








HOLY BAPTISM

THE EXHORTATION BCP, p. 162

The Priest says to the People

Dearly beloved, the Scripture teacheth us that we were all dead in our sins and trespasses, but by grace we may be saved through faith. Our Savior Jesus Christ saith, "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God"; and he commissioned the Church to "teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." Here we ask our heavenly Father that these Candidates, being baptized with water, may be filled with the Holy Ghost, born again, and received into the Church as living members of Christ's body. Therefore, I beseech you to call upon God the Father, through our Lord Jesus Christ, that of his abundant mercy he will grant to these Candidates that which by nature they cannot have.

THE PRESENTATION AND PROFESSION OF FAITH

BCP, p. 162

The Priest says

The Candidates for Holy Baptism will now be presented.

Godparents and Sponsoring Parents

I present Seabrook Delaney Smith Hutson to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

I present Phillip Mason Cressman to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

I present Silas Beckett Cressman to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

I present Sophie Noelle Cressman to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

The Priest says

Today, on behalf of these children, you shall make vows to renounce the devil and all his works, to trust God wholeheartedly, and to serve him faithfully. It is your task to see that these children are taught, as soon as they are able to learn, the meaning of all these vows, and of the Faith that you will profess as revealed in the Holy Scriptures. They must come to put their faith in Jesus Christ, and learn the Creeds, the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, and all other things that a Christian ought to know, believe, and do for the welfare of their souls. When they have embraced all these, they are to come to the Bishop to be confirmed, that they may publicly claim the Faith for their own and be further strengthened by the Holy Spirit to serve Christ and his kingdom.

Are you willing and ready to undertake this?

Godparents and Sponsoring Parents

I am, the Lord being my helper.

The Priest then examines the Godparents and Sponsoring Parents who will speak on behalf of the infants.

Question Do you renounce the devil and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?

Answer I renounce them.

Question Do you renounce the empty promises and deadly deceits of this world that corrupt and

destroy the creatures of God?

Answer I renounce them.

Question Do you renounce the sinful desires of the flesh that draw you from the love of God?

Answer I renounce them.

The Priest prays over the Candidates and may anoint each Candidate with the Oil of Exorcism, saying

Almighty God deliver thee from the powers of darkness and evil, and lead thee into the light and obedience of the kingdom of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

Question Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Lord and Savior?

Answer I do.

Question Do you joyfully receive the Christian Faith, as revealed in the Holy Scriptures of the Old

and New Testaments?

Answer I do.

Question Will you obediently keep God's holy will and commandments, and walk in them all the

days of your life?

Answer I will, the Lord being my helper.

The Priest then addresses the Congregation, first inviting them to stand.

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ?

People We will.

Priest Let us join with these Candidates to proclaim our faith in the words of the ancient baptismal confession, the Apostles' Creed.

Priest Do you believe and trust in God the Father?

People I do. I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Priest Do you believe and trust in Jesus Christ?

People I do. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord; who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried. He descended into hell. The third day he rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty. From thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

Priest Do you believe and trust in the Holy Ghost?

People I do. I believe in the Holy Ghost, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

A person appointed leads the following petitions

Leader That all these candidates may continue in the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers.

People We beseech thee to hear us, Good Lord.

Leader That they may walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which they have been called, ever growing in faith and all heavenly virtues.

People We beseech thee to hear us, Good Lord.

Leader That they may persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever they fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord.

People We beseech thee to hear us, Good Lord.

Leader That they may proclaim by word and deed the Good News of God in Christ Jesus to a lost and broken world.

People We beseech thee to hear us, Good Lord.

Leader That as living members of the Body of Christ, they may grow up in every way into him who is the head.

People We beseech thee to hear us, Good Lord.

Leader That, looking to Jesus, they may run with endurance the race set before them, and at the last receive the unfading crown of glory.

People We beseech thee to hear us, Good Lord.

Other petitions may be added.

PRAYER FOR THE CANDIDATES

BCP, p. 167

The Priest now prays for the Candidates as follows

Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting Father, who of thy great mercy didst save Noah and his family in the ark from perishing by water, thereby prefiguring the Sacrament of Holy Baptism; We beseech thee, for thine infinite mercies, that thou wilt mercifully look upon these thy servants. Wash them and sanctify them with the Holy Ghost, that they, being delivered from thy wrath, may be received into the Ark of Christ's Church; and being steadfast in faith, joyful through hope, and rooted in charity, may so pass the waves of this troublesome world, that finally they may come to the land of everlasting life, there to reign with thee world without end; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

The Congregation is seated.

THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER

BCP, p. 168

Priest The Lord be with you.

People And with thy spirit.

Priest Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them up unto to the Lord.

Priest Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

People It is meet and right so to do.

The Priest continues

We thank thee, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation; through it thou didst lead the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise, and in it thy Son Jesus received the baptism of John in the River Jordan when the Holy Spirit descended upon him as a dove.

We thank thee, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are made regenerate by the Holy Ghost. Therefore in joyful obedience to thy Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

Here the Priest touches the water and says

Now, Father, sanctify this water by the power of thy Holy Spirit, and grant that all who are baptized here be cleansed from sin, be born again, and continue for ever faithful in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior; to whom, with thee, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, be all honor and glory, world without end. *Amen.*

THE BAPTISM BCP, p. 169

The Candidates are presented by name to the Priest, who then baptizes them.

