
The Saskatoon Circuit is hosting a workshop/seminar presented by Lisa Jackson, Managing Director of Lutheran Laymen's League–Canada.

Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM) partnered with Barna Group—an industry leader for research-based insights about faith and culture, leadership and vocation, and generational groups—in ongoing studies of faith in North America. This collaboration has

facilitated the creation of resources that address the needs of the individual Christian, the Church at large, and for those who don't yet know the Gospel message.

Three important topics will be covered: 1) The Spiritual Conversation (a study helping to equip people with the knowledge and confidence to have faithsharing dialogues with others); 2) Households of Faith (this session presents vital principles that strengthen followers of Christ and their homes, which ultimately strengthens the family of God); and 3) Better Together (Congregational members have a unique, personal chance to connect with non-Christian neighbours who place more faith in individuals rather than institutions. Together we can focus on teaching and empowering one another to give of ourselves generously, in church and all the other dimensions of our lives).

Pastor's Corner

We are one body, many parts – each with a gift(s) for the benefit of all

In his letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul teaches that we all have special and unique gifts that serve God and his church in various and important ways. He said, "Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who empowers them all in everyone" (1 Corinthians 12:4-6). He then goes on to helpfully describe how this works using the analogy of our physical bodies. Just as the body is one and has many parts, so the church is one and has many members. And as each part of the body is critical for it to function well, so we are all critical as members of the Body of Christ. St. Paul teaches, "If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, yet one body" (1 Corinthians 17-19).

Our congregation has just completed our elections and I am looking forward to working with the boards as we carry out the work we have

been called to do. Each board and member works together to "...see that the services of God's house are held at proper times, that the Word of God is purely preached and taught... that the Sacraments of Christ are administered according to His institution...and to assist in caring for the poor and the sick, in cultivating harmony among the members, in promoting the general welfare of the congregation, and in furthering the kingdom of Christ here and throughout the world" (LSB Agenda).

I am thankful for the gifts God has given each of these members and for their willingness to serve Christ's Body with their unique skills. Please keep St. Paul's Lutheran Church in your prayers and support our efforts to the best of the abilities that God has given you, so that he may be glorified and his work be done in our midst.

Give thanks with a grateful heart

Give thanks with a grateful heart came to mind as I thought of what to share with you for October, very fitting as on October 9 we will celebrate Thanksgiving Sunday.

We learn from Scripture, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (James 1:17). Martin Luther simplifies this by saying "God the Father, giver of life and all good things."

With that in mind, I have decided to reflect on the three articles of the Apostles' Creed and the explanations written by Martin Luther in the Small Catechism as I ponder my thanksgiving to the Lord. Together it encompasses all and is better than any list I could come up with.

THE FIRST ARTICLE: CREATION I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth.

What does this mean?

I believe that God made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still preserves them; also clothing and shoes, meat and drink, house and home, wife and children, fields, cattle, and all my goods; that He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life; that He defends me against all danger, and guards and protects me from all evil; and all this purely out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any

merit or worthiness in me; for all which it is my duty to thank and praise, to serve and obey Him. This is most certainly true.

THE SECOND ARTICLE: REDEMPTION

I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried; He descended into hell; the third day He arose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from thence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Iesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord, who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His Kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, even as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true

THE THIRD ARTICLE: SANCTIFICATION

I believe in the Holy Ghost; the holy Christian Church, the communion

of saints; the forgiveness of sins; the resurrection of the body; and the life everlasting. Amen.

What does this mean?

I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord or come to Him; but the Holy Ghost has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the one true faith; even as He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith; in which Christian Church He daily and richly forgives all sins to me and all believers, and will at the Last Day raise up me and all the dead, and give unto me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly true.

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 16-18).

Note to the reader:

If some of the wording is slightly different than you recall, I have used an older version of Luther's Small Catechism that was used when my children were confirmed, which was slightly revised in 1965 and I know has been slightly revised since then to reflect modern day English.

In addition, we are hoping to reconnect with members of the congregation who have not been able to worship in person over the past several years as a result of the pandemic.

We wish everyone a happy and blessed Thanksgiving. We continue to be thankful for the ministry that Pastor Keith provides to St. Paul's in carrying out the ministry of word and sacrament to the congregation.

"We Are All Beggars"

In the early morning hours of Feb. 18, 1546, Martin Luther closed his eyes forever. Before that happened, the hand that hammered the 95 Theses into the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on Oct. 31, 1517, penned its final words: "We are all beggars. This is true." And this is the truth that our Lord says makes you free.

Ironic, isn't it? In order to be free, you must be a beggar. You must be utterly dependent and reliant upon God. This makes us uncomfortable – the way we're uncomfortable when someone gets us a Christmas present when we haven't gotten them one. We feel we

owe them. And we don't like being in someone's debt like that.

But what Luther would remind us is that we are all indeed beggars. And we're not just anyone's beggars. We're God's beggars. Christ came for sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He came to heal the sick and raise the dead. He came for sinners, and He dwells only with sinners.

If we are to be where He is, we must be willing to be counted among the lost, the sick, and the dead. We must be willing to be beggars. We must cry out for mercy, for grace, and for his undeserved

Stewardship, continued love and kindness. We must be dependent solely on Him and what He gives.

And here's the beauty: He gives us everything. Everything. Forgiveness of sins, salvation from death and the devil, and eternal life. This isn't because of any worthiness or merit in us. It is because of His divine goodness, mercy, and grace. On account of Christ's death and resurrection, the Father forgives you, saves you, and is pleased with you. You receive His love, His righteousness, His holiness, His acceptance, and His inheritance. We are all beggars. This is true.

his is the heart and soul of Christianity and the lifeblood of the Christian Church. God justifies us and declares us innocent and righteous by His grace received through faith for the sake of Christ. This isn't because of our works but because of His work on the cross. We, who once were enemies of God, are reconciled to Him and made to be His children.

This is what Luther pointed us to when He took up his pen for the last time and scribbled "We are all beggars. This is true." We are beggars, but we are beggars of the God who does not ignore us and who doesn't pass by us on the other side. We are beggars of the One who descended from heaven to make His dwelling with sinners.

We are beggars of Him who deigns to dwell with us, among us, and – yes – still in us by grace

for Christ's sake. For in the bread and cup that we bless we share together with Christ and each other the riches of God's grace. The riches of this grace – the Gospel in sermon and absolution, in Baptism, and in Holy Communion – are so inexhaustible that our cups overflow. We, who are God's beggars, are inexhaustibly satisfied, and we have something to give back in thanksgiving and praise.

As usual, check the back of this newsletter (online) for Pastor Cooper's activity sheets for October 2021. If you're at church, you can pick them up on a table at the back of the church.


