Our school theme “Fit for Battle” guided speakers as they challenged students to consider what it takes to equip themselves to push back the darkness caused by sin. This year TBCA had the honor of hosting pastors from local churches such as City Park Church, Shady Grove, Life Community, Two Cities, Griffith Baptist, Awaken Church, and Triad Baptist Church. At various times this year, our teachers were given the opportunity to share their personal testimonies and answer questions from students. These testimony times allowed students to get to know their teachers on a deeper level, and hear how God has guided each of them to this point in their life. One of the highlights this year was TBCA’s student worship band planning and leading an entire Christmas worship chapel, featuring classic Christmas hymns, Scripture reading, and prayer. This year’s student worship team set a new standard in excellence for years to come.

DAILY BIBLE CLASS STUDIES

Middle school students have had the opportunity to see the grand view of Scripture and the significant details of Scripture in their studies, all with the goal of pointing them to Jesus. Our sixth grade students started with Genesis and moved through each book of the Bible to learn how it all fits together as one story. Seventh graders took the book of Proverbs and applied the principles of Scripture to topics such as: home life, honoring their parents, friends, work ethic, money, and leadership. The eighth grade class spent the year doing an in-depth study of the life of Christ, to learn who Jesus is and what we claimed to be.

Our high school Bible classes featured a new template to help direct students on their journey of faith. Freshman were taught the basic doctrines from the Bible, to help provide a theological framework as they start their high school career. The next two years feature a survey of the Old Testament and the New Testament, to give students a overarching view of all of God’s Word. Finally, the senior class explored the depths of a biblical worldview and applied to modern issues, and compared it with other worldviews that are the prevailing belief systems of the day. TBCA’s goal through this entire sequence of Bible curriculum is for each student to be ready to enter the world knowing what they believe, how to apply their faith, and how to defend their faith.

SALVATION AND BAPTISM

Throughout the course of the year God has moved in the hearts of students as they have been challenged to consider what does it mean to be a believer in Jesus. Four students, on separate occasions, approached our school’s staff and trusted Christ as their Savior. Four students were baptized at Triad Baptist Church making a public declaration of their faith in Christ. Throughout the year there were countless other conversations

and interactions with many students who are on the verge of placing their faith in Christ. Pray with us for those students, and praise God for his continued work of drawing students to himself. There are many TBCA students, already following Christ, who are deepening their commitment to Christ because of the ministry of our school.

SERVICE AND MISSIONS

Throughout the year students have put the love of Christ into action. Students worked to clean the school campus and church building, delivered Thanksgiving meals to several families in need, served with the Hope Center, Griffith Baptist Church, and Sunnyside Ministry in downtown Winston-Salem. Finally, a group of seniors ended their time at TBCA with a mission trip to the Dominican Republic. While there they led a Vacation Bible School for young kids and shared the gospel with many children and adults seeking hope in an impoverished country.





ELEMENTARY ACTIVITIES

THE GREAT ADVENTURE

The 2023-2024 school year allowed the elementary division to grow by hiring 12 full-time lead teachers and 4 full-time teacher assistants. God is so good. We have been so blessed to have 4 full-time specialists dedicated to their specific area of expertise and 1 full-time specialist who served in a dual role.

The TBCA Elementary division has continued to build on the knowledge that our students have of God's Word. Each grade level utilized the Bible curriculum published by Bob Jones which is built on events that occurred in the Bible story. The fifth graders also incorporate two Bible studies that help them know who they are in Jesus and how they can live for him. This year's chapels have incorporated students in leading in pledges, song motions, and sound booth/slide operation. On the first of each month, a character trait has been pulled from a series called Soul Food, as the students have learned exactly what feeds our souls and helps us as we grow in our knowledge and faith in Jesus. Just as the Bible promises, the moments invested in teaching the Bible did not return void. We had three students ask Jesus in their hearts!



There were numerous opportunities for TBCA families to cultivate relationships with each other and staff members. This year we had our second curriculum night hosted by our k-5 teachers. The purpose of this night was to introduce the hot topics of the year and provide guidance as to how to assist each student in having a successful school year in all areas, academically, socially, emotionally, and mentally. We also continued to communicate with our families with the elementary newsletter which highlighted school events and also recognized the weekly star students of each classroom. Once per month, student birthdays were celebrated in chapel, and each student received a present from Mrs. Locklear, our Elementary Principal. Teachers also chose one STAR STUDENT per class. These students were given a special shout-out by Mrs. Locklear, a certificate, and two unique treasures that allowed them to be proud of their good choices and kindness.