When the Candidates have been baptized, the Priest prays over them, saying

Heavenly Father, we thank thee that by water and the Holy Ghost thou hast bestowed upon these thy servants the forgiveness of sin, received them as thine own children by adoption, made them members of thy holy Church, and raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in thy Holy Spirit, that they may enjoy everlasting salvation through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

Priest Let us welcome the newly baptized.

People We receive you into the fellowship of the Church. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in the royal priesthood of all his people.

THE COMMUNION OF THE PEOPLE

All baptized Christians are warmly invited to receive Communion at the high altar or the standing stations in either one kind (bread only) or both kinds (bread and wine). You may stand or kneel to receive Communion. To receive the bread in the traditional way, please place your right palm over your left and the bread will be placed in your palm. You may consume the bread and drink from the chalice (please grasp the bottom of the chalice firmly and guide it to your mouth), or you may leave the bread in your palm and then dip it into the wine when the chalice is brought to you. Those who are not baptized or do not wish to receive Communion (including children who do not yet receive) are welcome to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

Washington Light Infantry

St. Philip's welcomes the members of the Washington Light Infantry joining us in worship this morning.

Organized in 1807, the Washington Light Infantry (WLI) is one of the nation's oldest militia units. The citizens of Charleston, anticipating a second war with Britain, organized a number of volunteers corps, one of which was the Washington Light Infantry, and it alone survives.

The WLI was named in honor of George Washington, and his birthday, February 22nd, has been observed annually by the WLI with a military banquet. A Memorial Service for passed members is held the Sunday before February 22nd.

The Eutaw Flag was borne by another Washington, Colonel William Washington, who was a cousin of General George Washington. The origin of the flag is surrounded by a halo of romance. When on a hasty visit to his fiancée, Miss Jane Elliott, daughter of Colonel Charles Elliott, whose plantation home "Sandy Hill" was a large estate near Charleston, S.C., he mentioned that he did not have a flag for his troop. Seizing her scissors, she cut from the end of a rich damask curtain this square of crimson silk saying, "Let this be your flag!" To Colonel Washington it was a gift without price. Not only was it to be a flag of his troop, but it was a love token of fealty to her and loyalty to his country, and thereafter, until the close of the war, it waved in the forefront of every battle in which his command was engaged, including Cowpens and Eutaw Springs.

With the Sumter Guards of Charleston (1819), the WLI appoints officers to the Board of Field Officers of the Fourth Brigade of the South Carolina Militia. This Board, established in 1822, has owned its Marion Square drill field in Charleston since 1833.

On April 19, 1827, the widow of Colonel William Washington of the Revolution, assigned her husband's battle to the Washington Light Infantry. Today the flag is still preserved as the WLI's most precious relic.

In 1842, the Washington Light Infantry greatly assisted in the establishment of the South Carolina Military Academy (now known as The Citadel), and in 1843 relinquished the guard of the Citadel building to the new Cadet Corps.

The Washington Light Infantry has participated as a unit with honor and bravery in almost every major war this country has fought since 1807. Many members of the WLI are veterans of combat in Vietnam, Iraq, and Afghanistan.

Obeying the authority of the State of South Carolina, when the War Between the States developed in 1861-65, the Washington Light Infantry formed themselves into three companies for the war. The total number of men enrolled was four hundred and fourteen, and at the close of the struggle its casualties numbered one hundred and fourteen killed, and many others maimed and scarred for life. Official records show frequent citations of acts of individual heroism and deeds of sublime courage on the part of the Washington Light Infantry officers and men.

The war over, the survivors returned to their homes, and in 1866 they formed what was called the Washington Light Infantry Charitable Association, the first organization of its kind in the South, to assist the families of those who had fallen or who were disabled by the war.

In addition to serving its country in every military engagement, the Washington Light Infantry has had the honor of participating as a military unit in centennial and bicentennial celebrations and ceremonial parades all over the nation. It commemorated its own bicentennial in 2007, with parade, banquet and ball.

The WLI today, combining social and military features, celebrates patriotic holidays as well as The Citadel's Corps Day, the Carolina Day, and the reading of the Declaration of Independence at the Old Exchange on July 4th. Annual scholarships are presented to students at The Citadel and the American College of the Buildings Arts.

The WLI is a charter member of the Centennial Legion of Historic Military Commands. The purposes of the Legion are to carry on the original motives of the military commands of the thirteen original colonies, who, on July 4, 1876, at the Nation's Centennial at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, organized the Centennial Legion to perpetuate the military organizations who served and protected our country in the early days of its history prior to, during and subsequent to the Revolutionary War, and to unite together such military commands as shall exist, or their successors, in one body, pledged to keep alive their ancient traditions and to preserve the records of their military achievements; to foster patriotism, encourage National Defense, and aid in upholding the national institutions of the United States in their integrity; to keep alive a spirit of fraternity and benevolence among the armed forces of the United States; to incubate respect for its flag and constitution, and obedience to constituted authority; to recognize and honor all citizens who have served or are serving in any branch of the Armed or Military Services or Reserves of the several States or of the United States; to uphold allegiance to the United States of America and to defend the same against all enemies, foreign or domestic.
