We believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God, begotten of his Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father; by whom all things were made; who for us and for our salvation came down from heaven, and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the virgin Mary, and was made man; and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate; he suffered and was buried: and the third day he rose again according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; and he shall come again, with glory, to judge both the living and the dead; whose kingdom shall have no end. And we believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son; who with the Father and the Son together is worshiped and glorified; who spoke by the prophets; and we believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church; we acknowledge one baptism for the remission of sins; and we look for the resurrection of the dead.

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TRINITARIAN GLOSSARY

essence: God's one, simple, undivided divine being

person: a subsisting relation—each fully God, distinguished from the others only by eternal relation (not by parts or rank)

trinity: there is one God existing in three distinct, co-equal persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. God is one **essence** (*what* God is) and three in **person** (*who* God is), distinguished only by eternal relations.

eternal relations of origin: the eternal relations by which the divine persons are distinguished: the Father is unbegotten, the Son is begotten, the Spirit proceeds

simplicity: God is not composed of parts; all that is in God is God. Each person of the Trinity is a subsistence of the one, simple, divine essence.

beget / only begotten: the Father *eternally* brings forth the Son—not by making or change, but by communicating the divine essence

eternal generation: from all eternity, the Father communicates the undivided divine essence to the Son; therefore the Son has "life in himself." (John 5:26)

inseparable operations: the three divine persons are without separation or division in their external operations toward the world

appropriation: attributing a work or attribute suitably to one person for clarity, without excluding the others

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
