MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

Perhaps you remember the story of George Mueller (1805-1898), the British evangelist who desperately wanted ALL people to know the power of God! He would only start projects as directed by God through prayer. By the time his ministry was complete, he and his wife had served over 10,000 orphans and established 117 schools which taught over 120,000 students. Every step was steeped in prayer. Every step God provided direction and resources to accomplish God's will.

I am often reminded of Mueller's prayer: "I get my heart in such a place that it has no will of its own with regard to a given matter." He completely and totally trusted that God would guide and provide. And if a particular project was a part of God's plan, he need not worry. Mueller only and always wanted **God's** will.

As we consider expanding our church building accessibility, let us trust completely in God's guidance. From the foundation of our church, God has been about making us a people who welcomed others, especially those who might be left out. We were founded because we believed God was calling us to welcome those who opposed the enslavement of others. On January 1, 1879, over 1400 people gathered in our church sanctuary to dedicate this building to welcome all to give praise and prayers to God. Today, God is continuing His work of welcoming all people into His sanctuary for prayer and praise.

One hundred forty-six years ago, our ancestors could never have imagined all the ways God would use His people to proclaim Jesus Christ to this community. And we can't imagine all the ways God will continue to use this congregation to proclaim Jesus Christ to others. So let us be faithful in our prayers for God to guide and provide His will for us.


NEWS FROM THE DIACONATE BOARD

This year, Lent, a special period of reflection, fasting and prayer, began on Ash Wednesday, March 5 and will end on Maundy Thursday, April 17. During this Lenten season, Pastor Janet Ross will be leading a meditation and prayer service on Thursday evenings at 6:30 pm in the church sanctuary. On Maundy Thursday at 6:30 pm, Pastor Janet will lead a reflective worship service.

Communion will be served on Palm Sunday, April 13 during worship service.

> Our congregation will join St. Mary's Church for the Stations of the Cross Walk on Good Friday, April 18. The walk will begin at 12:00 noon at St. Mary's Church.

On Sunday morning, April 20 at 7:30 am, the congregation will gather at the cross on the northeast corner of the church property for Sunrise Service. Communion will be shared. After the Sunrise Service, a potluck breakfast will be served in the basement of the church followed by Easter service at 10:00 am in the church sanctuary. You are welcome to bring flowers of your choice to the Sunrise Service or to the 10:00 am service in the church sanctuary.



We welcome each of you to join us on Thursday evenings during the Lenten season, Easter Sunday and every Sunday throughout the year, to worship and praise our Lord and Savior.

At the January 2025 annual meeting, the Trustees reported that they had received a quote from Access Solutions for a lift that would transport individuals from ground level to the basement and to the sanctuary level. The Trustees had met twice with Janotta and Herner regarding this accessibility project.

On March 17th the Trustees and Joni Ledinsky and Pete Hazel met with Janotta and Herner. Proposed architectural/engineering plans for the project were provided with a construction timeline of May through July this summer. The project was bid using time and materials with an original estimated range including the lift, of \$300,000 to \$350,000 for the total capital improvement project.

Currently, both Janotta and Herner and the Trustees are reviewing and revising the design details. Anyone who has questions about the lift project or who would like to be involved with design details should contact the Trustees. The Trustees want to complete the revisions and be satisfied with the project scope, design and costs, prior to a special congregational meeting scheduled for April 27th. Design drawings and details will be made available to the congregation. authorize the signing of the project contract. The congregation will meet following worship on the 27th of April to vote on authorization of the project contract.

BACKGROUND ON THE LIFT PROJECT:

Church members and friends have long noted that easier access to the sanctuary and the basement was needed. Investment and memorial funds have been designated for improved accessibility.

A masonry handicap ramp from ground level to the sanctuary was constructed in 1990 which complimented the facility structure. The exposed ramp presented challenges with snow and ice. In 2023, the Trustees became aware of damage to the interior steps to the basement. Consultation with Quality Masonry determined that it appears that the deteriorating exterior ramp was creating major drainage issues for the church building. Church Council and the Trustees explored installing an elevator to provide access to the sanctuary, basement and ground level. This potential \$500,000 to one-million-dollar option was determined to be cost prohibitive.

The Trustees investigated a lift system installed at the Birmingham Church. The lift accommodates a wheelchair and two people. Janotta and Herner, from Monroeville, was contacted to develop plans for our church facility. It was determined that an addition to the church would be needed to house the lift and provide a vestibule for the interior stairs. To save costs, John Krumwiede volunteered to remove the existing ramp. The lift would be purchased directly by the church from Access Solutions. The scope of the project would include construction and finishing of an addition to house the lift and create a vestibule (doors, windows, lighting/electrical); installation of the lift; access through the church wall to the basement and sanctuary; drainage; replacement of the interior steps to the basement; finishes for impacted interior church walls/windows. Access to the church ramp, adjacent side door, and interior steps will not be available during construction. Weather permitting, worship services will be held in the pavilion during June through August as planned.

