

WEEK THREE OUTLINE: "A PRESBYTERIAN HEART & MIND"

We have 4 sections of the lesson today – The 4 main influences on Machen and his overall course and formal education.

J. Gresham Machen's Formal Education



Machen received a BA in Classics from Johns Hopkins University, studying under the famous Basil L. Gildersleeve. After a graduate year with Gildersleeve, he studied for a Summer at the University of Chicago, and then headed to Princeton for both an MA in Philosophy at the University and then a BD (MDiv) at Princeton Seminary. One more year doing PhD work in Germany rounded out his formal education.

Germany (Herrmann)


His Service in WWI


Through Gildersleeve he learned the Classics and the value of academic excellence. Through Warfield he learned the Reformed Faith of the Westminster Confession. Through Herrmann he learned the positive aspects of a heart of devotion. Through his service in France in WWI he learned the absolute necessity and centrality of the Gospel.

As "The Hullabaloo" the Hopkins yearbook (Machen was the editor in-chief) shows Machen was popular and involved in the life of the new University. Living less than a block away from the campus, the life of the University flowed in and out of the Machen home.






B.B. Warfield and Princeton

Reluctant and unsure of what to do with his life, Machen is challenged by his new Pastor to "give Princeton a year." Machen ends up staying there for the majority of the rest of his life. His mentor in the Reformed faith is the great Dr. B.B. Warfield.






Notes:

Herrmann and his year in Germany

After graduation from Princeton Machen studies a year in Germany in Marburg and Göttingen. He has a crisis of faith while studying under Wilhelm Hermann a devoted and very "godly" man who's liberal theology was very influential.




Notes:

Machen Volunteers with The Y.M.C.A. in France during WWI

His service in WWI in France changed Machen. He becomes more convinced not only of the core doctrines of the faith, but of the desperate need of the Gospel as the only answer to the sinful heart and plight of all mankind. This is well documented in Barry Waugh's great book *Letters From The Front*.
