#### Read 2 Thessalonians 1:1-2

For these lessons, the sermon text is provided in a format that visually helps display the structure of the paragraph or section of text. The main verbs are underlined. Commands are double-underlined. Generally, the main indicative clauses remain to the left, and the other clauses are either directly underneath when they have equal priority to what comes before, or are tabbed to the right when the clause supports, develops, or draws a conclusion from a neighboring clause.

	9.	Look at the diagram on the first page of the study guide. Notice the preposition "to" in both verse 1 & 2. The word to comes from the Greek "dative" case and indicates an indirect object. How is this helpful to understand the opening of this letter? Are there any verbs in these verses? What verb is implied?  (Remember: an indirect object "receives" the action of the verb, and is not the "thing" being
		acted" upon. For example see the sentence, "Bob threw Jim the ball." Bob did not throw Jim, but instead he threw the ball. Jim is the indirect object receiving the action "threw.")
	10.	Building on the previous question, what does Paul mean by "grace to you" as an introduction of this letter? (hint: look at 2 Thessalonians 3:18, 1 Thessalonians 1:1, 1 Thessalonians 5:28)

	11. Why does Paul connect grace and peace?
	12. Looking at the diagram from the beginning of this homework, what is the only difference in verse 1 and 2 in the phrases "God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ"?
	13. Building on the question above, what is the difference in meaning between "in" and "from" in these phrases?
	14. Meditate on the rich position we have as a church of Christ and how that should shape our thinking and actions every moment of every day. List several implications.
	15. Summarize the book of 2 Thessalonians in one sentence. See if your synthesis matches Bret's main idea in his sermon. If you are ambitious, attempt to summarize the book into its different sections/parts/big supporting ideas in the form of a simple outline.
