Preparations for the construction of the new lift began in June with the removal of the existing handicapped accessible ramp. The job site was prepped and Janotta and Herner arrived late summer to begin the work of installing the lift.

It is always our plan to worship in the pavilion during the summer months. This year, however, the June weather was uncooperative, and we found ourselves worshipping in the Outreach Building for a Sunday or two. We were blessed with beautiful weather after June and spent the months of July and August worshipping in the pavilion.

After worshipping in the outreach building a couple of Sundays, we realized that the rooms were not designed to hold the congregation all in one space. And we knew the construction project would not be completed before cold weather arrived. So, the Trustees got to work removing one of the walls, combining two rooms into one – with plenty of space for all of us. We anticipate that the lift project will be completed late fall and until that time, we will continue to worship in the Outreach Building.

We would like to thank all that have been involved in the construction project in any capacity. And we would like to thank all those who join us each Sunday morning for your flexibility during this time of chaos.

Dear Friends,

I recently came across a historical account of religious life in Wakeman, written in March 1879. At that time, our own church building was still fresh and new—the cornerstone had been laid in September 1877, and the dedication took place just three months before that writing, in January 1879. The author described it this way:

"The church is a handsome and imposing brick edifice, evincing in its design and appearance good practical judgment and excellent taste on the part of those to whose energy and liberality its erection is due."

Nearly 146 years later, the same words could well be said of the addition now rising beside that original structure—an addition we hope to dedicate in November 2025.

The masons have worked with great care, blending brick colors to echo the beauty of the original. Their craftsmanship ensures that the new structure feels like a seamless extension of the old.

But what we are adding is more than brick and mortar.

- We are adding a **lift**—a tangible sign of our desire that all may have full and equal access to the life of our church.
- We are adding a renewed **commitment to our community**: to share the love of Jesus with every person.



The exterior of the new addition is stunning, and matches the brick and stone used by the builders of the original church. We hope to have some interior photos to share with you in the November Messenger issue.





Spotlight On Joel Ross



Short Bio: I am 71 years old and grew up in Wakeman township on the family farm until I was 18. I studied art and marketing in college and my career was working in corporate communications and business management. I have three children and three stepchildren ... and four grandchildren. I was baptized, confirmed and married in Wakeman Congregational Church; my great-great grandparents were founding members of the previous

Second Congregational Church of Wakeman. My current position here is clergy spouse, which is challenging when I have to be quiet and neutral, and exciting when I get to use my gifts. Janet and I moved back to Wakeman three years ago and adopted our dog, Fritz.

Hardest thing you've ever done: To live with the decision not to speak at my brother Steve's funeral when I was 25. His death in a car accident was sudden and shocking, and I couldn't find the strength and spiritual maturity to honor him properly. There are not many things in my life that I regret, but this is a big one. Ever since, I have spoken at my parents' and aunt's and uncle's and brother-in-law's funerals ... if you need a eulogizer, I'm your guy.

This is a song about the vulnerability of our walks in the valley and struggles to understand why bad things happen. "Please God hold my hand" is the painful plea in this song ... a total 180 compared to my favorite Bible verse!

Real-life hero: My life-long friend Tim Petrey. Throughout grade school there were several kids that were routinely bullied and made fun of. In fifth grade on the playground, one day he stepped in the middle of one of those belittling episodes and he firmly intervened and said no more! It stopped me in my tracks and I will never forget it. I wish I was more like Tim.

One question you wish an interviewer would ask: "Why did you move back to Wakeman?" To live an important season of my life where my soul is nourished, to experience a simpler life, to have the adventure of building something, and most importantly to be near and around people who may not think like me. And of course, to bring you all your new pastor ... Janet ... at a time and place when we all needed her healing gifts and guidance.

Go-to place to pray: My walks through Wakeman that often take me to the township cemetery on Route 303 ... there is great solace in imaging what my ancestors and friends would want for me, and the subtle and loud ways God speaks to me.




Favorite comfort food:
