

I don't remember a time when I did not believe in God and Christ as our Savior but do recall when I first professed faith and was baptized. My formative years were a time of steady growth in my faith and knowledge of Christ while being an active member at the churches my family attended and being homeschooled in a Christian home. After graduating high school, I attended the Naval Academy and served as a Submarine Officer in the Navy. My college and Navy years were a time when God's faithfulness was evident to me although my focus on worship was often distracted. I grew up with my mom taking me and my siblings to church. Unfortunately, it was more to teach us morals rather than to find and enjoy the love of God. At age 11, I became "saved", but it wasn't until the age of 17 that I began to see God and pursue after Him. I initially went to college at East Carolina University but did not feel this was a good fit as I felt that it was very liberal and against God. At that time, I was building in the faith. I transferred to Liberty University during my sophomore year when I continued to learn more and more about God and how to follow Him. At the end of my sophomore year, I had the opportunity to go on a mission trip to Guatemala for 2 months. It was a very enriching experience that led me to do it again at the end of my junior year of college with the exception that I did not go with any particular group. I decided to work for the same ministry and stay with the same family as I did the previous year. Unfortunately at the end of the trip, I was involved in a motor vehicle accident. I was a passenger in the back seat of a Jeep Cherokee when we were involved in a head-on collision with an 18-wheeler. I do not remember the event or the next 8 days. The next thing I became aware of was my mom, aunt, and girlfriend (now wife) were at my bedside. I thought I was in a dream. I did not know I had been in an accident or even

that I had been injured. As it turns out, I had a moderate to severe traumatic brain injury, fracture in my neck, collapsed lung, perforated intestine, and splenic rupture. This required that I go into surgery to have my spleen removed and my intestines repaired. I also had a chest tube for my collapsed lung. It took several weeks to convince me that I had been in a wreck and had gone through such turmoil. In the following few months, I stayed home from college to take a break for a semester but slowly recovered. During this time, I felt most alive in God. My prayer life was abundant. My faith in God grew as I daily awaited a full recovery. Following my recovery and wreck, God has been good by blessing me with every step I take. God has blessed me with a beautiful wife and four daughters. He allowed me to have a full recovery-minus the spleen-which enabled me to become a physician in the emergency department where I help people at their most vulnerable and trialing times. I do attempt to pray with patients during these times. At home, I have been able to build a farm which my daughters can help. We have used the farm to host various activities such as wilderness medicine lectures for the LUCOM medical students, wilderness race for the

medical students, and the emergency department staff, as well as hosting a multigrade end-of-year party over the last few years. All of these things we do to point others toward Christ.



Brad Weaver

My family moved to Lynchburg when I was a baby (I am the youngest of four) and I was raised here except one year in Danville. After high school, I attended college and soon after moved to Atlanta only to return to Lynchburg with a wife and daughter years later at the invitation of my brother, Earl, to join his insurance business in 1999. Lynchburg has been my earthly home ever since. I was raised in a Christian home by two loving parents and attended a local Baptist church as a youth. For most of my life, however, I did not take my faith seriously until a dark period between 2010 and 2012.
