NEW SERMON SERIES: CHURCH ON FIRE

Title: Gather for Fire

Preacher: The Rev. Alfred T.K. Zadig, Jr.

Today, we enter week two of our six week sermon series on "Church on Fire." Week one was: "Getting Ready for the Fire" by asking for an encounter with Jesus (remembering that any organization can show what people can do; only the church can show the world what Christ can do).

Today, our focus is on "Gathering for the Fire." One thing is required for us to experience the full manifestation of Christ...we must SHOW UP, we must GATHER! Being a fruitful Christian in isolation is like thinking I can play on a football team without ever showing up for practices and the game. It sounds so limited, but truly, sometimes the most courageous, the bravest and most critical thing you can do is just-plain-show-up. As one said: "Show up messy, show up imperfect, but just keep showing up"... After all, life isn't about avoiding the bruises. It's collecting the scars to prove we showed up for it! So, today, gather with me in that upper room to see what Jesus can do!

The **opening voluntaries** provide time and space to prepare the heart for worship. Please utilize this time for meditation, reflection, and prayer. The music should help you ponder the character and various attributes of God and His plan for the world. If any piece is hymnbased or chorale-based, a selection from the lyrics is provided to aid in prayer or reflection.

At this time please silence all cell phones and beepers.

It is customary upon entering to begin with a few moments of private prayer, usually kneeling.

The liturgy begins with the **Acclamation**, which is an "eager expression" of praise.

In this **Prayer for Purity**, we ask God to cleanse our hearts and minds of anything that comes between Him and us, anything that would impede our worship of Him. We offer to Him our whole selves that we might decrease and that He might increase, to the glory of Jesus Christ.

The word creed comes from the Latin credo for "I believe." Catholic simply means universal, not necessarily the Roman Catholic Church.

Doxology Old 100th

Praise God from whom all blessings flow Praise Him all creatures here below Praise Him above ye heavenly hosts Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Amen. The **Doxology** swells up out of our gratitude to God for his goodness to us. The word "doxology" literally means "glory saying," and so in this song we give God glory for his triune nature and as the author of all blessings.

The **Holy Communion**, the Supper of the Lord, is not only a sign of the love that Christians ought to have among themselves for each other but is especially a sacrament of our redemption by Christ's death.

With the desire to follow the New Testament injunction to "sing a new song" and the desire to expand our congregational repertoire of Eucharistic settings, we are introducing this exquisitely beautiful, new Sanctus setting by Anglican composer Philip Stopford, which we will sing through Advent.

The Sanctus is the song of the seraphim contained in the great vision that the prophet Isaiah experienced while worshiping in the Temple in Jerusalem. This vision is recorded in the 6th chapter of Isaiah. It is inspired by Isaiah's vision of the heavenly court "Holy, holy, holy" acknowledging transcendence of God.

The Eucharistic Prayer is

centered in the atoning death of Jesus Christ upon the cross. His suffering there in our place is the only sufficient ground or basis for our standing before God. Our joy in the present and our hope for the future all flow from the reality of God's redeeming work in the historic event of the crucifixion.

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith: *Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.*

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, and we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Word and Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Sanctify us also, that we may worthily receive this holy Sacrament, and be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us and we in him. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us with all your saints into the joy of your heavenly kingdom, where we shall see our Lord face to face.

The Invitation

The congregation will now receive communion at the rail, either kneeling at the rail for the wafer and cup, or receiving a mini-chalice (to be consumed at the rail). Personal prayer with St. Michael's prayer ministers is available during communion and after the service in the Prayer Pews.

The Lord's Prayer, so called because Jesus gave this prayer to His disciples as an example of how to pray, has been a part of Eucharistic liturgies since year 400 A.D. The link between our daily bread and the spiritual food we receive in the Eucharist is very ancient. In the context of the liturgy, the words "give us this day our daily bread" refer both to our daily needs as well as the "bread of Heaven" which we receive in the Eucharist.

During Communion:

When we gather together, we remember the presence of Jesus. By repeating the words and actions of Jesus' last meal with His disciples, we join the story and make it our own. We don't just watch the drama or listen to it unfold, we enter into the story as we, too, take the bread and wine and eat and drink.

The Celebrant invites the people to Communion.

All baptized people may come for Communion. Unbaptized people and young children may come for a blessing, presenting themselves to the ministers with arms crossed over their chests.

As you approach the rail, you may choose to receive the bread and wine from the cup at the rail, or indicate you want a mini-chalice by placing your right hand over your heart. Please consume the elements of your mini-chalice at the rail.

Gluten Free Wafers are Available:

If you need a gluten free wafer, please indicate this at the altar rail by placing your hand over your heart.

Those at the rail will receive the bread in their hands, eat the bread, and then guide the chalice to their lips for a sip of the wine.

ORDER FOR RECEIVING COMMUNION

General: Two lines in center aisle, returning to pews via side aisles

SIDE AISLES begin first, walking to the back and using the back Crossing Aisle to access the center aisle. Please return to your seat using the side aisles.

CENTER AISLES are second, starting from the back. <u>Please</u> return to your seat using the side aisles.

Those seated in the center aisles from the **READER'S PEW** forward (pew # 42–39, including front crossing aisle pews) <u>may return to their seats using the center aisle</u>.


