

A Brief History of Suffolk Christian Church 1860-2022



Suffolk Christian Church (SCC) was founded in 1860 by the Reverend William Brock Wellons, D.D. (1821-1877). In Surry County 66 years earlier, the Reverend James O'Kelly broke away from the Methodist Episcopal Church to found the Christian Church based on Five Cardinal Principles:

- 1. The Lord Jesus Christ as the only Head of the Church.
- 2. The name Christian to the exclusion of all party and sectarian names.
- 3. The Holy Bible, or the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament as our only creed, and sufficient rule of faith and practice.
- 4. Christian character, or vital piety, the only test of church fellowship and membership.
- 5. The right of private judgment, and the liberty of conscience, the privilege and duty of all. These principles have guided members of Christian Churches for more than two centuries with a later addition:
 - 6. Union of all Christ's followers is sought.

Already the founding minister at Bethlehem Christian Church, Dr. Wellons organized a church with 22 members at his home on Kilby Street (now West Washington Street) in Suffolk. His warm and positive preaching style combined with eloquence and energy earned him a reputation as a "great revivalist" preaching at churches across the region. The first church building was dedicated on the present site on the Sabbath, March 10, 1861.

Dr. Wellons was a tolerant man in religion who often visited other churches, Protestant and Catholic, when traveling and not himself preaching; but as apparent in his articles in *The Christian Sun*, his weekly regional religious newspaper, he believed that God favored the South in the Civil War. He and his family left Suffolk after Union troops took control of the town in 1862 and he served as a chaplain in the Confederate Army. In his absence a Union chaplain briefly used the church. When Dr. Wellons returned, he worked with other area clergymen to revive their congregations and strengthen the Christian churches. Like his brother James (1826-1927) in North Carolina, he preached and established more congregations, white and black, in the area and served as their minister until his death.

The congregation dedicated a new sanctuary in the Romanesque revival style for 600 worshipers in 1894. This style includes rounded arches, relatively small semi-circular windows, brick exterior, shallow-pitched roofs, yet unlike the original Romanesque churches, limited external ornamentation. Inspired by southern European churches of the 11th and 12th centuries, the style was popular in the late 19th century for college buildings and among "low church" congregations -- those that allow more individual latitude in religious belief and practice. The façade was remodeled and tall brick towers and vestibule were added in 1912. The original 1893 pipe organ has been renovated several times and continues to undergird the music ministry. Twice in the 20th century donors gave each a Neo-Gothic stained-glass window from the venerable Willet Studio for the sanctuary.



SCC members founded and contributed to educational institutions in the region including the coeducational Suffolk Collegiate Institute in 1872. While minister at SCC, the Reverend William Wesley Staley, D.D. (1849-1932) served as the non-resident and unpaid president of Elon College, traveling by train at his own expense to Elon at the start of each week and returning to Suffolk to minister to church members and preach on Sundays from 1894-1905. He brought the college through very difficult financial times. For over a century SCC has sent students to present day Elon University for an education.

Deacon Junius Edgar West (1866-1947), a prominent citizen of Suffolk, served two terms as Virginia's Lieutenant Governor and for nearly 50 years on the Board of Trustees of Elon College and of the State Female Normal School, the present-day Longwood University.

Through the years, the church has responded to the growing needs of the congregation and expanded the facilities several times. In 1993, the church began a process of prayer and study to discover God's will concerning the future of the church in downtown Suffolk. The building was showing its age and was not up to modern standards of access and accommodation. The "Building for Tomorrow" committee led the church to commit to our downtown location and begin the process for a major renovation and elevator tower addition.

Today we work together with the same cardinal Principles restated in our church constitution: "the Lord Jesus Christ as the only head of the Church; Christian as a sufficient name; Christian character as a sufficient test of membership and fellowship; the Bible as a sufficient rule of faith and practice; individual interpretation of the Scriptures as the right and privilege of every believer; and the unity of all Christians." This is further stated in our mission statement, "Our Mission is to go and make disciples of Jesus Christ by sharing God's grace, love, and forgiveness," and demonstrated by the fruit of our works.





Data Collected through Church Windows




Active Membership by Area

THE COMMUNITY OF SUFFOLK, VA

History

As Virginia's largest City, Suffolk is 430 square miles of rich land with woods, lakes, rivers, and rolling terrain - not to mention wise development and the use of it - that make this area bountiful for residents and businesses alike. Our schools and parks, neighborhoods, health care facilities and utilities help create a successful community. In fact, some of the region's most prosperous companies already call Suffolk home. The great potential for growth is attracting many new businesses and employees. This is a place full of pride, full of promise. Suffolk is a place where progressive isn't just a description, it's an attitude. It's a place with vision. It's Suffolk, Virginia. You're welcome to join us.