A variety of extracurricular opportunities allowed students to cultivate their own God-given interests and abilities. We increased from two elementary after-school clubs to TEN! These included 4-H, Cheer, Battle of

the Books, K-2 Art, 3-5 Art, K-2 Steam, 3-5 Stem, Lego, Comic, and Imago Dei. Each club met twice a month allowing each student to utilize their God-given potential as they invested in investigations or hone talents that God has blessed them with. Each club was unique to its topic, but were ran by amazing parent volunteers who had a passion to make a difference in the lives of our youngest TBCA students. From guest speakers to special projects and events, these clubbers enjoyed participating a quality experience that allowed them to grow and develop for God's glory. For a second year, a fall and spring program was highlighting the talents of our youngest elementary students to our older students. The fall play highlighted our second-grade students with speaking roles, while our kinder and first graders learned songs and performed as a group. In the spring, the Third, Fourth and Fifth graders also presented a musical. The fifth graders

were the actors and the third and fourth graders served as the chorus. Both plays allowed our students to show off their talents while presenting a Gospel-filled message that reminded all in attendance of the love of Jesus and His plan for our lives.

In the classrooms, teachers engaged their students using multiple styles of learning which equipped them with knowledge and applicable practice. The teachers eagerly used their training in The Comprehension Playbook, to incorporate common verbiage and strategies during reading instruction. We added a special pull-out focus group in our first and second-grade classes to help support students who needed more time to develop their phonics skills and use those skills to become more fluent readers. This focus group also allowed our classroom teachers to better support all students to learn and grow to their potential. We also began to incorporate guided math which embraces learners where they are in their mathematical journey and cultivates growth based on each one's needs. Science and social studies continued to be hands-on as we recognize that these content areas are so important to their development as contributors to a community and the society at large.

As we prepare for the 2024-2025 school year, we are excited to be hosting another Smekens professional development series. A representative from The Smekens Group will return to campus to conduct a writing workshop honing our reading teacher's skills as they learn to better integrate writing into our reading and thinking so that our students can better facilitate their thoughts to convey meaning beyond the books that we read and the lessons that we learn.

The SGA sponsored the annual Powderpuff football and volleyball games. The football game was held in the fall and featured the senior and sophomore girls versus the junior and freshman girls in a flag football game. The volleyball game was held in the spring and matched the senior boys versus the junior boys in a volleyball game. All donations from these games went to help TBCA and other local families dealing with cancer.



Each semester the Upper School students had the chance to participate in a fun day. During the first semester, students went bowling. During the second semester, students participated in the annual Titan games which are a competition among the grades.

The annual spirit week and homecoming is January is always a highlight of the school year. Students participated in Disney Day, Pajama Day, Favorite Holiday Day, USA Day, and Titan Spirit Day. The week ended with homecoming basketball games and the presentation of the Homecoming court. *Tale as Old as Time*, Homecoming 2024, brought a fairy tale to life as SGA took the lead and transformed the Titan's center court into a balcony fit for the Homecoming Representatives of 2024. The nostalgic setting was based on the Disney movie and music of *Beauty and the Beast*. For the first time, both Homecoming Court Queen and King from 2023 had a part in crowning this year's Homecoming Queen, Miss Peyton Colenzo and Homecoming King, Mr. Isaac Vaughn.



STEAM night was held in February this year. STEAM night is a night to showcase the student's abilities in Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math. Student's artwork and science fair projects were on display in the gym. The elementary and middle school choirs also performed.

The annual Junior/Senior Banquet was held in May at the historic JH Adams Hotel in High Point. Juniors and Seniors enjoyed a night dressing up and celebrating the senior class.

Each week students have the opportunity to attend clubs that they joined at the beginning of the year. Middle school clubs this year were Acts of Kindness, Crafting, Math, Pep, Reading, Strategy games, and Typing clubs. The high school clubs were Board Games, Fantasy Sports, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Foreign Language, Kids, Logic Games, and Ratio Christi clubs. Students also had the opportunity to be inducted into the Junior National Honor Society and the Senior National Honor Society based on their academics, leadership, service, and character.

