.

As a foundation, our theme verse is Philippians 4:11–13: "Not that I am speaking of being in need, for I have learned in whatever situation I am to be content. I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. I can do all things through Him who strengthens me." We will also be using this definition of contentment from Melissa Krueger: "Contentment is an inward assurance in God's sovereignty and goodness that produces the fruit of peace and thanksgiving in the life of a believer regardless of outward circumstances."

In addition, we have identified four truths that we hope to emphasize throughout the year:


- 1. Contentment is based on the knowledge of God's character.
- 2. Contentment is independent of circumstances.
- 3. Contentment in the Lord produces peace and thanksgiving.
- 4. Contentment is a process; it's constantly being learned.

The calling that God has placed on us to be like Jesus is not an easy one, but He has given us all we need to truly learn contentment and shine as lights in a hurting, dark world. He has given us His word, other Christians who have gone before, and each other—and He has given us Himself.

"God came down and lived in this world as a man. He showed us how to live in this world, subject to its vicissitudes and necessities, that we might be changed—not into angels or storybook princesses, not wafted into another world, but changed into saints in this world. The secret is Christ in me, not in a different set of circumstances." – Elisabeth Elliot.

We look forward to this year and all that it will hold as together we seek to understand, both with our heads and our hearts, what it is to be content.







The title "Enough is Enough," is a "Step-by-Step Plan" teaching how to leave an abusive relationship with God's Help written by David E Clarke, PhD, a licensed Christian Psychologist along with William G. Clarke, MA. David Clark has been specializing in marital therapy for more than 30 years and has practical advice and Biblical guidance for separating so a patient can give themself a chance to succeed.

His Bible based therapy, and teaching has guided thousands of hurting men and women toward healthy lives, marriages and families. However, he knows when a broken marriage has gone too far and is no longer safe for the wife and children. As I read on, I was so surprised how Dr Clarke knew soon when a marriage was not going to survive. He could see how hard the wife tried. So, he didn't miss a thing when it came to encouraging her and listing what she needed to survive, children and all.



I couldn't help but think of Nabal and his wife Abigail in the Bible. She must have had a miserable life living with Nabal. Hospitality is very important in Scripture and to God. She apologized for her husband's behavior and David ended up killing him and taking Abigail for his wife. Apparently, God didn't want Abigail to live a miserable life either. Dr.Clarke also spoke briefly about Abigail and Nabal in "Enough is Enough".
