We had two fellowship dinners this month: one for the ladies and one for the men in our congregation. We helped one of our elderly ladies move into a new home as it was snowing and then hosted several rental groups in our church facility. Members from the Mile One Mission team traveled to the United States and Ontario to help promote our ministries and allow other folks to see how we are reaching Atlantic Canada with the Gospel through our church planting endeavours. I am thankful to have this opportunity to live and work in Labrador as a part of evangelical outreach of Mile One Mission.



Northern Cross Community Church hosted two separate fellowship dinner nights at the church facility: one for the ladies and one for the men. It was an opportunity for our congregation to invite folks who may not attend church and/or unbelievers in order to have exposure to our local church. These dinners are in a relaxed atmosphere where we promote getting to know one another. Attendance for both events were good and encouraging for us.



We had planned on having a special event in March 2026 for the ladies in our congregation with the help of a mission team from the USA. However, the mission team is not able to return to Goose Bay, so we may be able to plan this event with a female intern from our Mile One Mission team. This is one of our big prayer points too.



Since we are still a small church we do not have the funding available for the larger type events open to all of the public yet. However, we pray that as we grow that we will have a focus to reach our community with the Gospel and eventually even outside our local area (up the Northern Coast). Vision and mission are important for a local church and our vision is to reach most of Labrador with the good news.



One of our elderly ladies needed assistance moving out of her current apartment into another home. Although the moving team consisted of just me and one other couple, we managed to get her moved within about five hours during a heavy snowfall. Opportunities like this one help demonstrate the notion of Christian community and how we come alongside one another in love to get the job done.
