My oldest daughter Kristen, and her husband Ben

have recently embarked on the adventure of introducing their two-year old son, Everett, to our Sunday morning corporate worship service. During his first Sunday, he made it through the announcements and didn't even say, "Hi Poppy" out loud while I was informing all of you of the upcoming events. The next Sunday he made it through the prelude and then surprised everyone on his pew by maintaining "radio silence" until

the Pastoral Prayer. He is making progress. Teaching your children about the worship of God is a process that requires practice and participation.

Over the years, I have been able to witness the managerial, instructional and yes, even sometimes, the survival strategies, which parents have employed with their children during worship. And while it can often be a challenging endeavor, corporate worship on Sunday morning is the primary activity our covenant community engages in together (Acts 2:42; Ephesians 10:24-25). Therefore, our children as members of this community need to be included and welcomed in this crucial aspect of covenantal life. It is a parental privilege, blessing, and rigorous responsibility to instruct and train children in the ways of worship.

During my preparation and research for this article, I discovered numerous resources with consistent overlapping content. Instead of trying to re-invent the proverbial wheel on this subject, I will mostly be sharing some of the splendid encouragement and instruction that PCA Pastor Jason Helopoulos has already composed. My additions to his thoughts will be in italics.

Implement family worship at home: A family that worships together at home will find it much easier to worship together in corporate worship. A child will find it natural to hear the Word of God, to read the Word of God, to sing the hymns, etc. This will also help our children to learn to sit still, to understand the importance of worship, to focus during prayer, etc. Assist them in learning and memorizing the Lord's Prayer, Apostle's Creed, Gloria Patri, and Doxology.

Focus on Sunday Worship before Sunday: Our upcoming Sunday bulletin is now being emailed out to the congregation on Fridays. Read the sermon passage to your children. The children will then be familiar with the text that John is preaching on. With this knowledge, give them some words or concepts to listen for in the sermon. Discuss any special elements like Baptism, Communion, Missionary Commissioning, Receiving of New Members, etc.

Talk about Sunday morning worship all week long. Help your children to see that each week begins with this privilege (Acts 20:7; Hebrews 10:24-25).

Model excitement about the Lord's Day: Children learn a great deal by watching their parents. If Mom and Dad reluctantly go to church, then the children will reluctantly go to church. If Mom and Dad are critical of the preacher, sermon, etc. then the children will most likely be critical. *Consider whether you approach Sunday worship with excitement and anticipation or with a dulled habitual obligation. Arrive early to the Sanctuary to allow for a mindset of worship*

In the pew: Children are easily distracted, so sit near the front where there are less distractions. Make sure you are not being distracted by your phone, text messages or online activities by turning off your device or putting in on airplane mode. Encourage your children to pay attention, direct them to stand when everyone stands, to sing when they are to sing, to bow their heads in prayer when the congregation is to pray, etc. Have high expectations for them based on their age. Have them bookmark the hymns and scripture readings so they are prepared. If they are not yet reading, guide your finger across the words as you sing and read. Engage them in the service.

Use transitional moments in the service to whisper in your child's ear how much you loved a certain verse in a hymn, how you need to remember to pray for the sick person mentioned, or how you were convicted by that application. It keeps them engaged and allows them to see you participating intently in the service.

Stop Worrying: Many parents are concerned about what other parents or members of the congregation think of their parenting skills or how annoyed someone else is with their child's fidgeting during the service. DON'T! If your baby is a little fussy, papers are rustling, or a few things are dropping on the floor it is o.k. As congregations, we need to willingly and joyfully join in this great privilege of welcoming our covenant children into corporate worship. And that takes some minor adjusting on our part.

Do not be Overzealous: Be patient with your children and shower them with grace. It takes children time to adjust and different children adjust or accept on different time tables. Your child may come into the service and sit attentively and quietly within a few weeks or you may have to help your child with this for months or even years. Be patient! Love them and do not compare them to other children.

Our children benefit greatly by being in the presence of Christians of various ages. They are able to see that the faith of their parents is not a faith that they own alone, but is a faith that is important to all of these people who are gathered around them on Sunday morning. This only reinforces what Mom and Dad are modeling and teaching when they see this incredible gathering of people reading the Word together, praying together, confessing together, and singing together (Deuteronomy 31:9-13). They need to see the body in action.

Children's Worship is an optional unique, interactive time of music, prayer and Bible teaching held, just prior to the sermon, during the morning worship service. Following a time of corporate family worship in the sanctuary, children (ages 3 years- 4th grade) may attend Children's Worship, if their parents so choose.



May Circle - Lesson 4

Guarding and Establishing the Church Problems in the Cretan Churches Titus 1:10-16

CHURCHES HAVE PROBLEMS! What kind of problems? False teachers, for one.

This month we studied Paul's instructions to Titus concerning those that were teaching false doctrine and upsetting whole families. The Cretan church, just like our churches of today, had teachers who infiltrated the church with false doctrine. Paul charged Titus to appoint elders who had the qualifications not only to preach right doctrine but also to take a stand and rebuke those who were preaching false doctrine. In other words, confrontation with false teachers. Ouch!

Why is it important to preach right doctrine? Because false doctrine leads us away from truth and spiritual maturity. False teaching assaults our spiritual health and God's Word.

We learned about the qualifications of elders from our last few lessons. Now in verses 10-16 we get an even deeper understanding of why these qualifications are required. Great demands are put on our elders to protect truth and guard against untruth. First, they need to know the Word of God thoroughly in order to spot counterfeit teaching. They need to have no ulterior motive in handling adverse circumstances. They need sound minds, right attitudes, and calm spirits to handle those that are false teachers. And they need to have firm resolve in rebuking and, if necessary, expelling false teachers from the church.

I dare say if you asked any of our elders the question, "Do you enjoy confrontation?" the answer would be a resounding "NO!" False teachers have a motive and they do not take kindly to being rebuked or stopped from whatever gain they hope to achieve.

But we are also responsible for knowing God's Word and discerning false teaching or doctrine. Unlike the Cretan church, the canon of Scripture was not yet complete and the Cretan believers did not have Bibles of their own. The "church" consisted of house churches with no formal structure or oversight and they had to trust that the "house" teacher was teaching them the truth. Today we have the whole counsel of God to read, study, and meditate on. We are so blessed to know the Truth and have God's Word available to us!

The goal of the elders in addressing false teaching is either restoration of a believer who has errored in their doctrine, or converting a false teacher into a true believer. Let's continue to pray fervently for our elders, for our teachers, and for each other that we might all live healthy spiritual lives.
