Jesus: Our Forever Father (4/20/25)

Verses: Isaiah 53:10-12 Main Verse: Isaiah 53:10

'Takeaway': Amazingly, the resurrection of Jesus is the fulfillment of God's promise to give us

new life thru an "everlasting father" (Isaiah 9:6).

Getting Started: Have you ever wanted to start over?

READ: Isaiah 53:10-12 (or have older kids help read).

Some **QUESTIONS** to consider:

Here are some **IMPORTANT IDEAS** we discover in these verses:

Toddler/PreK:

- Jesus is the Servant. These verses foreshadow his coming & his death & resurrection.
- Jesus is crushed as he becomes the final & complete sacrifice for our sins. Thru his death & resurrection, & by faith in him, we can be set free from the guilt of our sin before God.
- After offering himself, the Servant (Jesus) enjoys "prolonged days" & will "see his offspring" (v. 10). This was fulfilled in Jesus' resurrection & the new birth we can enjoy thru faith in him. Wonderfully, though he is *God the Son*, he also becomes an "everlasting father" (Isaiah 9:6) thru his gift of new life.
- Jesus, who is also God, never regrets his sacrifice, but "is satisfied" with the obvious accomplishment as a result of his death & resurrection. Thru Jesus, we can know, love, & serve God forever.

An **ENCOURAGEMENT** in light of God's word:

Toddler: Talk to God. Praise him for Jesus' resurrection. Thank God that just as Jesus' resurrection was promised a long time (seven centuries!) before Jesus was even born, we too can rest assured that God will keep his promise to raise his people up to eternal life. Thank God that thru Jesus, we can all know him & love him forever as we submit to his loving leadership in our lives. Ask God to help you understand more & more what that means as you grow, & ask him to soften your heart to hear his voice.

Elementary: Talk to God. Praise him for the resurrection of Jesus. Thank God that just as Jesus' resurrection was promised a long time (seven centuries!) before Jesus was even born, we too can rest assured that God will keep his promise to raise his people up to eternal life. Thank God that thru faith in Jesus we can share in Jesus' victory over death, & know God as our Everlasting Father forever.
