EVANGELISM and PUBLIC RELATIONS

The first streetlight etched in my memory had a distinctive white glow that lit my path from the end of our lane until I had almost completed the two-block walk to the schoolyard. In time, the light was changed to one with a sensor that automatically turned it on and off as needed. Its bulb created only a small blue circle at the base of its lamppost and I struggled to see as I walked to school in the darkness. By the time I could rejoice in the radiant amber rays of the most recent streetlights, I had good reason to wonder what it would be like if they were to disappear altogether. What would it be like to walk in utter darkness?

The prophet Isaiah declares, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone" (Isaiah 9:2), and "Let him who walks in darkness and has no light trust in the Name of the LORD and rely on His God" (Isaiah 50:10b). Only the light of God has the power to overcome the "deep darkness" of sin, death and Satan's

power that entered our world through the disobedience of our first parents, Adam and Eve.

We rejoice in the birth of our Saviour, Jesus Christ, born of the Virgin Mary just as the prophet Isaiah foretold: "Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call His Name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14). In John 8:12 Jesus confirms, "I am the Light of the World. Whoever follows Me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life," and in John 14:6 He reminds, "I am the Way and the *Truth and the Life. No one comes* to the Father except through Me." His saving work on the cross, His death, resurrection and ascension back to His Heavenly Father, both illuminates and secures our pathway to Him.

We also remember these words that Jesus included in His Sermon on the Mount: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In

the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 5:14-16).



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
ADVENT CALENDAR

— AN IDEA TAKEN FROM PRAYING IN COLOUR



MITTEN TREE

Help keep many hands and ears warm this winter by decorating the Mitten Tree. Mittens, gloves, toques and scarves in sizes for children and adults are needed. Donations will be accepted until Sunday, December 15, and then given to community organizations for distribution.



ADVENT IS THE SEASON OF PREPARATION for God's coming into the world as a flesh and blood person. Lush and heady words pepper our Advent vocabulary and theology—incarnation, anticipation, preparation, hope, despair, annunciation.... But Advent is also a season of down-to-earthiness and the physical senses. It is a time for awakening the head, heart and body.

Using an Advent calendar is one of my favourite ways to prepare and pray in the days leading up to Christmas. Unlike the store-bought versions, my calendars have no doors, just blank spaces for the days of Advent. Instead of tearing apart a calendar day by day, I build the calendar. Each day I choose a person to pray for or a word to ponder. I write the name or word in the space and ask God to be with me in this daily journey. Then I sit with the word and surround it with doodles and colour; I think of each mark or swath of colour as a non-verbal prayer. Each day's offering feels like a little wrapped package to bring to Jesus' birthday celebration. Creating this calendar helps me to savor each day of Advent. I no longer want Christmas to hurry up and get here! I am content in the preparation. When the calendar is finished, the accumulation of daily doodles forms a colorful tapestry and is a record of my Advent spiritual journey.

Drawing, writing, or doodling on an Advent calendar template is both a prayerful and playful practice. No artistic skill is necessary! Advent starts on December 1 this year, so there are 24 days until Christmas.

Ideas For Using the Calendar Templates

1) **Pray for a person each day.** Write their name in the space. Doodle around the name, add colour. If words come to you as you draw, pray them in your mind or write the word on the page. Squeeze words onto the calendar in the shape or along the margins. When you have finished with your daily entry, say "amen" or recite a short passage of Scripture appropriate to Advent like "The Lord is my light and my salvation" (Psalm 27:1). This tiny colourful mosaic creates a frame around the person's name. Return to the calendar each day and let it be a visual reminder to pray for each person again. Add a new person every day.

- 2) Choose a word from the daily Scripture readings for the season. You can find a daily lectionary in Lutheran Service Book, page 299.
- 3) Choose a word from a book of Advent meditations. Combine your calendar with one of the many wonderful books of daily Advent meditations and reflections. Read the entry for the day and choose a word that jumps out at you. Write the word in the shape and doodle and colour around it. Marinate in the word. What is it saying to you? What does God have to say to you about the word? Keep a computer or notebook next to your calendar so you can write any insights or "ahas."
- 4) Write and ponder an Advent word like prepare, wait, pregnant, hope, watch, darkness, wilderness, longing, light...as you doodle and colour. There are dozens of words associated with Advent. When you complete a calendar using these words, it is like having a mini, visual dictionary of the season.
- 5) Use the words chosen by AdventWord. Their suggested words for 2024: humility, abound, redemption, sprout, earnestly, faithfulness, safety, splendor, refine, joy, prepare, righteousness, salvation,

- proclaim, rejoice, gentleness, trust, gather, home, love, mercy, lifted, shine, come, fruit
- 6) Write something you hope for each day. Advent is a season of hope. Choose a word of hope and write it in the space. Let the word fill you as you draw and add colour.
- 7) Celebrate the women and men of the Bible. Choose a different person for each day and learn what they did and why they are important to our story and God's story. As you draw, be quiet and listen to what these people might reveal to you about Jesus and God.
- 8) Write one of the many names for Jesus in the daily box. Here are a few of the many ways we refer to Jesus: Saviour, Messiah, Friend, Prince of Peace, Emmanuel.... Use the Bible, Handel's Messiah, Christmas carols, and hymns to uncover those names. Pray and ponder how that name for Jesus stirs, affects, annoys, delights, or inspires you.
- 9) Just colour and doodle in the space. For smaller children, draw the calendar on 11"x17" paper to create larger spaces. Teach them about Advent as a "one day at a time" journey. Light a battery-powered votive candle and give them a quiet, secret place to work.

