CULTURAL INTEGRATION + SPIRITUAL FORMATION

We are slowly but surely becoming more acquainted with doing said proclamation in French. Olive, who had next to no oral comprehension upon moving here, has seen a marked increase in the words and expressions she can pick out from Sunday sermons and dialogue at home. Aaron and Melissa continue to foster their mostly-French relationship with their midwife, and we continue to receive good feedback from our coordinators with Mission Quebec about our progress in language learning. This summer, we plan to put full-time classes on pause so that we can take advantage of the time our neighbours are outdoors, with the hope that restrictions on gatherings will become more and more relaxed.

Our spiritual formation has kicked off on a more official level as of this past Sunday. Last week, Aaron and Zach had their week of "la formation des anciens" (Elder Training) with some of the brothers from Église 21, Église Le Clocher, and our brother Ange from l'Île des Soeurs who attends and serves at Église de Verdun. Over the next year, we will be learning about the high calling of local church eldership and pastoral ministry, what God requires from those he has called to this service, we will be discerning our own areas of immaturity and weakness that we need to address and strive to improve, and opening ourselves up to the joys of serving God and his church in this way. The training is being done by Gilles Lapierre, a seasoned local pastor as well as a pastor of pastors, who has a no-nonsense approach to healthy discipleship and the work and humility it requires, by the grace of God. We're thankful for this brother in the Lord and his commitment to raising up and discipling future pastors here in Quebec.

We've had a couple of casual conversations about what the next steps might look like for us after our period of integration in Montreal. Obviously nothing is certain, as the past year has reminded us, but it's exciting to imagine what life might look like in a few years.