LEADERSHIP

Triad Baptist Christian Academy strives to help students become the leaders God desires them to be. All Upper School Students attend leadership training with their homeroom teacher every other week. Students are taught the characteristics that successful leaders possess and how to influence their peers correctly.

A select group of high school students are chosen each year by leadership and serve as mentors to the middle school students and other high school students. These mentors meet with other students in small groups every other week. The mentors lead in a time of prayer and then lead students through a book called "Survival Quest".

SGA

The Student Government Association is another avenue for students to learn and demonstrate leadership skills. Each year in the Spring the student body elects a President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the SGA. Students also elect two representatives from each grade to represent their grade on the SGA. The SGA plans many activities at the school such as the Powderpuff football and volleyball games, the See You at the Pole event, pep rallies, spirit week, spirit days, and homecoming. SGA students also lead the students in morning pledges and make announcements using the school PA system. The SGA also sponsors a booth at the Triad Baptist Church annual Fall Festival.

PRAISE BAND

Another way that students could lead was by being a part of the praise band. The praise band led music at chapels and members of the class helped with all the audio and video needs.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

TBCA was granted a charter for the National Honor Society in 2016. Students in grades 10-12 are eligible for consideration. To be invited to apply to the NHS, a student must have a 3.5 unweighted GPA. Candidates are evaluated based on service, leadership, character, and citizenship. On February 2nd, 13 students were inducted into the NHS. NC State Treasurer Dale Folwell was the main speaker. He challenged students to be servant leaders. Students who are granted membership are required to complete 10 additional hours of community service to comply with NHS expectations.

NATIONAL JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY

TBCA was also granted a charter for the Junior National Honor Society in 2019. Students in grades 7-8 are eligible for consideration. To be considered for the Junior National Honor Society a student must have at least 90 percent average. Candidates are evaluated based on service, leadership, character, and citizenship. On February 21st, 24 middle school students were inducted into the NJHS. Students who are granted membership will be required to complete 10 additional hours of community service to comply with NJHS expectations.

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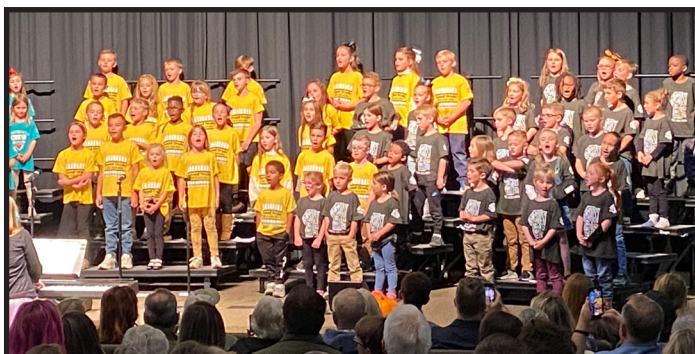

This year, our elementary students will participate in the NCCSA Fine Art Festival. Students will compete in art, chorus, vocal solo, small and large ensemble, Bible sword drills, spelling and poetry recitation. This is twice the number of entries we had last year! There was continued growth in TBCA Athletics during the 2023-2024 school year as we added four new teams to our offerings and had more student-athletes to participate than ever before. The new teams offered this year included Junior Varsity Volleyball, Junior Varsity Boys Basketball, Middle School Girls Soccer, and Varsity Softball! Student-athlete participation was at an all-time high as we had 94 of our 5th-12th grade students participating during the fall season, 81 participating during the winter season, and 54 participating during the spring season!

