Opening Sentences

P Through Holy Baptism, our gracious God forgives sin and creates new life. In Baptism, we are reborn to a new life where we know God as loving and forgiving Father. While we live, this new life is nourished by God's Word and the Sacraments. As we grow in God's grace, our faith becomes more mature. Understanding and wisdom are coupled together with compassion and servanthood, and with the help of the Holy Spirit are able to follow Christ's example as we love God and serve each other.

The hope and joy which we have in Christ does not end at the grave. God's loving purposes for God's people are not destroyed by death. Rather, death becomes the gateway to eternal life with God in heaven.

Today, we are gathered here to remember and to celebrate the life given to our brother Raivo, who now lives with Christ in heaven. We grieve, and yet we hope. We are sad, yet we are able to celebrate and give thanks for the hope of resurrection. Our faith in Christ reminds us that no matter how painful death may be, it is victory, not defeat. Because Christ lives, Raivo lives. This is our faith, our hope, and our joy.

Holy Gospel John 10:7-18


P The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the tenth chapter.

⁷So Jesus again said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, I am the door of the sheep. ⁸All who came before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them. ⁹I am the door. If anyone enters by me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture. ¹⁰The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. ¹¹I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. ¹²He who is a hired hand and not a shepherd, who does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and flees, and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. ¹³He flees because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep. ¹⁴I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, ¹⁵just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for the sheep. ¹⁶And I have other sheep that are not of this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. I have authority to lay it down, and I have authority to take it up again. This charge I have received from my Father."



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Acknowledgments

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Raivo Vest, 85, of Springfield, VA passed away Wednesday, June 11, 2025. Loving husband to the late Norma Ann Vest; devoted father of Karl Vest and his wife Rachel, and Erika Topping and her husband C. Grayson; Grandfather of Grayson, Jackson, Isabelle, Coralynn, and Daphne.

Raivo was born in Estonia in 1939. Although Estonia declared neutrality at the outbreak of World War 2, when Raivo was just 10 months old, Estonia was invaded and overtaken. The country was repeatedly contested, invaded, and occupied throughout the war. Raivo's father was taken as a prisoner of war, while Raivo and his mother were ultimately forced to flee the country. They spent the remainder of the War as displaced persons in Europe. The Estonian population loss by the end of the war has been estimated at 25%.

Raivo and his mother immigrated to the United States, and became naturalized citizens. Raivo attended Johns Hopkins and Penn State University, where not only did he earn a PhD in Electrical Engineering, but he also he met the love of his life.

Raivo and Norma enjoyed living in central Pennsylvania, but ultimately moved to the DC metropolitan area to further their careers.

Raivo had an incredible ability not just to learn and understand, but to mentor others in many aspects of life. His work and contributions to the Department of Defense are known throughout the community and internationally.

Raivo has been an active member of St. John's Lutheran Church in Alexandria. He worked to preserve his Estonian heritage, and passed some of those memories on to his family, through Estonian School, events at the Baltimore Estonian House, the Estonian Men's Choir, folk dancing, and the Saint Marks Estonian Church in Baltimore.

Raivo was a loving father, grandfather, and husband, and has left behind many cherished memories in the hearts of his family and friends.
