What are You Reading?

- What do you like to read?
- I like to read a lot of deferent things
 - Sci-Fi & Fantasy, Science and Engineering, Self Development, Mysteries
 - Some of these books require focus while others
 - Others I call "trash" novels
 - Not "bad" books, but books that require little on my part to understand, you know, fun books

The Bible Requires Focus

- If you read your Bible as if it were a trash novel, no focus
 - You will get nothing from it
 - It has good stories and lessons that might entertain you
 - They can make a good movie
- But the Bible is not a trash novel, it deserves our attention
 - The Bible is the living Word of God
 - The Bible requires focus and study





The Bible Requires Focus

- Apply the same mental powers you use for your current interests
 - Nurse: Focuses on a patient's vitals and charts
 - Pilot: Knows the daily weather and flight plans
 - Engineer: The specs of the equipment you are using
- Have you ever read a spec (specification) sheet for high tech equipment? Boring!
 - Unless you read it with a group of engineers

What Does Thoughtful Reading Do?

- Let us look at two books
 - Who Moved The Stone (1930)
 - By Frank Morison
 - Journalist and advertiser
 - The Case For Christ (1998)
 - Lee Strobel
 - Journalist







Serious and Thoughtful Study

- Both Frank Morison and Lee Strobel read the Bible as
 - Journalists, Men trained to seek out truth
 - Men doubting the validity of the "story" of Christ
 - How can anyone believe the supernatural
 - The resurrection of Christ
 - If you can show this part of the story to be false
 - All the rest will fall apart



The Result of Thoughtful Study

- So, they dug in, questioning the Bible, seeking outside information and proof
 - Months, no Years of study
- The result of their thoughtful study?
 - There was to much written, that read as truth to deny
 - Their study, which started as proof against Christ turned to proof for Christ
 - Their lives were changed

Reread, Why?

- How often have you reread a book? A movie?
 - Once? Twice? Thrice? More?
 - Why did you re-read/watch it?
 - The characters? The Plot? It's comforting? You missed something?
- When you reread it, did you read it all? Or Just parts?
 - I have favorite parts of books I like to reread
 - Why? Because they bring me joy

Why Reread the Bible

- When you're an expert in a field reading a book about that field only requires a reread maybe 2-3 times tops
 - By this time, you have it and can move on
- But this is never true of the Bible
 - You will never be an expert Christian
- The following are suggestions to help in reading repeatedly




Read Entire Books in One Sitting

- This does not mean they entire Bible in one day
 - Remember the bible is made up of 52 books
 - Oops, that's 52 weeks, there are 66 books in the Bible
 - That means if you read one book a week, you could
 - Brad, I don't read one book a week now!
- I could never read one of the books of the Bible in one sitting
- Who likes charts?

The Value Of One Sitting

- You will get to see the book as a whole
 - Each book is written with a singular purpose
 - And to fully grasp it you need to see it all at once
- This does not mean every time you read the Bible
 - This is when you are going to study Matthew in detail
 - Read all of Matthew in one sitting (2.5 hours)
 - Then start breaking it up
 - Over the next 6,8,10 weeks

Begin At ... The Beginning

- Jumping into the middle of a book is confusing
- By starting at the beginning, we typically will find
 - Who is writing the book
 - Who it is written to
 - The setting
 - The tone



Read In Multiple Translation


- In other words
 - Read the Bible in other words
 - You will see things differently
 - Or see things you missed





Listen to Recordings of Scripture


- The benefits
 - It changes the sensory input from visual to audible
 - This is the way many of the scripture were originally communicated
 - The Sermon on the Mount was verbally given
 - The voice of the reader changes the way you hear
 - What did they stress or pause on
 - The biggest benefit is it can be done hands free

Read Out Loud

- Again, hearing what you read changes things
 - When you read out loud you must focus on what you are saying
- The Bible tells us to teach our children what He tells us
 - This means reading to our kids
 - It also means having them read to us
 - Out loud



Must You Study Your Bible Everyday?

- I'm going to say no
- But reading it everyday is a good idea
- The important thing is
 - You need to study your bible
 - The how will look different from person to person
 - The timing, place, environment
- You need to set a schedule

Schedule Time to Read & Study

- You must purposefully set a time and place to study
 - Maybe you set up two days a week (or more!)
 - Where you can study for an hour
 - You have your Bible, atlas, commentaries, ...
 - You break down the book you are studying
 - The other days of the week (all the other days)
 - You take 10 min to read/reread the section you are focusing on



It Is Not Easy

- I remember studying in college
 - I studied electrical engineering
 - I had dreams (nightmares) of how electricity flowed
 - I thought I'd never understand my first circuits class
 - What is R1 if the voltage is







It Is Not Easy

- I did the homework and went to class
 - I redid the homework and talked to the professor
- After a couple of months things started to click
- This is the advice I give anyone I tutor or teach
 - Be patient, do the work, repeat the work
 - Understanding will come to you in time
 - But you MUST do the work



Work One Book At a Time

- Take one book from the Bible
 - Read it all in one sitting
 - Then start breaking things down
 - Ask the book questions
 - For the next 4-6 weeks
- That's one book down
 - Start the next
 - At this rate you will have 12 books done in a year

Zoom In & Out

- 4-6 weeks may seem like a long time, but it's not
- Let's look at Genesis (3.5 hour read)
 - CH 1-11 cover, the creation, flood, tower of Babel
 - CH 12-50 cover four generations, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph
- That's the big picture, the zoomed-out picture
- But what happened in each part?



