I. Most Common Views of the Millennium

- 1. Pre-millennium: Jesus will return before the millennium.
- 2. Post-millennium: Jesus will return after the millennium.
- 3. A-Millennium: There is no literal millennial reign of Christ on earth.

II. What do future events teach us about life in the present? (Revelation 20:1-15)

- a. Unifying around the Gospel is more important than dividing over our differences. (20:1-6)
- b. Satan is more influential but less powerful than we thought. (20:1-3)

c. What we do today matters for eternity. (20:4-6)

Then I saw thrones, and seated on them were those to whom the authority to judge was committed. Also I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded for the testimony of Jesus and for the word of God, and those who had not worshiped the beast or its image and had not received its mark on their foreheads or their hands. They came to life and reigned with Christ for a thousand years.

d. It is possible to experience the blessings of God yet still rebel against Him. (20:7-10)

e. Hell is a real place, and we must take it seriously. (20:11-15)

III. Let's fight to keep the Gospel of Jesus the main thing.

Study Questions

1. There is much debate among believers over the meaning and timing of the millennium (Revelation 20:1-6). Why is it healthy to seek to understand the differing views on the millennium? Also, why is it necessary that we not divide over our differences but rather unite around the Gospel? Explain.

2. It is important that we think biblically about Satan instead of tending towards extremes. Read Revelation 20:1-3 | 20:7-10. See also 2 Corinthians 4:4 | 1 John 4:4 | Revelation 12:17. What do these verses teach us about Satan? Be specific. Are there any new insights they provide to your current understanding?

3. The truth about final judgement is sobering. Take a few minutes to review Revelation 20:11-15. What most stands out to you about the Great White Throne judgment? Explain. What can we glean about God's holiness and character from what we're told about final judgment?

4. The reality of hell should give us a sense of urgency to share the Gospel. Identify the names of 2 or 3 people in your sphere of influence (where you Live | Learn | Work | Play) who do not know Jesus. Share their names with your group. Think of a few ways you can be more intentional to engage them with the Gospel this week. Commit to praying for them every day and ask God to give you both the boldness and opportunity to have a spiritual conversation with them.
