Dear Friends,

I recently read an article about the difference between "gratitude" and "appreciation." Gratitude is a broad feeling that, perhaps unintentionally, compares one thing to another … I'm grateful that I have this church (as opposed to those who don't have a church – or that I have this church and not another). I'm grateful my dog doesn't jump up on people (as opposed to those dogs who do). Gratitude has a quality of wide thankfulness and often is made with a slight undertone of comparison.

Appreciation, on the other hand, is smaller ... I'm super thirsty and I stop and appreciate the taste and feel of water in my mouth, going down my throat. Appreciation is about being fully present, in the moment, as you walk outside and see the beauty of the color of the trees. Appreciation tends to focus more on a specific moment.

> As you consider our church, allow yourself to be fully present, remember a specific moment of how it felt when someone in the church reached out to you; when you encountered Christ during a moment in worship; when you laughed with friends during a meeting. Take note of the quality of your appreciation for our church.

And consider your gratitude for the ministry of this church - ways you have been the recipient



and ways our church has reached out to others. The big stuff that makes you grateful to be a part of this church. I hope with all this "considering" you will discover ways you appreciate our church with new levels of gratitude. Perhaps you will even discover a deeper connection with the Great Giver – the One who gives you Life, Joy, Peace, Mercy. To appreciate the One who has sustained you in hard times. To offer gratitude to the One who has given you a New Life and who loves you completely, unconditionally, warts and all.

And with all this pondering, thank you for your prayerful pledge to our church, reflecting your appreciation and your gratitude.






ONE CHURCH FOR ALL