Our Varsity teams completed their third year in the North Carolina Christian School (NCCSA) and continued to make progress in our overall program with strong advancements in postseason play. Both our Varsity Boys Soccer team and Varsity Boys Basketball team each had 21-win seasons and were Semifinalists in their NCCSA State Tournaments. Our Varsity Girls Basketball team had 14 wins and were Quarter finalists in their State Tournament. And

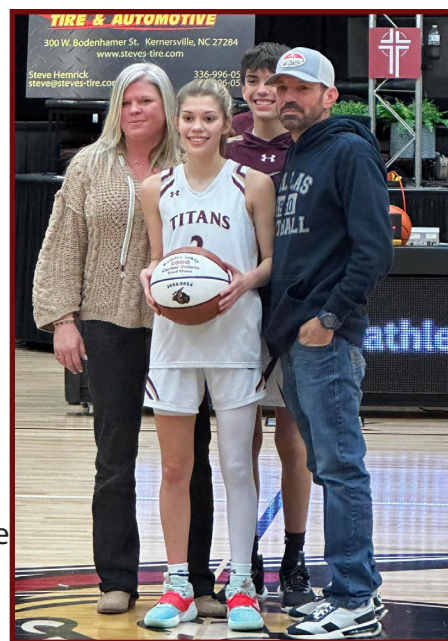
during the Spring season, our Varsity Girls Soccer and Varsity Baseball teams reached the Quarterfinals in their State Tournament.

Over Christmas break, the Varsity Boys & Girls Basketball teams both won the Championships of the 2024 Chick-Fil-A Titan Classic Basketball Tournament!!

Our Middle School teams continued to compete in the Central Carolina Independent School Athletic Association (CCISAA). Our MS Girls Volleyball team went undefeated during their regular season and then repeated as Champions of the CCISAA Conference Tournament!! Our MS Boys & Girls Basketball teams had the opportunity to participate in the NCCSA MS State Tournament and both finished as Semifinalists!

MILESTONES

We also had three milestones reached during Basketball season this past year which included two players scoring their 1,000th career point and a coach recording his 100th Varsity win at TBCA! On January 5th, 2024, Senior Kamdyn Lakey scored her 1,000th point in a home game versus Cramerton Christian. One month later on February 5th, 2024, Sophomore Jayden Pringle scored his 1,000th point in a home game versus Community Baptist. Then, on February 13th, 2024, our Varsity Boys Head Coach Michael Bowers recorded his 100th win at TBCA in a home game against Phoenix Academy!

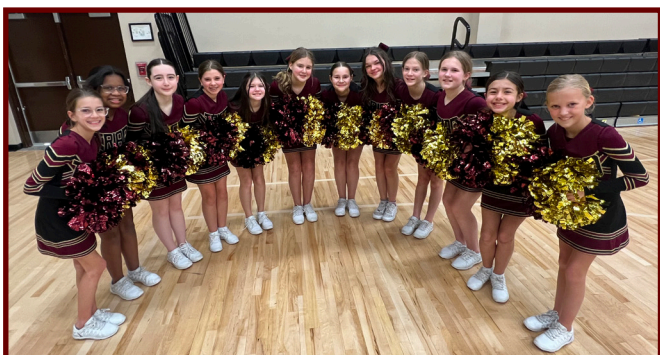

Coach Bowers Retires: Michael Bowers began his coaching career in 1996 at North Wilkes High School. In 2011 he began coaching the Triad Baptist Christian Academy Middle School Boys' Basketball team. At the time, TBCA only had Middle School sports. As the school continued to grow, so did athletic programs. Bowers formed and began coaching the TBCA Titans Varsity Boys' Basketball in 2015. In February, Coach Bowers was honored with his 100th TBCA Varsity victory when the Titans defeated Phoenix Academy.



FALL SPORTS REVIEW

Our fall sports teams all had very memorable seasons! The Varsity Boys Soccer team finished with 21 wins which is the best record for that sport in school history! They also reached the Semifinals in the NCCSA State Tournament which is the farthest we have ever advanced in our Boys Soccer program! Our Varsity Girls Volleyball team won 10 matches which is three more wins than the previous season. We also added a Junior Varsity Volleyball team to help our younger players develop and gain experience in preparation for Varsity-

level play. They won an amazing six matches in their first season of competition! Our Middle School teams had strong seasons as well, concluding with the MS Volleyball team going undefeated for the first time in any sport in TBCA history! They won all 16 matches played and won the CCISAA Volleyball Tournament for the second year in a row! The Cross Country program also reached new heights as we were able to have a Varsity and a MS team...both teams had more runners than ever before in school history! The Varsity XC team had 10 runners (5 Boys & 5 Girls), and the MS team had 15 runners (8 Boys & 7 Girls)!

