(Ephesians 4:29-30 ESV)

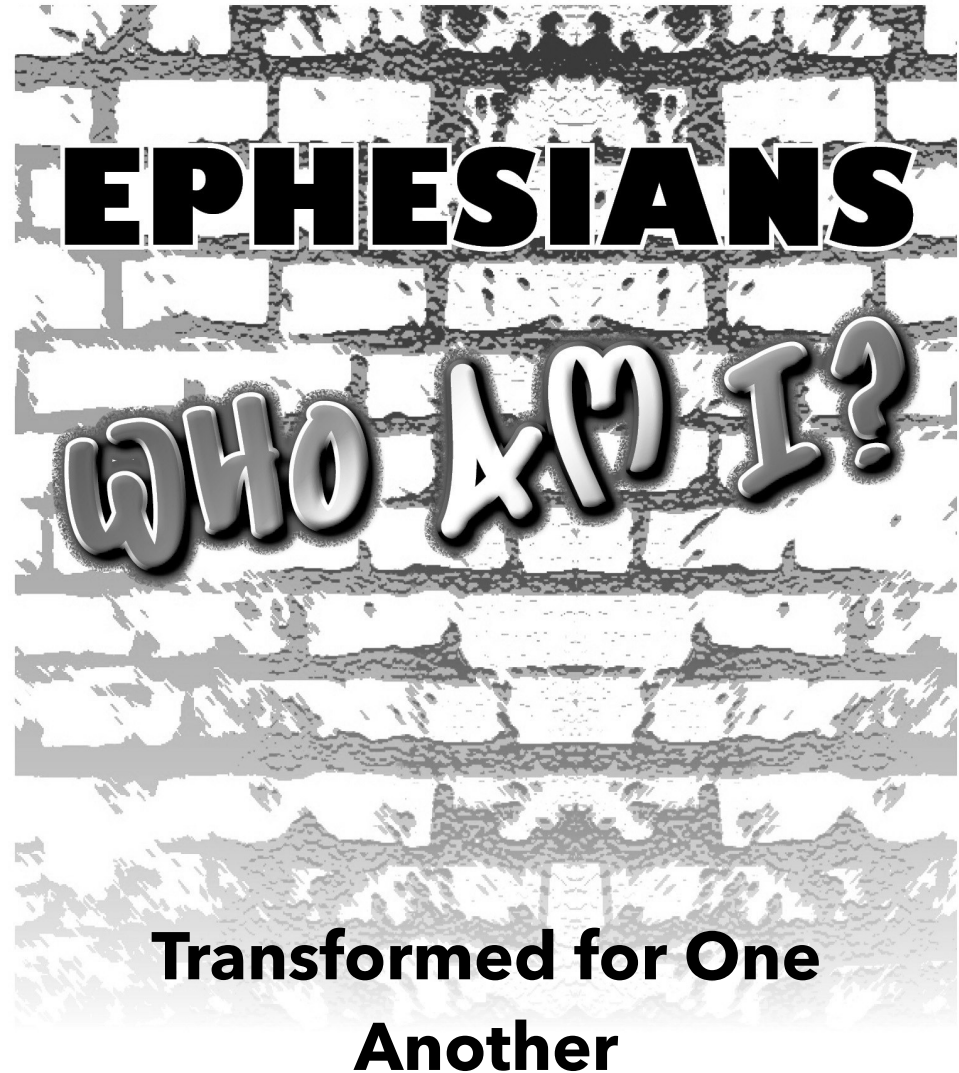
(Ephesians 4:31-32 ESV)
