Faith? Or Feelings?

There can be times in our lives when we might feel like we are disconnected and distant from God. We might feel like our faith is weak or maybe we even wonder if there is any faith left in our heart at all. We can experience things that leave us feeling more doubtful than faithful. We can be lost for words when we try to pray. We can feel a sense of despair and hopelessness and wonder if salvation remains for us. These can be dark and lonely times and can leave us feeling downcast and lost. At times like these we need to remember God's promise that we are never alone and that He is always there to help us in our weakness. We need to remember that weak faith is still faith. Faith does not receive God's grace, the forgiveness of sins and eternal life because it is strong—but because it is faith. Our salvation is not based on how we feel, but on what God has done for us through our Saviour Jesus Christ.

St. Paul teaches that the Holy Spirit acts on our behalf, "...the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with

groanings too deep for words" (Romans 8:26). Even when we are struggling and confused the Holy Spirit fosters and preserves our faith. God does not turn away but devotes Himself to healing and strengthening us when we are languishing. Jesus teaches, "If you have faith like a grain of mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there, and it will move and nothing will be impossible for you" (Matthew 17:20). Faith, even as small as a mustard seed, can move the mountains of temptation and doubt.

If you are struggling with matters of faith, trust in God's Word of promise and not in your feelings. Focus not on the weakness of your faith but on the strength of God. Christ Jesus is the author and perfecter of our faith (Hebrews 12:2). Be fed and nourished by God's Word and Sacraments. Pray with the disciples, "Lord, increase our faith" (Luke 8:11) and with the father of the boy with an unclean spirit, "Lord I believe, help my unbelief" (Mark 9:24) and know that God will. Our



feelings should never be used to measure our faith. They come and go. When we are sleeping we do not feel our faith, but it is still there to save us. Our feelings change, but the Word of the Lord remains forever (1 Peter 1:25).

Increase my faith, dear Saviour,
For Satan seeks by night and day
To rob me of this treasure
And take my hope of bliss away.
But, Lord, with You beside me,
I shall be undismayed;
And led by Your good Spirit,
I shall be unafraid.
Abide with me, O Saviour,
A firmer faith bestow;
Then I shall bid defiance
To ev'ry evil foe. (LSB #587, v.2)

Good News: God's Perfect Love

"The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness. 'The LORD is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in Him." (Lamentations 3:22-24 ESV)

These words of God (recorded by the prophet Jeremiah) have often brought me comfort and peace, especially as I miss the love of my parents and other dear ones who are gone from this earth. How blessed we are to know that God's love does not waver or come to an end. As it was in the beginning, it is now and ever shall be!

"... God shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8 ESV)

When Adam and Eve brought sin and death into the perfect world God had made, He had good reason to disown us as unlovely and unlovable. Yet, His response was to promise a rescue mission (see Genesis 3). How thankful we can be that our loving God fulfilled His promise by sending His Son, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, to lay down His life on the cross as full and final payment for the sin of all humanity. Three days later, an

empty tomb and Jesus' appearance to many witnesses confirmed His Father's acceptance of His sacrifice and the victory He won for us.

"Whoever confesses that Jesus is the Son of God, God abides in him, and he in God. So we have come to know and to believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and whoever abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him. By this is love perfected with us, so that we may have confidence for the day of judgment, because as He is so also are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear. For fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not been perfected in love. We love because He first loved us" (1 John 4:15-19 ESV).

As a child, it was my parents' love that assured me I had no reason to be fearful. These words of God (recorded by the apostle John) point out that, through faith in Christ Jesus, God (His Heavenly Father and ours) lives in us and fills us with His perfect love. When God looks at us, He sees Christ's perfection. Since Christ has saved us from God's wrath, we are assured that we have no reason to be fearful when His

Stewardship

Don't Replace "And" with "Or"

We've all heard that stewardship means giving to the church of our time, talents and treasure. This alliterative trinity helps us see that giving is not just about money, but about our whole lives. As we confess in the Small Catechism's explanation of the First Article of the Apostle's Creed, God gives us everything we have and enjoy. First, we confess that God gives us "our body and soul, our eyes, ears, and all our members, our reason and all our senses" (SC II). Then we confess that He gives us material things. The time, talents, and treasure trinity places before our eyes the fact that we are to give something of all three of these things toward the mission of the church in thanksgiving for what God has provided. For everything we have, and indeed, everything we are, comes from God's fatherly, divine goodness and mercy.

The problem with this alliterative trinity comes when we replace one little word with another little word — when we replace the word and with the word or. It is always written with the and, but when we read it, we read it with the or. Thus this quite helpful trinity, which extolls that everything that we have and are is a gift from God, to be given back in service of His church, turns into a trinity that we can pick and choose from when we serve God. The giving of our time, talents and treasure turns into the giving of our time, talents or treasure.

Then the question arises: Can we give of our time and talents instead of our treasure? Or perhaps it is the other way round: Can we give of our treasure and not of

our time and talents? But these are the wrong questions. The right question is, can we give of our time and talents in addition to our treasure? Yes, indeed, we are called to give of all three. The things that God gives us are not to be pitted against one another. Rather, they are given to us, and we are to press them all into God's service for benefit of His church and our neighbours in need.

Thus, we give all three. We give our treasure in the form of a generous, first-fruits proportion of our income. We give of our time in generosity for the benefit of Christ's holy church. We give of our talents in the same manner. Since God gave us all these things, we are called to give generously of all these things in faith toward Him and in fervent love to our neighbours.

For God has provided all these things for us. Out of His fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, He gives us each time, talents *AND* treasure as a means to bless those around us. We serve our neighbours with these things, continued next page

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Stewardship, continued blessing them with the blessings with which God has blessed us. We give of our time, talents and treasure to our families, our society, our church and our local congregations. And we do this because we know that we are not our own. Rather, we belong to God. We have been bought with a price: the holy, precious blood and innocent suffering and death of our Lord Jesus Christ. He gave everything—His time, His talents and His

treasure—to have us as His own and to live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence and blessedness. We have these things as gifts and blessings from God. Let us then press them all into service for the sake of His love—time, talents and treasure together.

The Transfiguration of our Lord is when... Jesus took Peter









Kate is having trouble moving just one fish.
