And because they want to reduce the price they are willing to pay, they're willing to settle for a knockoff.

Wait. A knockoff Jesus? Is there such a thing?

We have all probably ordered or bought a product that we thought was an original, only to later discover that it was nothing but a cheap imitation. You might have even been willing to purchase a cheaper option, knowing good and well that what you were getting wasn't going to be "the real thing." Whether the product lived up to your expectations or not is something else entirely. When it comes to salvation, however, we should understand that if we don't accept Jesus as He is, or if we don't abide in Him in full submission to His will, that we have sacrificed what is better for a bargain. And some bargains just ain't no bargain at all.