Zoom In

- The Flood CH 6-10
- The sacrifice of Isaac CH 22
- Creation narrative CH 1-2
 - God establishes marriage 2:18–25
 - Jesus refers to it in Matthew 19:4-6, Why?
 - Why is marriage in Genesis?
- Don't forget to zoom back out and recall the big picture



Be Patient With Yourself

- It is frustrating to see others, your pastor or teacher expand on a verse
 - And you have no clue how they figured it all out
- The secret is they have been studying for a LONG time
- So don't compare yourself to others
 - If you are trying and diligently working
 - You WILL find Gods truth
 - Give yourself time

Chapter 11



What is Selective Reading

- Selective reading is a process of pulling out specific information
 - Information that helps you, the reader, understand and organize the facts of what is being read
- Selective reading does not mean skipping parts that you do not think are important
 - It helps you understand all the other parts better



Six Methods for Selective Reading

- Who: Who are the people in the text?
- What: What is happening in the text?
- Where: Where is the narrative taking place?
- When: When did the events take place?
- Why: Ask the Bible "Why?"
- Wherefore (So What): What difference does it make?



Who

- Who are the people in the text?
 - Simple and straight forward
- Once the people are found do the following 2 things
 - What is said about them
 - Good guy, Bad Guy, Brother of, ???
 - What does the person say?
 - What do they talk about? To whom?



What

- What is happening in the text?
 - What are the events?
 - In what order?
 - What happens to the characters?
 - If there is and argument
 - What is the argument?
 - What is the point?
 - What is the writer trying to communicate?



Where

- Where is the narrative taking place?
 - Where are the people in the story?
 - Where are they coming from?
 - Where are they going?
 - Where is the writer?
 - Where were the original readers of this text?
- This is where maps come in handy



When

- When did the events take place?
 - When did they occur in relation to other events
 - In scripture
 - In other histories
 - When was the writer writing?
 - What time of day is it
 - Was it a: Holiday? Festival? Funeral?



Why

- Ask the Bible "Why?"
- There are an infinite of "Why?" questions to ask the Bible
 - Why is this included?
 - Why is it placed here?
 - Why does this follow that?
 - Why does this precede that?
 - Why does this person say that?
 - Why does that person say nothing?
- Why? is a question that digs for meaning

Wherefore (So What)

- What difference does it make?
- What difference would it make if I were to apply this truth?
- Wherefore? is the question that gets us started doing something about what we've read
- The Word of God is written to change our lives
 - This is where we start to apply things in our lives



Read Prayerfully

Chapter 12



But This is Bible Study

- The Bible is Gods spoken Word; It is how God talks to us
 - Talk back to God
- How do you talk to God?
 - Through Prayer
 - God this makes no sense
 - But that's hard to do God! Why?
 - I don't understand. Help me understand.



Prayer

- Your prayer should look like
 - "Dear Lord God! I beseech you to give me insight into your Holy Word. Shine Your Light onto these dusty pages so I might find insight which only you can give"
- Or
 - "God, I don't get it. What do you mean here. On page 354 about halfway down."



Don't Pray the Way You've Heard

- You don't have to sound like the preacher
- You don't have to sound like Bill at prayer meeting
- Talk to God the way you talk to anyone else
 - With the appropriate amount of respect
 - That's a lot to be sure

Read Philemon This Week

- It is short, maybe a 5-minute read
 - Philemon records Paul's advice to an old friend whose slave, Onesimus, had run away
 - Onesimus encountered Paul in Rome
 - Became a believer
 - Now Paul sends him back to his master
 - With the letter in hand, the letter you are going to read

Read Philemon This Week

- Now barrage the text with questions
 - What can you find out about the relationships between Paul, Philemon, and Onesimus?
- Reconstruct the situation
 - What feelings might be involved?
 - What questions remain unanswered?
 - What problems does it create?
 - What issues does it speak to?



Read Philemon This Week

- Why do you think it is significant enough to be included in the Bible?
- What issues do we face today that this book might speak to?
- How would you communicate this book and the insights you gain from it to someone else?



¹ Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother:

To Philemon our dear friend and coworker, ² to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church that meets in your home. ³ Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. ⁴ I always thank my God when I mention you in my prayers, ⁵ because I hear of your love for all the saints and the faith that you have in the Lord Jesus. ⁶ I pray that your participation in the faith may become effective through knowing every good thing that is in us for the glory of Christ. ⁷ For I have great joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, brother. 8 For this reason, although I have great boldness in Christ to command you to do what is right, 9 I appeal to you, instead, on the basis of love. I, Paul, as an elderly man and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus, ¹⁰ appeal to you for my son, Onesimus., I became his father while I was in chains. ¹¹ Once he was useless to you, but now he is useful both to you and to me. ¹² I am sending him back to you—I am sending my very own heart., ¹³ I wanted to keep him with me, so that in my imprisonment for the gospel he might serve me in your place. 14 But I didn't want to do anything without your consent, so that your good deed might not be out of obligation, but of your own free will. 15 For perhaps this is why he was separated from you for a brief time, so that you might get him back permanently, ¹⁶ no longer as a slave, but more than a slave—as a dearly loved brother. He is especially so to me, but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. 17 So if you consider me a partner, welcome him as you would me. 18 And if he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. 19 I, Paul, write this with my own hand: I will repay it—not to mention to you that you owe me even your very self. ²⁰ Yes, brother, may I benefit from you in the Lord; refresh my heart in Christ. ²¹ Since I am confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say. ²² Meanwhile, also prepare a guest room for me, since I hope that through your prayers I will be restored to you. ²³ Epaphras, my fellow prisoner in Christ Jesus, sends you greetings, and so do ²⁴ Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, and Luke, my coworkers.