A vote of the congregation will be needed for authorization to proceed. A special congregational meeting on April 27, 2025, has been called for by the moderator and Trustees. WCC Trustees: Brenda Friend, John Krumwiede, Dale Layport, Bruce Leimbach and Jerry Pickett

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CONTRIBUTING TO THE LIFT PROJECT: Improving accessibility to the church sanctuary and to basement level has been a goal for many years. We now have an opportunity to achieve this improvement. While the design and costs are still being finalized, the Trustees hope to complete this project this summer.

Members and friends who have questions or suggestions for the lift project are encouraged to contact the Trustees as soon as possible. Your ideas and input are valued. Special donations designated for the lift project are needed to help make this capital improvement happen. It is estimated that we currently have funds designated for accessibility that would cover about one third of the project's costs. Please consider making a designated contribution to the lift project above and beyond your pledge. 

Through our special Easter donation, we can help Women At Risk provide aid to victims that have come through unspeakable horror and have risen up to be survivors. Thank you for donating generously.


GOOD FRIDAY SERVICE

The original followers of Jesus told the story of his passion, death and resurrection. As they heard the story, pilgrims wanted to visit Jerusalem to see the sites where Jesus had lived and died. These sites became important holy connections with Jesus. Eventually, following in the footsteps of the Lord along the way of the cross, became a part of the pilgrimage visit.

The Stations of the Cross, as we know them today, came about when it was no longer possible for most Christians to make the visit to the holy sites. Although we can't travel to Jerusalem, we can still remember Jesus and his sacrifice.

On Friday, April 18th, members of our church and St. Mary's Catholic Church will meet at noon in St. Mary's parking lot. We will walk around the Wakeman village with a wooden cross and make a "spiritual" pilgrimage to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. Along the way, we will hear prayers and readings as we stop at various places to remember Jesus' way to the cross.

The service will be about an hour long, and will include approximately a mile-long walk through the village of Wakeman. Please join us, as we find meaningful connections to Jesus through this holy ecumenical service.

- Joel Ross: I sponsor two boys ... Andrew is 11 and lives in Haiti ... Charles is six and lives in Kenya. I love receiving their letters. I send birthday money and they are great about replying with pictures of the new clothes their mothers bought them. I have visited both countries and it helps that I can imagine what their lives might look like.
- Carol Todd: Natalia Alves Ribeiro is my sponsored child through Compassion. She is from Brazil. I began this program when Natalia was 8 years old and this coming October, she will be 18. That is 10 exciting years of watching her grow spiritually and physically, exchanging letters and my sending her gifts for birthdays and Christmas. I'm not sure what will happen with the program once she turns 18. I will need to find that out. With one of my gifts of money, she went to the grocery store and bought chicken, eggs, cookies, waffles, chocolate and yogurt! She was so proud of this picture with the items that she bought that she wanted to share it with me. Her school recently took her to the movies and she had such fun! She has a difficult family life. She tells me she is doing well in school and learning so much about God and how to worship and love him. She prays for me and my family and I pray for her and her family. She is such a precious child!



 Melinda Dalton: My grandchildren sponsor Milan and Maria, who both live in Mexico. By supporting these two children, they get the chance to exchange letters, and to learn about the lives of children in other parts of the world. What a wonderful way to learn to share God's love for others!

 Janet Ross: I have loved getting to know my two Compassion Girls (as I call them):
 11-year-old Dina from Haiti who sent me a picture of the sheep she bought with the birthday money we sent to her. She loves to participate in all the activities of the Compassion Club.

17-year-old Sadia from Burkina Faso who dreams of becoming a teacher one day. Her mother and father are farmers and she helps out in her home where she lives with her parents and four siblings.

Ken Green: My Child's name is Angela and she is from the mountain region of Peru. Angela turned 16 on March 4th. She enjoys knitting for her new pet Yinsu (that just happens to be a turkey). She has a new baby brother and she will be helping her mother sell juice at the fair.
I believe she can only be in the program 2 more years so we have been writing more frequently. It was always my goal to some day visit her but realize now that this is probably not practical. So, my new goal is to see, once she turns 18, if she would be willing to come to Wakeman.

SENIOR FELLOWSHIP


Thanks for your suggestions for naming our new monthly senior fellowship time. The winning entry was **Pearls of Wisdom**, submitted by Rita Daniels.
