I. Introduction

- A. From the Greek term eschatos ['last'], eschatology refers to the "doctrine of the last things."
- B. But biblical eschatology does not focus on last things so much as it does on ultimate things!
- C. The Ultimate Goal = God's glory revealed in an *unbreakable* bond of fellowship with a holy people in a holy place under an obedient covenant representative!
 - 1. Creation was "very good," but not yet "the best."

"There is an absolute end posited for the universe before and apart from sin. The universe, as created, was only a beginning . . . [The goal was] an absolute, perfect, ethical relation to God and a supernaturalizing of man and the world."

2. The Tree of Life

WCF 7.2 – The first covenant made with man was a covenant of works, wherein life was promised to Adam; and in him to his posterity, upon condition of perfect and personal obedience.

Gen 3:24 – "He drove out the man, and at the east of the garden of Eden he placed the cherubim and a flaming sword that turned every way to guard the way to the tree of life."

Rev 2:7 - "To the one who conquers I will grant to eat of the tree of life, which is in the paradise of God."

Luke 23:43 – "And he said to him, 'Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise.""

II. The "Last Days" According to the Old Testament

- A. Concluding of present order and introduction of a final eternal order of things marked by the coming of the Messiah and the establishment of God's kingdom.
 - 1. The Use of "Prophetic Idiom" in "last days" prophecies: The OT prophets spoke of future realities of Christ and his work in "Old Testament-y" ways.
 - Is 2:2–3 "It shall come to pass <u>in the latter days</u> that the mountain of the house of the LORD shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be lifted up above the hills; and all the nations shall flow to it, ³ and many peoples shall come..."

- Hos 3:5 "Afterward the children of Israel shall return and seek the LORD their God, and David their king, and they shall come in fear to the LORD and to his goodness <u>in the latter</u> days."
- Jer 23:5 "Behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land."
- 2. The Use of "Prophetic Perspective" in "last days" prophecies.

Joel 2:28–31 – "And it shall come to pass <u>afterward</u>, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions. ²⁹ Even on the male and female servants in those days I will pour out my Spirit.

³⁰ And I will show wonders in the heavens and on the earth, blood and fire and columns of smoke. ³¹ The sun shall be turned to darkness, and the moon to blood, before the great and awesome day of the LORD comes.

³² And it shall come to pass that everyone who calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved."

Acts 2:14–21 – "But Peter, standing with the eleven, lifted up his voice and addressed them: "Men of Judea and all who dwell in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and give ear to my words. ¹⁵ For these people are not drunk, as you suppose, since it is only the third hour of the day. ¹⁶ But this is what was uttered through the prophet Joel:

17 "And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams; 18 even on my male servants and female servants in those days I will pour out my Spirit, and they shall prophesy.

¹⁹ And I will show wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and vapor of smoke; ²⁰ the sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the day of the Lord comes, the great and magnificent day.

²¹ And it shall come to pass that everyone who calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved."

III. Review and Conclusion

- A. Biblical eschatology does not refer to a mere appendix to history, but is central to God's plan for creation from the very beginning. *Q. What do you truly long for?*
- B. Biblical eschatology frames and defines the work of Christ after the fall. *Q. Are you on the "right side of history"?*
- C. There is an increasingly rich disclosure of this one eschatological hope across the Old Testament era, especially thru "last days" prophecies, which are fulfilled in Jesus Christ.

Heb 11:39–40 – "And all these, though commended through their faith, did not receive what was promised, ⁴⁰ since God had provided something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect."