WINTER SPORTS REVIEW

This year's winter sports season was also filled with several unforgettable moments! Our Varsity Boys Basketball team won the most games in program history with 21 wins, and they were able to win 14 in-a-row before they were heartbreakingly defeated in the Semifinals of the NCCSA State Tournament vs Hilltop Christian by a half-court buzzer beater! What a great season though!! The Varsity Girls basketball team also saw significant success posting 14 wins and joined the Varsity Boys as Champions of the Chick-Fil-A Titan Classic Tournament hosted by TBCA! We were also given the opportunity to host the 2A Varsity Boys Quarterfinals and 2A Varsity Boys & Girls Semifinals of the NCCSA State Tournament in February. As a very unique experience, our Varsity & JV Boys teams hosted teams from Australia...although both teams came up short against these opponents from "Down Under", our Boys were able to share a meal and hang out with them and their fans after the game! This was definitely something we would like to continue to do in the years to come. We also added a Junior Varsity Boys Basketball team that won 10 games and reached the postseason in its inaugural season! Our Middle School Boys and Girls Basketball team also had strong seasons with the MS Boys winning 11 games and the MS Girls winning 12 games! Both MS teams made it to the Semifinals of the first-ever NCCSA MS State Tournament!

SPRING SPORTS REVIEW

During the spring season, we were able to field four teams which included Varsity Girls Soccer, Varsity Baseball, Varsity Softball, and MS Girls Soccer. Our Varsity Girls Soccer team competed in their second season in the NCCSA. With a 7-7 record, they were able to defeat Tabernacle Christian in the Cross District Playoff match and advance to the Quarter-finals of the NCCSA State Tournament. Varsity Baseball played its first season in the NCCSA...Although the competition in the conference was fierce at times, we were able to gain a win in the Cross District Playoff vs Union Grove Christian to advance to the Quarterfinals of the State Tournament! In April, our students engaged in the Iowa Assessments as a way to measure academic knowledge compared to Christian schools both nationally and internationally. Students are tested in Reading, English Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies based on what students are expected to know at their grade level. The IOWA is a nationally normed test (not every concept taught was tested). To interpret the scores we look for 50% or below as a national average. The Stanine Score helps us know where our students compare to others.

It has been an exciting school year to serve the Preschool and Academy at TBCA. The food staff have been able to create a quality service with various options for all the students to enjoy. As we go throughout the year, we have learned what students want to have for meal options and accommodated them.

- We were able to offer an online menu ordering service through the FACTS portal.
- We offered new selections of Salads to choose from.
- New this year is that we offered various options of Wraps that come with a fruit option, a cookie, and milk.
- For the Main Entrée option, along with student favorites, we also offered options from different cultures for them to choose and enjoy.
- For the Alternative option, we added options like Corn Dog Nuggets and Ham & Cheese slider options.
- The “Free Lunch” meal in December was a nice opportunity to offer everyone lunch and was received well.
- The concession area has more options for snacks and drinks.
- Academy meals averaged 140 per meal; Preschool meals averaged 120 per meal.
- All the kitchen staff have completed the ServSafe program to be educated to handle food properly. It meets the Health Department’s requirements to operate the food service.
- We maintained a 100 rating on our inspection from the Forsyth County Health Department.
- The Preschool kitchen achieved a Superior rating from the NC State inspection.
- Food Service was able to accommodate special function meals for Teachers and Students as requested. The Sport Awards meals were a hit this year. Preparing special meals to honor the Seniors at the end of the school year is a blessing.

The Preschool kitchen was able to be renovated to create a cleaner and more efficient work area. Overall, we maintained a timely service to feed students. Teachers were thankful for the efficiency in which we served the students.

We will be maintaining a similar food program as we get into the new school year. As new challenges come we will adapt and continue to offer the students a quality food service. It is a blessing to serve the Triad Baptist Christian Academy ministry in Food Service. Helping the students grow through their school education is a blessing. NEW BUILDING

Triad Baptist Church and Christian Academy expanded in 2023 to better serve the residents of Kernersville and the greater Triad with the addition of a 32,000-square foot educational wing adjacent to the worship center. The \$7.1 million addition added three floors of classrooms and multipurpose space next to the current Worship Center.
