PASTOR'S CORNER

Did you make any new year resolutions? Many people do. Some make a resolution to stop doing something they think is harmful and others want to take up something they believe will be beneficial. Usually there are good intentions behind making new year resolutions. People want to improve their lives. They want to make progress and become better. "A new year, a new me" as the saying goes. Behind this thinking is the idea that it is up to us to renew ourselves. While this is the way it works in the world, it is not the way it works in our lives as God's people.

Our old sinful nature makes it impossible for us to make ourselves "new" before God. We cannot clean ourselves up enough or improve enough to be holy and acceptable before God. St. Paul teaches us, "For by works of the law no human being will be justified in His sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin" (Romans 3:20). Our holiness before God is His work, not ours. St. Paul makes this clear when he says, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17). We are in Christ and we are a new

creation not because of anything we have done, but because of what Jesus has done for us. St. Paul teaches, "because of [God] you are in Christ Jesus, who became to us wisdom from God, righteousness and sanctification and redemption" (1 Corinthians 1:30).

Christ is your righteousness and sanctification and redemption. He creates in you a new heart by claiming you and cleansing you through your baptism. St. Paul says, "We were buried therefore with Him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory

of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:4).

Our newness of life is not based on our ability to keep new year resolutions, or anything else we can do. It is entirely God's grace. So go ahead and take up a new hobby, eat more vegetables, and go for a walk. These things are good for you. But know that they do not make you a "new you." We are made new in Jesus Christ and Him crucified and risen. This is the truth that sets you free.

Thank you to Sherry Gore who acted as contact person and helped deliver the mitten tree items.



There are no longer any "epiphanies" left to be revealed in 2024, because we would know what they are by now, but there are likely many of them coming in 2025! I wonder what they will be. One Lord, One faith, One baptism (Ephesians 4:5)

Jesus' Baptism - The Joyous Exchange

Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to John, to be baptized by him. John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented (Matthew 3:13-15).

John sees the problem and quickly objects. Why is Jesus coming out to the land, to the wilderness, to be receive a baptism for repentance? Jesus' kinsman knows the folly of His relative coming down into the water to be numbered with sinners. He doesn't belong here because this is a place for sinners. Jesus corrects John and tells him that it is to be done to "fulfill all righteousness." In so doing, in being numbered with sinners, in fulfilling all righteousness, the Lord Christ makes your baptism a life-giving exchange. The perfect Son of God exchanges your sin for His righteousness so that you have been made right, perfect before God.

Jesus' baptism is the essential link between the cross, the tomb and your own baptism. That is why St. Paul writes, "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?" (Romans 6:3). This means that in the simple splash of the water and the attached Word of God, you have received all that Christ won for you on the cross. What the Father then says of Jesus, He therefore says of you in Holy Baptism, "This is my beloved child, with whom I am well pleased." You are God's own child and you can gladly say it as this assurance brings great comfort and peace to you.

The Baptism of our Lord is not a Sunday to skip because Epiphany doesn't fall on a Sunday. It provides a treasure trove of teaching opportunities about what it means to be the baptized children of God. From remembering one's own baptism to putting others in mind of their baptisms, Scripture, hymnody and liturgy provide tools for rooting our identity into being baptized into Christ. For the

Christian, it is not speaking about a past event, "I was baptized." Rather, it is all about one's identity as a child of God, "I am baptized."

Now rise, faint hearts, be resolute; This man is Christ, our substitute! He was baptized in Jordan's stream, Proclaimed Redeemer, Lord supreme.

CLOTHED AND PROTECTED

During our Saskatchewan winters, there is no doubt that we need to put on extra layers of clothing to protect us from frigid temperatures and harsh winds. Our Heavenly Father has provided us with special "clothing" to protect us from forces of evil here on earth.

In Galatians 3:24-27 (ESV) Paul writes, "So then, the law was our guardian until Christ came, in order that we might be justified by faith. But now that faith

has come, we are no longer under a guardian, for in Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ" and in Romans 13:12 (ESV) he writes, "The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light." It is these words that inspired the following poem.

PUT ON CHRIST

Through baptism we put on Christ, as the Armour of Light
By Whom we can forsake the dark and all the sins of night
He is the Truth and it is His righteousness that we bear
As we share His Gospel of Peace with people everywhere

Then in Ephesians 6:10-20 ESV, Paul refers to the

STEWARDSHIP

REPENTING OF "FEASTS THAT KNOW NO FAST

Fresh off the Christmas season and the retail frenzy that accompanies it, January brings a shot of frigid air into the lives of the people we know and love. This is not a meteorological statement either. While it is true that January is one of the colder months for those in North America, the cold front blast that hits us is the full force of credit card spending that fueled the retail frenzy. The bills for the gifts, the parties, the food and the travel have now come due. The credit card makes things convenient, but it also requires more discipline than many can muster. When the bills come in January for December's celebration, it really puts a damper on things.

Congregations often make the same mistake in stewardship. We often charge forward in doing what we always do or starting new endeavors without counting the cost. But at the end of the month, or the end of year, when the bill comes due, the red ink on the congregational balance sheet smacks the people in the face like a stiff north wind in January. We hunkered down. We circle the wagons. We start to panic. The work of the Gospel suffers.

The fifth verse of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788) addresses this January situation. The words penned by William Watkins Reid are very needful for us to hear as we start a new year, while dealing with the bills of past efforts and expense.

"Forgive us, Lord for feast that knows not fast ... " This hits us hard, doesn't it? We love when the money is flowing, the parties are going, and things are getting bigger and better. But there is a time in life, and most especially in our spiritual disciplines, that we need to fast. The purpose of a fast is to step back, lay something aside for a time, and replace it with meditation on Scripture and prayer. This is designed to keep us from turning something that may well be good into an idol that separates us from the God who loves us in Christ.

"For joy in things that meanwhile starve the soul ..."
In "The Parable of the Sower," we hear Jesus talk about how the worries and cares of life choke out the growth of the seed of the Word that was planted. We know how this happens in our lives. Professional and youth sports do this. Materialism does this. Travel and leisure and do this. There is a list of things that we enjoy that starve the soul.

But it also happens in our congregations. When corporate stewardship is not managed in a responsible way, it can and does destroy individual stewardship. Is it good individual stewardship to support a ministry that doesn't take its corporate responsibility seriously?

"For walls and wars that hide your mercies vast and blur our vision of the Kingdom goal." This is the ultimate end of the idolatry of failed stewardship. We build walls between believers within the church and hamper those who are outside from coming to the Light of Life that is Jesus. The wars we fight over money and its impact on ministry do the same. It eventually blurs our vision of what we are here to do: share the Good News of Jesus. When the wintry blast of January hits us in this fashion, we are called to repent.

When the Holy Spirit uses the cold front of the call to repentance, we meet the God who forgives and restores. That is what He does for individual and corporate stewards. When the bills hit, they call us back to Jesus. He is the One who indeed forgives us our shallow thankfulness and leads us into the bounty of His mercy yet again.

While it is too soon to know how St. Paul's congregation ended the 2024 fiscal year, we can report that our offerings in November and December were very generous and we expect we will end the year with a small surplus. Going into October, November and December, we were looking at a significant year-to-date deficit and the possibility of a cash shortfall for the year. God continues to answer our prayers and bless us as we support our mission and ministry. Thanks be to God!


Prayer:




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Prayer
