HOLY MASS is celebrated every Sunday and Wednesday at 10am, and on holy days as announced.

COMMUNICANTS ARE BAPTIZED CHRISTIANS who have been instructed in and publicly confess the Evangelical-Lutheran Faith. If you desire to commune at Zion, please speak with the Pastor before approaching the Altar.

THE DIVINE OFFICE OF MATINS is prayed Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday at 8:45am in the Chapel of the Holy Incarnation in the Rectory.

ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION is taught every Sunday and Wednesday immediately following Holy Mass.

SUNDAY SCHOOL for children ages 3-12 is from September through May. Lessons are Bible-story based and activities are designed to reinforce the biblical lesson.

PRIVATE ABSOLUTION is available on Saturdays from 9 – 10am and by appointment.

PASTORAL CONSULTATION based on the Holy Scriptures is available from the Pastor. An appointment is necessary.

THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY BAPTISM is for infants and adults, and may be arranged by contacting the Pastor for an appointment.

COUPLES DESIRING HOLY MARRIAGE should contact the Pastor before finalizing the wedding date. Biblical instruction in Holy Marriage is required. All marriages are conducted by the Pastor according to Zion's usual order.

NEW MEMBERS are received by Baptism, Confirmation, Transfer or Profession of Faith. Instruction in Luther's Small Catechism and Private Absolution are required for all new members. Please ask the Pastor for further details.





The New Righteousness



If you are looking for a place that not only inspires righteousness, and not only empowers you toward righteous living, but even plants righteousness into your very skin and bones, then we welcome you. For this is where Our Lord, the Righteous One, is given to live His Righteous Life in and through you.

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

True righteousness does not begin with the desire to do right, but with being united to the Righteous One. Those united to Christ Jesus by Baptism have been planted in His righteous death (*Epistle*). In this way, he also grafts within you His own righteousness so that you can live an upright life (*Collect*). In this righteous life, you live not by your own self-interests, but for yourself and for others (*Old Testament*). For you live from Our Lord's saving strength (*Introit*). This, then, is the righteousness that exceeds that of the Pharisees (*Gospel*).

The Holy Eucharist

The Blessed Sacrament makes our bodies the home of Christ. His life is now our life. He lives in us and through us. So the Sacrament strengthens us to live not in fear and not for ourselves, but in faith toward God and in fervent love toward others.

 Luther's Creed hymn ends with the Amen:

Who the Church, His own creation, Keeps in unity of spirit. The RETIRING PROCESSIONAL HYMN, "We All Believe in One True God" (# 251-2nd tune) is Martin Luther's (1483-1546) hymn paraphrase of the Creed, also making it his hymn on the second chief part of Christian doctrine.

With this hymn, Luther connects the Church of the Reformation with the medieval church. Luther used a medieval plainsong chant melody as the melody for his text on the Creed. In this way, he shows the unity of the Church as he took existing music and strengthened the text to give a confession of Our Lord and His work, especially in His Son, "Made true man, our elder Brother, That the lost might life inherit." The Amen used today is commonly included with the tune and is found earliest in *Geistliche Lieder* by Joseph Klug in 1533.




The PRELUDE is by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) from his collection *Clavier Übung III*, which includes both a longer and shorter organ setting of each of the catechism chorales.

All that the mortal eye beholds is water as we pour it

Before the eye of faith unfolds the power of Jesus' merit.

The PROCESSIONAL HYMN, "To Jordan Came the Christ Our Lord" (insert), is also by Luther. Finished in 1541, this was the last of the Catechism hymns to be written. As it includes a paraphrase of Jesus' Baptism (St. Matthew 3), it is also fitting for use on the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord on January 13.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 28. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

This Psalm is a plea to God by someone who is oppressed. But what is to be feared most is falling into sin and unrighteousness (v 1). So we may pray that God will hear both our prayer (v 2) and give us true fear of God's Law (v 3-5). Since God is our Savior and Deliverer, the prayer then changes to a blessing of God—the God who strengthens and sustains against inward godliness and outward injustice (v 6-7). And God does not disappoint this hope. He saves and sustains all who trust in Him—especially the Anointed One (v 8), so the prayer shifts yet a third time—that God will save and shepherd (feed) His own (v 9).
