# The Gospel Pattern of Worship

Reformed and Presbyterian worship on the Lord's Day is just that — worship. As good and important as things like evangelism, fellowship, and Bible study are, they should not morph the act of worship into something else that looks like a concert, a sing-along time, an educational lecture, a volunteer rally, a support group, or a therapy session. Worship is meeting with God. This must be clearly affirmed, or the integrity of worship will be compromised for some lesser good.

Since we meet with God through the person of Jesus Christ, West Hills Presbyterian Church makes its worship "Christ-centered." We actually pattern our service after the structure of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As we order the worship services "according to Scripture," West Hills Presbyterian Church uses

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worship services "according to Scripture," West Hills Presbyterian Church uses the elements of worship in biblical proportions and according to a biblical pattern. You will notice the worship service at West Hills Presbyterian Church follows a pattern of...

- 1. A cycle of *praise* (call to worship/invocation / hymn)
- 2. A cycle of *confession* (confession of sin / assurance of pardon / hymn)
- 3. A cycle of employing the means of grace (Creed / Gloria Patri / Scripture reading / intercessory prayer / sermon)
- 4. A cycle of thanksgiving and blessing (closing hymn / benediction)

This is the same sort of pattern we find in Isaiah 6, the Lord's Prayer and the gospel message. As Rev. Terry Johnson says, "In knowing the true God (in praise), we know ourselves (as sinners), our need (for grace), and give thanks for His gifts in Christ."

While this is the pattern that West Hills Presbyterian Church follows in worship, we acknowledge there is freedom and flexibility within this pattern since it is derived from scriptural examples and "Gospel logic" and not by scriptural command. Yet, we do believe this is a worship service that is "according to Scripture" in the fullest sense of the words. Only biblical elements in biblical proportions are used in the service. Furthermore, the structure of worship (or order of worship) is also rooted in the Bible. Thus, West Hills Presbyterian Church is characterized by worship that is clearly centered on the Triune God of the Bible and can be characterized as being simple, spiritual, and reverent. Worship that is clearly identifiable as "Reformed & Presbyterian" with deep historical roots and even deeper biblical roots. *Gloria in excelsis Deo.*

Titus: Passing on the Truth, Equipping the Body
Chapter 1: Calling
By Dennis Bennett and Vickie Poole

#### Titus 1:1-4

FROM WHO

Paul – a Pharisee of the Pharisees, a murderer, a zealot, highly educated in the Old Testament Scriptures, a mentor and father figure to Timothy and Titus

A *slave* of God – One who willingly and unashamedly knows that he is "owned" by God, bought with a price, and joyously desires to do the Master's bidding

An apostle of Jesus Christ – His calling by God's design

The ESV translation says "servant" but the Greek says "slave". The authors of our study point out the difference: "Ownership. We are not servants of Jesus although we do serve at His pleasure. We don't own anything...we manage everything for Jesus. We are His stewards. He purchased us out of the slave market of sin and we belong to Him."

Picture this scene: You are a slave on an auction block. You have no rights to your life. You own nothing. You are pitiful, wretched, and poor. This is all of us spiritually before we knew Christ. We were slaves to sin and even though we might not have looked this way physically, this is the way we looked spiritually. But in the crowd was a man named Jesus. He looked you straight in the eye, and said, "I'll take that one. He/she will be my precious slave. I have a specific purpose for him/her. And here is my blood as payment for that precious one." And you became His and He loved you and cared for you and you were special in His household. This is the Master/Slave relationship that Paul understood and why he is pleased to call himself a slave.

#### **Titus**

#### My true child in a common faith

Titus was a Greek man and was not circumcised. We don't know much about his background from Scripture but as we learned last month, he is mentioned a number of times in 2 Corinthians, once in Galatians, and once in 2 Timothy. He came to know the Savior early in Paul's ministry because we read in Galatians 2:1-3 that he went to the Jerusalem Council in 48 A.D. with Paul and Barnabas. From the timeline given in our introductory material, he would have come to know Christ sometime between 46 and 48 A.D. Paul wrote the book of Titus sometime between 66 and 67 A.D. Titus had been with Paul in Corinth and in Ephesus and received much OJT (on the job training) as Paul mentored him. As a Greek, Titus probably did not know the Old Testament scriptures. God's Word would have been new to him—just like it might have been to some of us when we first came to know the Lord. It took 20 years of studying God's Word, experiencing life within the body of believers, and witnessing Paul's leadership before Titus was ready to be given the responsibility of establishing leadership in the churches on Crete.

Paul was passing on the "baton" to Titus, knowing that he was about to die. Also from the timeline we can see that the fall of Jerusalem is going to take place in a few years (70 A.D.). We don't have any idea what major catastrophic event may be looming in the life of the church or in our lives. So God is asking us to pass on the baton, or to accept the baton from another, while we have the opportunity. That's why knowing God's Word is so important. We have to know it to "pass" it on and to "equip" our fellow workers in the faith.

Titus "proved" himself as a man that could be trusted in his calling. Paul calls him a "true child in a common faith". Could someone refer to you as a "true child in a common faith"? I hope we all could be known by that title.

Titus was called to set up the leadership of the church on the island of Crete. He was not called to be a pastor there but to make sure elders were established in a very unruly and challenging culture. Church leadership is the first item of business in this letter to Titus from Paul. In the next 3 months we will learn more about the qualifications of elders and why church leadership is so important. Please join us in March for Chapter 2 (Titus 1:5-9).
