

The Feast of Pentecost

The Church of the Spirit



The Spirit of the Lord gathers people to hear His Word and receive the Sacrament of His Body and Blood. In this way you partake of God, live in Christ, and have a share of heaven. The Gift of the Spirit in the Gospel preaching and Sacrament fills your heart with rejoicing in Our Lord and the salvation and comfort He gives you.

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

The Spirit of the Lord fills the whole world (*Introit*). He does this by filling the hearts of the Faithful and kindling in them the fire of Our Lord's love (*Verse, Sequence*). When that love has been kindled in you, you are led to love the Lord by holding fast to His word

and promises (*Gospel*). That is the Spirit the Lord promises from ancient times (*Old Testament*). That is the Spirit who fills the Apostles so they preach Him into the hearts of men (*Epistle*). And that is the Spirit we pray for so that we may also rejoice in His holy comfort (*Collect*).

The Sermon

The Prophet Joel sees from afar. He sees Pentecost as the beginning of the judgment, the pouring out of God's Spirit as the starting of the destruction of the world. It is the great and awesome Day of the Lord, the Day the faithful remnant is delivered. The Prophet saw rightly, but from afar. Pentecost does mark the end, the time when the faithful are set apart. But you too live in that time. It is nearer now than in Joel's day. And so fire and rushing wind, signs of God's presence, attend the giving of the Spirit, the same Spirit that has always been with the faithful, the Spirit that hovered over the face of the waters in the beginning, the Spirit that worked faith in Abraham, the Spirit that David prayed not to lose. But now the Spirit teaches all things, and brings to remembrance the Word of Christ. Christ ascended. The Spirit descended. And you who love Him, you who keep Christ's Word, God makes His home with you.

The Holy Eucharist

Our Lord is remembered in the partaking of His Body and Blood. For we eat the bread and drink the cup not only to proclaim but also so that the Spirit may call to remembrance in us Our Lord's death and resurrection. At this Blessed Sacrament the Spirit opens your heart and mind to know and take to heart this comfort which He delivers. And in this way your God comes and takes up residence within you.

The Mass: The Lord's Supper



Many people came to hear our Lord preach. One day they were so interested in what He said that it got very late. The people were hungry, but that had brought no food; so Our Lord took five loaves of bread and two fish, prayed, and gave them to His disciples who distributed His gifts to the people.

The Holy Communion is just like that. Jesus gives us Himself. From Him we get our life. As He satisfied the hunger of the people at that time, so Our Lord

will not let us go home hungry. Today His servants, the pastors, distribute to the whole congregation the bread which He gave them.

Jesus took the bread and the wine which the disciples had brought. Then He said those wonderful words which we repeat in the Holy Communion.

Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night when He was betrayed, took bread; and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to the disciples and said:


"Take; eat. THIS IS MY BODY which is given for you. This do in remembrance of Me."

In the same way also, He took the cup after supper, and when He had given thanks He gave it to them, saying:

"Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the New Testament in My Blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."

Be all Thy graces now outpoured! Pentecost, the Feast of the Holy Ghost, is one of the three great festivals that shape the liturgical year. We pray that the Holy Ghost would keep us in the true faith through Preaching and the Sacra-

The CHIEF HYMN "Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord" (# 224) began with a German stanza based on the medieval Latin antiphon Veni Sancte Spiritus. Martin Luther (1483-1546) expressed "this hymn was composed by the Holy Ghost himself, both words and music." Luther refined the original and amplified it with two stanzas of his own, so neatly crafted and joined to the original that the old and the new cannot be distinguished.

The tune is also based on the medieval antiphon and was used with Luther's text in the Erfurt Enchiridion in 1524.

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) first composed his Fantasia super: Komm, Heiliger Geist (BWV 651) (today's PRELUDE) as the court organist in Weimar. He modified it into the setting we hear today during his years as kantor at St. Thomas in Leipzig. It is the first in his collection The Great Eighteen Chorale Preludes. Over the hymn melody in the pedal, the hands play an exuberant toccata, conveying the "mighty rushing wind" of the Holy Ghost.



The POSTLUDE on the hymn "Come Holy Ghost, Creator Blest" (# 233) is a setting by Kenneth T. Kosche (b. 1947), professor of music emeritus at Concordia University Wisconsin. Dr. Kosche directed the Kammerchor, in which Kantor Schultz sang in college.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 68. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

As you pray this Psalm, keep in mind v 19-20. We bless Our God because He daily loads us with benefits, the greatest of which is escape from the death of hell. Throughout the rest of the Psalm, you see God marching forth (v 7) to claim His victory and put down those who rise up against Him (v 1). You also see God liberating His people (v 22) and restoring His kingdom in the worship of His House (v 28-30). This is Our God who sends for His Spirit to give the Word (v 11), strengthen us (v 35) and gather us as His own (v 24, 26).

Today's Announcements

WHITSUNDAY The Feast of Holy Pentecost, celebrated today, is also called "Whitsunday," or "White Sunday," a reference to the white robes of the newly baptized, worn on this day. Still, the liturgical color for today is red, the color of the Holy Spirit, taken from the fire that lit on the heads of the Eleven as the Spirit came. Pentecost is among the oldest observances of the Christian Church. As the second greatest Feast of Christendom, Whitsunday or Pentecost ranks only behind Holy Easter in the Church's "Year of Grace." Pentecost was observed as an Octave, meaning that the Feast took liturgical precedence over the subsequent seven days, as early as the Gelasian and Gregorian Sacramentaries (5th century A+D).
