Opening Sentences

P Through Holy Baptism, our gracious God forgives sin and creates new life. In Baptism, we are reborn to a new life where we know God as the loving, forgiving Father that He is. While we live, this new life is nourished by God's Word and the Sacraments. As we grow in God's grace, our faith becomes more mature. Understanding and wisdom are coupled together with compassion and servanthood. God's people become more Christ-like.

The hope and joy which we have in Christ does not end at the grave. God's loving purposes for his people are not destroyed by death. Rather, death becomes the

gateway to eternal life with God in heaven. The grave for God's people is not the end, but the beginning which brings about God's ultimate purpose for his people. Today, we are gathered here to remember and to celebrate the life given to our brother, Dick, who now lives with Christ in heaven. We grieve, and yet we hope. We are sad, yet we are able to celebrate and give thanks for the hope of the resurrection. Our faith in Christ reminds us that no matter how painful death may be, it is ultimately victory, not defeat. Because Christ lives, Dick lives. This is our faith, our hope, and our joy.

Glory to you, O Lord.



P Merciful God, you sent your Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ, to bring life and immortality to light. We give you thanks because by his death Jesus destroyed the power of death and by his resurrection he has opened the kingdom of heaven to all believers. Make us certain that because he lives we shall live also, and that neither death nor life, nor things present nor things to come shall be able to separate us from your love which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. P O God, the generations rise and pass away before you. You are the strength of those who labor, and the rest of the blessed dead. We rejoice in the company of your saints. To your name, with the Church on earth, and the Church in heaven, we give all honor and glory, now and forever. Lord, in your mercy;

Commendation



Richard "Dick" Conrad Wangeman



Richard C. Wangeman, "Dick," was born and raised in Rockford, Illinois where his parents taught him the Love of God, the love of helping others, gardening, and fishing in the Great Lakes.

Dick attended Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas where he majored in finance. He passed the CPA exam and had a career auditing for the Defense Contract Audit Agency (DCAA). He spent time at Leavenworth, Kansas; he loved to tell people that "He spent time in Leavenworth!"

In 1982, Dick came to Virginia to work at Cameron Station rewriting Federal auditing procedures for completing audits on the computer—previously all audits were completed by hand using paper, pencil, and an adding machine! DCAA sent him across the country teaching the new procedures. It was then he learned that he liked teaching others new skills. He managed an audit agency of 60 people and then eventually took early retirement.

Upon retiring, Dick learned how to manage his own stock portfolio online and was at the Kingstowne Library daily pursuing this. He also volunteered to help others who inquired about this "new way" to buy and sell stocks.

Dick also enjoyed volunteer work at Pat's school and loved having time to take their dogs on long walks and to play daily at South Run Dog Park.

Both at St. John's and at St. Mark's, Dick participated in outreach and evangelism programs. Although he was tone deaf and not able to sing well, he loved the quality of both pipe organs, especially when brass accompanied the hymns. Dick would joke that maybe in Heaven he will be able to sing!

Dick enjoyed a good auction, antique shops, estate sales, and has an extensive collection of Revolutionary War era furniture and items. He donated to educational programs at several historic sites.

Dick loved good stories, good jokes, playing bridge, his children, and his grandchildren. Giving life to others was a high priority, so he was a regular blood donor and organ donor upon his death. We have placed green wrist bands from Infinite Legacy on the lunch tables in the Fellowship Hall to remind us of the "gift of life" we can give. Please take one (or more) wrist bands home with you today.

When Dick married Pat in 1988, they became the parents of three children: Laurie (John), Gil, Kellie (Ryan), and later grandparents of five Kelcie (Tim), Brett (Katie), Lance, Malachi, and Phoebe.

In addition to his children and grandchildren, Dick is survived by wife, Patricia, brother Dennis (Luann), nieces Jana (Lance), Andrea (Kevin), and five great nieces and nephews.
