

The Approaching Joy



The world constantly looks for a God who is near, for heaven on earth. Here it is! In the preaching and Holy Eucharist, Our Lord is at hand. Until you stand before Him, He cannot be any closer than He is now! You are welcomed, then, to take Him to heart as He gives Himself to you.

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

The anticipation for Our Lord's coming now reaches its zenith. Our prayer is that the "earth open and bring forth salvation" (*Introit*). For when Our Savior comes with His grace, we are speedily helped by His mercy and satisfaction (*Collect; Alleluia*). Is it any wonder that we are to rejoice and be anxious for nothing (*Epistle*)? For the Lord is at hand and near to all that call upon Him in

truth (*Gradual*). The Baptizer prepares us for His coming by confessing clearly who He is (*Gospel*). So "let the skies pour down righteousness" — for the Righteous One is here!

The Sermon

The Pharisees and Levites approach to John and ask him by what authority does he baptize and preach repentance. Although John is neither Elijah, nor the Prophet, nor the Christ, he baptizes and preaches by the command and authority of Him who sent Him, the Lord Jesus Christ. Just as the ministry and proclamation of John was questioned, so too, the preaching of repentance and the gospel, proclaimed by Christ's servants, the pastors, receives criticism. The world and our sinful flesh would dismiss the message and ministry of the Church as a nuisance and as illegitimate – often times with the show of piety and kindness. But they have no authority to do so. They rail not simply against a person or an institution, but the Savior Himself, who in humility set aside His power and glory on the cross and continues to humble himself today as He comes to us to forgive our sins in His body, the Church.

The Holy Eucharist

The Lord is at hand in the Blessed Sacrament of His Body and Blood. So why are we anxious? Let us instead rejoice, confess Him as our Help and Salvation, and welcome Him as He comes to us in His Holy Supper.




The "O Antiphons" The CHIEF HYMN "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" (insert) is based on the seven great "O Antiphons." These antiphons are sung before and after the Magnificat at the Divine Office of Vespers (the church's evening prayer) beginning on December 17. They bid our Lord "Come!" using seven different prophetic Names for the promised Messiah: O Wisdom (Sapienta) Is 11.2-3; Pr 8.12; 9.1; 1 Co 1.24 | O Lord (Adonai) Is 2.5; 9.6-7 | O Root (Radix) of Jesse Is 11.1,10 | O Key (Clavis) of David Is 9.6; 22.22 | O Rising Sun (Oriens) Is 9.1; 59.19 | O King of Nations (Rex Gentium) Is 2.4; 9.6-7 | O Emmanuel Is 7.14

Benedictine monks of the seventh century arranged the antiphons so that the first letter of each in reverse order spels ERO CRAS (*Latin*: "Tomorrow I will come").

In the thirteenth century, and anonymous author composed the antiphons into a verse form and added the refrain. In 1966, the source of the plainsong tune *Veni Emmanuel* was discovered to be a fifteenth-century French Processional used by Franciscan nuns.

Our hymnal includes a truncated version of the hymn (# 62) with no indication why three stanzas are omitted.

The organ introduction is a contemplative setting by Paul Manz (1919-2009). Trained at Concordia University Chicago and Northwestern University, Manz was a well-respected Lutheran musician of the twentieth century. His career included long tenures as kantor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Luke—Chicago and Mt. Olive Lutheran Church—Minneapolis, and professor of music at Concordia University—St Paul. He is known for his numerous organ compositions on hymn tunes and his choral motet, "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come."





The PROCESSIONAL HYMN, "Once He Came in Blessing" (# 74), sings of our vocation here on earth—"Let us here confess Thee"—while we await our Lord's calling us to heaven: "Till in heaven we bless Thee." Author Johann Roh (d. 1547) was a pastor in Jungbunzlau, Bohemia (Czech Republic) and later a bishop. He edited both a German and a Bohemian hymnal. His hymn directs us directly to the work of God's Son to release us from our sins.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 19. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

At the beginning of Psalm 19, it seems as if it is about the creation's praise of the Creator (vv 1-6). However, it is about preaching-the preaching of the heavens and the preaching about the Lord's law (v 14). The center of this preaching is not rules, but the Bridegroom and Strong Man (Christ) who comes out of His chamber and comes for the whole world (v. 5). And the preacher, ultimately, is St. John the Baptizer whose preaching converts the soul, makes the wise simple (v. 7), and drives us to confess our secret faults (v. 12). It is quite fitting, then, that we pray this Psalm on these last few days before Christ Mass. Through it, St. John once again prepares our hearts and minds for the coming of the Son.



Rev. Fr. Jacob Gaugert: Serving the Lord in Togo

Fr. Gaugert serves as a career missionary through the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in Togo. He teaches courses in Lutheran theology at The Centre Luthérien d'Etudes Théologiques (CLET), or Lutheran Center for Theological Studies, in Dapaong, Togo, West Africa. He also teaches distance learning, continuing education courses, and coordinates visiting professors to CLET.

Fr. Gaugert was born in Sullivan, WI, and was baptized and confirmed at St. John Evangelical Lutheran Church. He graduated from Concordia University-Mequon, WI, in 2004 with a bachelor's degree in theological and classical languages. He received his M.Div. from Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, IN, in 2010. Before becoming a career missionary, he served as a pastor at the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Dr. Martin Luther (SELC District) in Chicago, where he was involved with urban/cross-cultural mission work. In his free time, he likes to read, garden and raise chickens.

The LCMS began work in Togo in 1980. Leadership training is conducted among people of Togo through the Lutheran Center for Theological Studies (CLET), located in Dapaong. CLET serves the French-speaking Lutheran church bodies of seven countries: Togo, Ivory Coast, Guinea, Benin, Burkina Faso, Congo and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. In 2001, the church bodies established an international board to ensure that African leadership will promote and govern the center. The CLET program includes two tracks—a preseminary track for leaders who have little formal education, and a track leading to ordination. Courses are all contextualized to address specific West African issues. Church planting is the central emphasis of program courses. After the first class of CLET finished their coursework, they collectively planted five churches! In May 2002, the first Togolese pastors were ordained in the Lutheran Church of Togo (ELT). Additional classes have followed.

LCMS missionaries walk alongside the ELT as partners. In 2009, the ELT held its first general assembly, established a constitution, elected leaders, and provided libraries for church leaders.

LCMS World Relief and Human Care has supported mercy projects in Togo by providing loans to farmers, so that they might purchase livestock; medicine and medical equipment; digging wells; drought and famine relief; agriculture programs; road improvement; clinic restoration; literacy programs; assistance to families affected by civil conflict and flood disaster response.

The Lutheran Church of Togo has 10 ordained ministers, over 30 congregations and preaching stations and more than 5,000 baptized members.
