o God Be the Glory is one of the most well-known of Fanny Crosby's more than eight thousand hymns.

As mentioned before ("Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross" - August 2024), Crosby was made permanently blind because of a doctor's costly mistake when she was six weeks old. For one to suffer such a life-altering tragedy, she was marked by persevering joy and faith. Her grandmother was faithful to disciple her as a child, helping her to "see" the truth through a strengthened memory and mind. (She had memorized all four Gospels and Genesis-Numbers by age 10!) Crosby continued walking in rich, personal, saving faith in Jesus throughout her life.

"To God Be the Glory" gained prominence first in England in use during D.L. Moody's evangelistic crusades, but when Billy Graham discovered it at his own 1952 London crusade, he helped bring it to prominence in the States. Since then, millions of Christians have sung it over the decades in praise to God.

Unlike many other such praise psalms and hymns, its focus is singularly on the salvation we have received in Christ. Not only that, but it has a unique turn in the end of each refrain: "O come to the Father through Jesus the Son, and give Him the glory, great things He hath done." These lyrics ensure that believers' praise is not only edifying for the church but evangelistic to the listening world.

Crosby is quoting as saying that she was content to have been made blind "because, when I get to heaven, the first face that shall ever gladden my sight will be that of my Savior." It should come as no surprise, then, her favorite verse was 1 John 3:2—"Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is." As we sing this hymn, may we likewise find great comfort in knowing that no matter what we face, we may truly sing "to God be the glory" because of our salvation in Christ, now and forever with Him one day.
