How to use this guide:



Each week includes a short meditation and two daily readings. The first is a promise from the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament) that anticipates the life, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus. The second reading is the New Testament record of the events leading up to Jesus' crucifixion, burial, and resurrection.

This is not an interpretive resource, so let each reading stand on its own and prayerfully reflect on each individually. To get the most out of this resource, we also encourage you to commit more time to praying and fasting, in order to prepare your heart and mind for celebrating Resurrection Sunday (Easter).

Why do we observe lent?



Observing Lent reminds us of our need for God's forgiveness and mercy.

Christians have historically devoted these 40 days of the Church Calendar towards more focused time of prayer, particularly in repentance (turning from sin and towards God) and fasting (abstaining from something, usually food). In addition to prayer and fasting, it is also a common practice to meditate on Jesus' journey to the cross by reading of these events in the Gospels.

Like all spiritual practices, observing Lent helps us remove worldly comforts and distractions to grow more aware of the love we already have from God because of Jesus.

A theology of "brotherly love":



Some of the most clear instructions the Holy Spirit gives to Christians are a category of statements known as the "one anothers." From these, we learn to serve one another, be patient with one another, encourage one another, bear one another's burdens, and rejoice, mourn, and pray with one another. They are an elaboration of Jesus' original "one another" commandment (John 15:12-15).

However, Jesus does not ask us to do for one another anything he hasn't already done for us. His love is not only emotional, it is a choice. Our love for one another will not always be an emotional overshadowing of our apprehensions. Biblical love, and therefore all of the "one anothers," are a choice we are free to make today.

The stability of God's sovereignty:



Jesus was not caught off guard; He knew the will of the Father was to push Him towards death (Jn 18:11). The sovereignty of God brings stability to the world. There is not a single moment outside His control. This is good news because even in the wicked motivations of man – particularly as we see in Judas' betrayal – we have a sovereign Father who is more than able to turn it for good (Rom 8:28). The good that was to come out of His death is our salvation. God's sovereign hand ordained the events of history to this culminating moment so that we would no longer be orphans dead in our sins, but instead sons and daughters. There is nothing more stable than being part of God's family!

Denial and Betrayal



As you read about the final moments of Jesus' earthly ministry, there is a contrast between Judas' and Peter's commitment to Jesus. They both waver, but Peter's denial isn't the same as Judas' betrayal. Betrayal is actually a commitment in reverse. Denial, however, can be thought of as "losing sight of oneself". Judas committed to hand Jesus over to the men seeking to kill him, while Peter lost grasp of his loyalty to Jesus.

You may often worry that you have betrayed Jesus, when in reality, you've only lost sight of your commitment to him. Turn back to Jesus, receive his forgiveness. Deliberately commit your way to Him and refuse to give denial an opportunity to grow into betrayal.

The gospel according to Zechariah:




In Zechariah's prophecies, we learn that much of the Son of God's life, death, resurrection, and return were foretold over four hundred years before his incarnation. Jesus' Triumphal Entry, the price of Judas' betrayal, and the piercing of Jesus' hands and feet on the cross making Him our saving sacrifice are all preached by the prophet Zechariah. Furthermore, we read in this short book that Israel will one day accept Jesus as their Savior, He will return to Earth on the Mount of Olives, and He will reign over His people from the Holy City Jerusalem.

God is not only all-knowing and in complete control, but He is also kind, loving, merciful, and patient!
