

What is Good Friday?

The Good Friday liturgy is the second part of the Triduum (the sacred three days). This most somber of all days is appropriately marked by fasting, abstinence, and penitence, leading us to focus on Jesus and the meaning of his Cross. Some churches do not use musical instruments or bells on this day. The church is often darkened. The bare, stark appearance of the church serves as a reminder of the solemnity and the sorrow of the day. The Lord of Life was rejected, mocked, scourged, and then put to death on the Cross. The faithful are reminded of the role which their own sin played in this suffering and agony, as Christ took all sin upon himself, in obedience to his Father's will. By the Cross we are redeemed, set free from bondage to sin and death. The Cross is a sign of God's never-ending love for us. It is a sign of life, in the midst of death.

As Jesus hung on the cross, he uttered seven last phrases of great meaning to those contemplating his passion and death. Today, on Good Friday, we remember His Seven Last Words. The tradition was begun in the 17th century in Peru. The Seven Last Words are more like sayings that contain the elements of Forgiveness, Salvation, Relationship, Abandonment, Distress, Triumph and Reunion. Tonight, these seven last words will be saturated in prayer, choir anthems, hymns and reflections.

Periods of silence are longstanding parts of the Good Friday worship tradition. It is customary for the priests to enter worship in silence and initiate a period of silent prayer. The custom of reading the Passion Narrative from the Gospel of John has been a traditional part of the Good Friday liturgy since the 11th Century at least.

Why Did Jesus Die?

Jesus died so that he could take the sins of yesterday, today, and tomorrow with him into death. This is not a theological metaphor. A man died. Christians believe that truly he was (and is) the Son of God. And for all that believe in him his death becomes the means through which the holy power of God takes our offered sins into death...and leaves them there. Today we come to remember and honor the moment in history in which that truly happened and now reaches forward to touch our own lives.

History:

Good Friday as a separate rite of observance emerged in the practices of the church in the late fourth century. Supposedly the practice began in Jerusalem in the great church built by the mother of the emperor Constantine (who converted to Christianity early in that century). It is reported that the wood and superscription of the true Cross were here taken out of linen wrappings and brought into view to engage and center the soul and imagination in wonder and worship. Over the years pieces of the true Cross were sent to different churches. Eventually this veneration of the Cross became a practice in churches that did not possess any piece of the true Cross, but would have a (wooden) cross brought and made the center of attention.



What are the Reproaches? The "Reproaches," also known as "Improperia," are a series of antiphons and responses in the liturgy, where God, as if from the cross, laments humanity's unfaithfulness and contrasts God's blessings with their ingratitude, culminating in the crucifixion.

Officiant People	I led you through the desert forty years, and fed you with the bread of heaven; I brought you into the land of promise, and you have prepared a Cross for your Savior. <i>Holy God, Holy and Mighty,</i> <i>Holy Immortal One, have mercy upon us.</i>
Officiant	What could I have done for you that I have not done? I planted you, my vineyard, to bear sweet fruit; but you have become very bitter to me,

Officiant	I passed over your first-born and delivered them from death, and you have delivered me into the hands of my enemies; I led you in the pillar of cloud, and you have led me into the judgment hall of Pilate. O my people, what have I done to you? How have I wearied you? Testify against me.

These Good Friday Anthems reflect the crucifixion of Jesus, His sacrifice, and the redemptive power of the cross. The Anthems serve as a time for solemn reflection, mourning, and ultimately, hope in the promise of resurrection.

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, we pray you to set your passion, Cross, and death between your judgment and our souls, now and in the hour of our death. Give mercy and grace to the living; peace and rest to the dead; to your holy Church unity and concord; and to us sinners everlasting life and glory; for with the Father and the Holy Spirit you live and reign, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

As a symbol of what this day is all about, we ask you to come forward under the cross and receive a gift. As you receive it in your hand, you will note it is a bit greasy, it is messy and it is the pain of death on Good Friday.

ORDER FOR RECEIVING THE NAILS

General: Two lines in center aisle, EXITING via side aisles

SIDE AISLES begin first, walking to the back and using the back Crossing Aisle to access the center aisle. <u>Please EXIT using the side aisles</u>.

CENTER AISLES are second, starting from the back. <u>Please EXIT using the side aisles</u>.

Those seated in the center aisles from the READER'S PEW forward (pew # 42–39, including front crossing aisle pews) <u>EXIT using the center aisle</u>.

After you receive this important symbol, <u>we ask that you leave in silence</u> through the side aisles or feel free to go back to your pew, to sit, kneel, and pray for as long as you like.

The Lord's Prayer: like the Creed this prayer given to us by our Lord is designed to "cover all the bases". It is the basic and essential structure of a complete prayer life.

Anglican Churches normally do not celebrate Holy Communion on Good Friday.