STEWARDSHIP

REPENTING OF "YOURS" AND "MINE"

Retailers have had their Christmas displays up since before Reformation Sunday. The kids have made their list and checked it twice, or three times or more. It won't be long before the tree will start shedding its needles, the stockings emptied, the gifts unwrapped, toys broken, and the too small or out of style clothes returned. Before we know it, the annual celebration of Christmas will be over.

But for the children of God, we know that the gift of Christmas doesn't ever end. Week in and week out, the Lord continues to shower His gifts on us. Every time the Lord gathers us to His house, and we are led to kneel at His table, the gift of forgiveness is



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Repenting, continued repeatedly granted to us. It is nothing we deserve. It comes to us freely!

The fourth stanza of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us Lord for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788) highlights both this gift and our response.

Teach us, O Lord, true thankfulness divine, that gives as Christ gave, never counting cost

To learn thankfulness is necessary. The parents of young children are well-versed in the fact that they must teach their children thankfulness. It does not come naturally. The spiritual genetics inherited from our parents allow us to think that the world revolves around us. When we receive something, there is an inward desire to think that we in some way deserve it.

But there is no way that we deserve anything we get from our Lord. We need that ongoing lesson from God Himself. Thankfulness toward God is worked in us by the Holy Spirit. God's Word works this thanksgiving in us. We need this weekly reminder that Jesus didn't consider "equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself" for us, to the point of death on a cross (Phil. 2:6). He didn't bat an eye. He paid the price! Our life of stewardship is one of daily and weekly thanksgiving inspired by the Lord Himself.

That knows no barrier of "yours" and "mine," assured that only what's withheld is lost.

Because Jesus gave us everything and more, there can be no ownership. The child at Christmas is quick to claim that the newly gifted toy is "mine!" But as Psalm 24:1 asserts, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein." There isn't anything in creation that is ours. When we cling to and claim ownership of anything in creation, we are losing out on the continual gifts with which the Lord desires to shower upon us. Closed hands cannot receive anything new. We cling to the old and dead and miss the new thing that the Lord desires to do in and for us.

We are led to repent of the "yours" and "mine" and remove the lie that we have any ownership. In this we have the promise that God will continue to give to us. Not just at Christmas, but every Sunday at the altar in the Lord's house.

HERE AT ST. PAUL'S, as we move into the Advent season and all the expectation that season brings, we

are mindful of the many ways God continues to bless us and our congregation. We are blessed with the gift of music and those who offer it to enhance our worship experience. We are reminded of the dedication of Pastor Keith and his disciplined sermon messages founded in the true inspired Word of God. We are thankful for the faithful servants who support our worship ministry and church office functions. We will soon be meeting to hold our voters' meeting where we will approve an operating budget for 2025. We pray that you will continue to support our mission and ministry here and abroad with your gifts.

Moving into the last month of the year, we look at our financial situation and where we might end the year. Our last financial statement to the end of September showed a deficit of \$20,085 so we have a way to go to end the year in the black. This compares to a deficit at the end of September 2023 of \$27,554. Last year we ended the year with a small surplus so we know we can make up substantial ground with God's blessings and our collective gifts. Our latest year-end projections based on previous years' actual giving and expenses show a possible deficit of just over \$9,000. We know we can overcome this deficit, and we pray that we will see an improved year-end result.

CONNECTING WITH OTHERS

When it comes to friendships within the church, Jacob Kitsch thinks broadly. In 2019 he set out on an adventure that just kept growing.

That year while Jacob was still in his teens, one of Rev. Nieminen's children, whose father previously served as vicar at St. Paul's, introduced him to a group chat of teens, many from eastern Canada. Today Jacob thinks he has met a significant number of the young adults in Lutheran Church—Canada.

In 2022 he attended the Lutheran Church–Canada convention in Edmonton, meeting many and learning the ins and outs of our church body.

Summer is the best time for travel because Jacob is at university the rest of the year. In 2023 he drove to Winkler, Man., to attend a retreat for Central Region young adults organized by Rev. Klages. He met Hunter and Sahara Monselor, former members of St. Paul's living at Christopher Lake in Winkler. He also helped with a VBS in a small congregation in Sudbury, Ontario, the same one Gracie Harper helped with this year as part of her summer internship. Jacob, Hunter, and Jacob's cousin Kyler also attended the Good Shepherd Institute at Fort Wayne, Indiana. Jacob received assistance from St. Paul's Scholarship fund for the Good Shepherd Institute.

This past summer was another busy one for Jacob. In all he was away from home for four weeks. He attended what has become an annual retreat in Winkler in May. In July, he was off to a one-week summer conference at Concordia University in Nebraska. Jacob shared at length about the state of university education in The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod and discussed an organization named The Consortium for Classical Lutheran Education (CCLE) who provided the summer conference attended by 600 people, many of whom were young adults.

Following the conference, he drove to Florida and visited with members of a family he attended CCLE with. After this, he drove to Galveston Texas for a cruise for 21- to 41-year-old Lutherans organized by Rev. Bryan Wolfmüeller of Austin, Texas. The cruise ship held 6,000, 150 of whom made up the young adult group. Jacob attended the cruise with Hunter Monseler, Jack Seemel, and Vicar Albert Ho.

Jacob agrees that driving is cheaper than flying and he has logged about 40,000 km so far.

Where to next? There's a retreat in Kitchener, Ont., and possibly one in Saskatchewan next summer. And, after he graduates from the University of Saskatchewan, he tentatively plans to attend a twoyear program at Luther Classical College in Casper, Wyoming.

We began this by saying that Jacob thinks broadly when it comes to friendship...wanting to make connections with like-minded Lutherans. But it isn't just about friendship. It's learning about Lutherans

in the current culture, and sharing and praying and more, with like-minded people, especially in the young adult age group. And I suspect he may be keeping his eye out for just the right someone to be part of his future.