Seal of Suffolk (*Designed by Deacon Emeritus Herbert L. Briggs*) The seal showcases important founding dates:

- 1646 for Nansemond County
- 1742 for Suffolk
- 1974 for the consolidated City of Suffolk

In the seal, the tractor represents our agriculture, the helmet our history, the fish for recreation, the gears for industry, and the peanut signifies the importance of the crop.



Nansemond River

Native Americans lived off the bountiful land in Suffolk. Back in 1609, the Nansemond Indians drove out Captain John Smith, who was interested in the oyster beds in the Nansemond River. This river, the commerce it helped create, and the English settlers who recognized the opportunity they would have here, gave birth in 1742 to the Town of Suffolk, named after Governor William Gooch's home of Suffolk County, England.

City Establishment

Burned by the British in 1779 and damaged by other fires throughout the next century, Suffolk survived to become a city in 1910. In 1974, it became the present City of Suffolk, consolidating with the towns of Holland and Whaleyville, and the County of Nansemond. The end result was a new municipality encompassing a total of 430 square miles, making it the largest city in land area in Virginia and the 11th largest in the country.

Peanut Processing

In 1912, an Italian immigrant named Amedeo Obici moved from Pennsylvania to Suffolk and opened Planters Nut and Chocolate Company. Today, Suffolk remains a major peanut processing center and transportation hub.

Demographics

There are 91,383 residents in Suffolk. The residents are 48.9% white, not Hispanic or Latino; 41.46% African American; 9.7% other, including American Indian, Asian, 2+ races and Hispanic/Latino



FACILITIES 216 N. MAIN STREET



Suffolk Christian Church is a threestoried building located at 216 North Main Street in the heart of downtown Suffolk. There are entrances to the paved parking lots with handicapped parking on either side of the church. A landscaped garden is on the north side of the building leading to one of three entrances. The parking area on the north side includes a covered walkway to the entrance with a community playground next to the walkway. The doors in the front of the church are opened for Sunday worship services and special occasions and lead to the sanctuary.

The third entrance is from the south parking lot with a covered walkway. The first floor includes a foyer, offices, library, conference room, classrooms, food pantry, and restrooms.










One elevator on the first floor offers entrance to the second floor. A second elevator offers entrance to the fellowship hall and kitchen as well as entrance to the second and third floors.







The second floor includes the beautiful sanctuary, music and choir room, entrance by steps to the third floor, restrooms, a parlor, classrooms and access to the bell towers. The third floor includes the balcony, restrooms, classrooms and a foyer next to the elevator. The bell tower of the church can be seen from several locations and the bells can be heard throughout the community.





There are two stairways on the first floor; one, leading to the sanctuary and one to the fellowship hall and a large, updated commercial kitchen with ample pantry space.




ECONOMIC ASSETS

Our church operates financially on a monthly general operating budget which provides primarily for staff and building operation and maintenance. The building and surrounding land is debt free.

OUR FUTURE

In November 2021 we embarked on a transition process in our church. We have held four town hall meetings to review and gain strength from our past; to examine our present by identifying our personal and material assets and acknowledging our challenges; and identifying our hopes for the future.

Suffolk Christian Church was established in 1860 and in the ensuing 162 years the church and its people have experienced wars, economically challenging times and vast cultural changes. Yet, through it all, the people have known the joys of fellowship and a Christian-based faith in our present and future, blessings of growth, expanded facilities, and programs that not only served the church membership but, also, reached outside the church in response to community needs.

We appreciate the beauty and history of our church; the importance of traditional liturgy and beautiful music in our worship services; our central location in the downtown area; the many and varied programs offered to our membership and the opportunities for support and special relationships for our church members and larger community. Our members are affiliated with numerous civic, social and cultural organizations whose missions are allied with those of our church. Hence, we have multiple opportunities for cooperation in meeting the needs of our community. We, also recognize the value in working with other churches as we have done in recent years in providing help for the homeless.

Our hope for the future is to find ways to utilize our building more fully and faithfully, and to expand our missions beyond the walls of the church. We believe that with leadership and guidance provided by our new pastor we can help build community and serve our neighbors through expanded support for the following:

- Increased ministries to our growing homeless population
- Partnership with local schools to support and enhance educational opportunities in K-12
- Alternative worship services
- Creative ways to increase our membership

Our congregation is willing to consider ways to utilize our building more fully and to take our message beyond the walls of the church but at the same time maintaining the traditions of the church.
