Scripture: Matthew 9:9-13

Bottom Line: God is always for me in every situation.

INTRODUCTION/ICEBREAKER:

This week Pastor Adam discussed how cul-de-sacs can be a great place to build a home, but a terrible way to live. Cul-de-sacs got us thinking about our childhood neighborhoods. UNPACKING THE GOSPEL IN THE BIBLE:

Read Matthew 9:9-13

Everyone can relate to Matthew's story one way or another. He was a man who made mistakes in his life and undoubtedly regretted some of his decisions. He was a unjust tax collector who profited off his own people and was despised by many. Yet, he couldn't change his decision because the Romans would have punished him. He was stuck.

- 1) In what ways does Jesus interact with Matthew?
- **a.** Jesus comes to him Matthew didn't go to Jesus. Jesus came to Matthew. Why is this important (Romans 5:6; Galatians 4:3 Jesus doesn't pursue to punish, but to save).
- **b.** Jesus sees him Jesus sees and knows the real you.
- **c.** Jesus wants to be with him Jesus wasn't afraid of Matthew's mess, didn't ask Matthew to clean himself up and he loved the real version of Matthew.
- 2) Do you believe Jesus wants to be with you/is for you in the same way he was towards Matthew? Why or why not?
- Read and trust the truth of Scripture Rom. 8:31; Luke 1:37; Philippians 4:13; Mark 10:27
- 3) How does real change come into our lives?
- a. When we are truly known and loved by God.
- b. The cross says you are so wanted and loved that Jesus would die for you.
