Soul Safari Homeless Ministry


Ministering to Houston's Homeless Population

or several years, Spring Baptist has supported Soul Safari. This ministry, founded in 2012, shares the Gospel and ministers to the hearts of those who come. Individuals are provided Bibles, food, water, clothing, blankets, and more to the North Houston homeless population. Several churches partner with Soul Safari, including Spring Baptist. Bill Zaffos of Spring Baptist shares. "I know that actually sharing the Gospel with others can be difficult. It was for me, but I have been blessed ever since. I would encourage you to come just once, and you will be blessed." Soul Safari meets on the second Saturday of each month, rain-or-shine, from 9-11 AM at the corner of Kuykendahl and FM 1960. They always need donations such as towels, sheets, and blankets. In the Fall, backpacks, light jackets, and casual shoes are beneficial as winter approaches.

We have seen an increase in Spanish-speaking individuals and are in real need of bilingual volunteers to help share Jesus with those the Lord is bringing each month.

As area construction continues, wooded areas that house local homeless camps are disappearing—this translates to more opportunities for Soul Safari to minister.



All Out in **Togo, Africa**



his past summer, I had the opportunity to go to Togo, Africa, in July with First McKinney Baptist Church, where I served as an intern. By the end of the week, several hundred had given their lives to Christ, and it was incredible to witness and experience it. I got to see a whole different side of doing ministry on this trip, and I'm so grateful for the opportunity to go.

Eswatini, AfricaOpportunity!



pring Baptist is partnering with Project Love
One to send a mission team to Eswatini,
Africa, April 13-24. Project Love One is
committed to fulfilling the Great Commission
through community development projects in clean
water, nutrition, health, and education. We will be
taking a small team to serve the vulnerable families
in a rural area of Sigcaweni alongside the local
church to minister to not only the physical needs
but to share the love and hope of Jesus Christ.

Eswatini has the highest incidence of HIV/
AIDS in the world, which has created an enormous
orphan crisis. Many children live in child-headed and
granny-headed homes. In addition, in Sigcaweni,
many widows struggle to provide for their children
without a job or income. While 90% of Swazi people
profess to be Christian, only 6% know what it means
to know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior.

For many living in Eswatini, Christian theology is combined with the indigenous religious practices, especially in the rural areas. Project Love One is committed to creating sustainable solutions to address the areas of malnutrition, hunger, poverty, and lack of clean drinking water while shining the truth of the Gospel message into the darkness. Building relationships is a crucial foundation to all of Project Love One's community development projects, and by partnering with the local church, our mission team will have a tremendous opportunity to share the truth of the Gospel message and show the love of Jesus Christ to Eswatini's most vulnerable. Project Love One has been bringing small teams to Eswatini since 2020. God is strengthening friendships with the community on each trip. The joy and enthusiasm of the community is overwhelming on each return.

Farming God's Way is a sustainable solution for providing food and nutrition to those living in poverty and areas subject to frequent droughts while teaching God's all-sufficiency and the Biblical truth of honoring God as the one true God. Our team will be able to prepare widow's lands or assist in teaching this farming

technique.

through home repairs.

I Timothy 5:3 tells us to "Take care of any widow who has no one else to care for her." Many widows have homes that need minor (and some significant repairs). We have identified several of the most vulnerable widows our team can serve alongside the church in Sigcaweni by installing windows and doors, and patching up plastering on the mud and stick homes

One-day marriage retreat. Eswatini is a polygamist society. While still practiced by some professing Christians, we are hopeful as the truth of the Gospel penetrates the culture, that the Swazi Christians will adopt the Biblical view of marriage. Our team will have an opportunity to teach a short marriage conference and encourage the men and women to follow Christ's example.

Clean water is essential to tackling preventable diseases in Eswatini. Our team will have the opportunity to bring water filtration systems to people who do not have access to clean drinking water. We will also share that Jesus is the living water that truly satisfies us.

Sharing the Gospel Our teams will serve the local church by teaching the children, sharing testimonies, or sharing scripture from God's word

at two different churches. Project Love
One has partnered with a rural church
in Sigcaweni, where over 150

children attend weekly.

In addition, we will serve
with a small home church
in the hills above the capital
city of Mbabane. After church, we
will have a meal with the people
and have an opportunity
to play with the children.

On each trip God uses

the unique talents and abilities of those from the body of Christ to minister specifically in various ways. It will be exciting to see how God will bless not only the people in Eswatini as Spring Baptist fulfills the Great Commission, but also how God will grow the faith of those who go and serve.

The Gospel in a Guatemalan Prison

've visited many prisons here in the U.S. However, nothing could have prepared me as I entered the prison at Puerto Barrios, Guatemala. The oppression was stifling. I felt a weight on my spirit before entering the guard shack.

The prison was an open area with few buildings and many awnings. At the same time, it wasn't bright but very dark, with makeshift living quarters and workstations in every space and corner available. People were everywhere. Also, there

was an almost intolerable stench. I had to focus on breathing through my mouth so as not to lose my breakfast. The walking spaces were tight and narrow at times with people.

Many people were lying around and doing nothing, but others were busy doing all manner of things. Some were cooking in makeshift kitchens in the many nooks and crannies. Others were crafting hammocks and bags of all shapes and sizes from colored plastic strips. Many had food items and snacks for sale and were announcing



their wares. It was almost like the peanut and popcorn vendors at a baseball game in the USA-but without the atmosphere.

Somebody showed us a makeshift assembly area under an awning that would make a suitable spot for worship. As the service started and we began to sing, it was like we weren't in a stinky prison. Instead, we were in the presence of God. There was a praise team, a pastor, and a congregation. I could've closed my eyes and been in a Sunday morning service at any Spanish church; the prisoners assembled there had a hope that I would've thought impossible in the squalor of that place. Can you imagine prisoners being happy and praising God for His goodness? That was incredible!

After the service, we passed out the prisoners' food packages and personal necessities. As we walked, feeling people bearing down on me was oppressive. You could feel the spiritual oppression.

I talked with Pastor Garcia, one of the inmate pastors at the prison. He asked me to pray for him as I was talking to him. He said, "pray that they will let me out of here." I said, "of course." But what he told me next broke my heart for him and who knows how many others in his shoes. He said, "I have done my time but haven't been called up for release." I was stunned. It was so surreal that a person could fulfill his sentence and not be released—and even more unbelievable was that someone would forget him like that. He said that

his time had ended months ago. I was floored that he had nobody to advocate for him; then I realized that he DID have an advocate: Jesus Christ, who sacrificed His life for pastor Garcia and all of humanity. Jesus knew exactly where he was.

Everywhere I turned, there was spiritual oppression. I felt a weight on my spirit much of the time we were there. But, as I looked around, I saw the believers throughout the prison–faces with hope. Hope was there if one only looked for it. God gives hope to all who seek Him and make Jesus the Lord of their lives.

Hector Ponce was an inspiration to me. He was happy even though he was in prison and would likely be there for years. He exuded the Lord in his every action. He was the hands and feet of Jesus in the Puerto Barrios prison; I admire his love for God. I hope and pray that I can be as joyful and dependent on my Lord in adverse circumstances as he is.

After we left and were relaxing at the beach the day before we came back from our mission trip, I asked myself, "What did I come away from this experience with?" The answer was that no matter where you are or under what circumstances you find yourself, you always have the option of hope in God through Jesus. If the inmates at Puerto Barrios prison can have hope in Christ—so can we.
