## The Liturgy of the Word

#### **Invitation to Lent**, standing

Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord's passion and resurrection, and it became the custom of the Church to prepare for them by a season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. In this manner, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and alms-giving; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. And, to make a right beginning of repentance, let us now pray for grace that we may faithfully keep this Lent.

# At this time please silence all cell phones and beepers.

It is customary upon entering to begin with a few moments of private prayer, usually kneeling.

Late Seating: In order to avoid disruption of worship during prayer, reading, and the sermon, late seating will be during sung portions of the service.

#### What is Lent?

If Epiphany is looking outward, Lent is that healthy season of looking inward at the heart. Lent is a six week period of preparation for Easter Day. The name derives from Old English Lenten, meaning Spring. So from Ash Wednesday to Easter there are a total of 40 workdays recalling the forty days of Jesus fasting in the wilderness after his baptism. Lent therefore is a time of self:

- Auditing
- Penitence
- Denial

#### What is Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent and derives its name from the practice of placing ashes on foreheads as a sign of mourning and repentance to God. The ashes used are typically gathered after the palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday are burned.

The Scriptures teach that much of our spiritual renewal is by the washing of the Word of God, which cleanses our minds and purifies our hearts. This portion of the service is known as the Liturgy of the Word, and it consists of the readings, the sermon, the creed, and the prayers of the people.

Why Give up Something for Lent? Lent is the most introspective of the church seasons, and in modern times the foci are on self-examination and repentance; prayer, fasting and self-denial; and meditation on the Holy Scriptures. All of these devotional practices, including giving up something, are to help up prepare for Easter. The theological basis for this is simple: Every time we want what we have given up, we are reminded of what Christ gave up for us. Christ gave his life. While our sacrifice pales in comparison, it serves as a frequent reminder of God's overwhelming and complete love for each of us in our season of preparation for the resurrection.



#### Why Ashes?

Ashes were used in ancient times, according to the Bible, to express mourning. Dusting oneself with ashes was the penitent's way of expressing sorrow for sins and faults. An ancient example of one expressing one's penitence is found in Job 42:3-6. Job says to God: "I have heard of you by the hearing of the ear: but now my eye sees you. The other eye wanders of its own accord. Wherefore I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes." (Vv. 5-6).

#### Psalm 51

David wrote this penitential Psalm after his adulterous affair with Bathsheba and then murdering her husband to cover it up. Because David repented of his sin, he was forgiven. There is no sin too great to be forgiven.

In the Confession of Sin and Absolution, our sins, both individual and corporate, have been confessed, and we have been powerfully reassured of God's complete forgiveness through Jesus Christ. The priest declares that our sins have been forgiven to all who are repentant and believe on Jesus Christ.

The Litany of Penitence
A litany is a form of prayer in

which fixed responses are made by the people to short biddings. Officiant Let us humbly confess our sins to Almighty God.

Lord. Amen.

#### The Absolution

Officiant

He has empowered and commanded his ministers to pronounce to his people, being penitent, the absolution and remission of their sins. He pardons and absolves all who truly repent and genuinely believe his holy Gospel. For this reason, we beseech him to grant us true repentance and his Holy Spirit, that our present deeds may please him, the rest of our lives may be pure and holy, and that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*
