Pastor's Corner

"Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow" (Psalm 51:7).

I was reminded of this verse from King David's psalm when I woke up to the snowfall in Saskatoon yesterday. The white blanket of snow that covered everything was pure and peaceful and it's no wonder David used this picture to describe what God has done for us by covering us in Christ's righteousness.

In his letter to the Romans. St. Paul teaches, "For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:22). "All" includes you and me. It also includes King David. We read in the Old Testament that God called and worked through David in many ways to fulfill His plan of salvation and we are thankful for everything that God accomplished through him. But David was a sinful man who repeatedly fell short of God's glory. The prophet Nathan confronted David with the sin and evil he committed with Bathsheba and thankfully God's Law brought David to repent. He recognized that he was dead in his trespasses and cried out, "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my

iniquity and cleanse me from my sin!" (Psalm 51:1-2).

David knows that God is the only one who can forgive and cleanse him of his sin so he pleads for God to purge him with hyssop. It is noteworthy that hyssop is a plant with bushy branches that was used to apply blood on the doorposts at Passover and was used for other rites of purification. Looking forward to the promised Messiah who would purge the sin of the entire world, David trusted in God's promise that he shall be clean and whiter than snow in the blood of the Lamb. The same

righteousness of Christ that covers King David's sin also covers ours. In Christ we are cleansed of our sin and we are made whiter than snow. This winter, as we see the snow falling and covering everything with a blanket of white, we are reminded of God's mercy and promise of eternal life.

Oh, how blest it is to know:

Were as scarlet my transgression, It shall be as white as snow

By Thy blood and bitter passion; For these words I now believe:

Jesus sinners doth receive.



Evangelism

Proclaiming the Good News

As for you, always be soberminded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry. (2 Timothy 4:5 ESV)

During our online Tuesday morning Bible study on October 11, as we studied these words of St. Paul to Timothy, Pastor Keith pointed out that the full meaning of the word "evangelism" is "the act of proclaiming the Gospel Good News." His words caused me to realize that my desire to share the good news of Jesus Christ has influenced the way in which I use the gifts and abilities God has given me.

Then [Jesus] said to [His disciples], "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and the Psalms must be fulfilled." Then He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, and said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance for the forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in His Name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And behold, I am sending the promise of My Father upon you. But stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:44-49 ESV).

In the same way as Jesus instructed His disciples to await the power of the Holy Spirit before beginning their ministry beyond Jerusalem, He has inspired and guided me throughout every endeavour, especially those that have led me outside my comfort zone.

For a number of years, anyone who receives an email message from me has had opportunity to view the Scripture passage that appears beneath my signature line. Only our dear Lord knows what impact this practice has had in the past and will continue to have in the future. All I know is that it is a comfortable way for me to share the "good news" with people I may never meet face to face. Recently, I began thinking of the passage as my personal "lawn sign," to be read and contemplated by everyone who sees it. For the same reasons that the words displayed on our church lawn sign are changed, I also change the verse I include. Currently it is John 8:12 (ESV): [Jesus said] "I am the *Light of the world. Whoever follows* Me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." I pray it blesses others as much as it blesses me!

As our congregation moves forward in a world that so desperately needs to hear the gospel message, I encourage you to give our Lord thanks for the ways in which He has guided your efforts in the past and trust Him to lead you through new opportunities in the days and years ahead.

What makes for a cheerful giver?

St. Paul wrote to the Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7). God loves a cheerful giver. But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, he gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, he prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall we say? For time would fail us to tell of all those

who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything – yes, even His life – enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty, we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ, give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart for the joy set before us. It's the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

At St. Paul's we continue to be cheerful givers in response to God's many blessings to us. We thank God for continuing to bless us through the difficult challenges we have faced over the past several years with COVID and the resulting attendance and giving setbacks. And yet we give thanks for the health and comforts we have enjoyed.

As we get closer to the end of our fiscal year we look at our financial situation to date and think about how we will end the year. Recently our treasurer shared our year-to-date financial statement to the end of August which showed we have spent \$20,000 more than we have taken in by way of offerings. This compares to a deficit at the end of August 2021, of \$12,679. Our offerings are about the same as they were last year, however, in the same period last year, we received \$10,400 in federal subsidies as part of support programs in place.

When we set our 2022 budget last fall, we knew we would have challenges because these subsidy programs were coming to an end. Notwithstanding we set a challenging budget knowing that God would be there with us and for us. We still expect to end the

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Stewardship, continued year with a small deficit, perhaps in the range of about \$10,000. Here's how we reached that amount. We spend about \$20,000 per month so that will increase our expenditures from September to December by about \$80,000. Looking at the last

three years – 2019, 2020 and 2021, our average donations were about \$90,000 over that time frame. Based on those projections we should be able to recover about \$10,000 to make up some of the current shortfall.

We are confident that with God's blessings we will achieve those goals to allow us to set a 2023 budget and end the year with some additional success knowing that we have done so with a cheerful heart.

God's blessings as we enjoy and celebrate this Advent season.


The Lutheran Laymen's League website has changed a little, so when

We are blesed and give thanks to God that in all things God is faithful to His promises and He promises to always be with us. We don't face things alone!




