

"Your Sins are Forgiven"

Our Lord gives His healing mercy freely without cost, without strings attached. The Faithful rejoice in receiving Our Lord as He comes to them in His Holy Body and Blood. Pray that your gathering with them will rejoice in you as well.

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

The Lord is our salvation and He delivers us from our troubles (*Introit*). But our instinct is to take our Lord's salvation for granted,

not to treasure His help, and to live however pleases us. This is the old way we are to put away (*Epistle*). Our instinct is also to make light of Our Lord's forgiveness and to look instead for spectacular healings and miracles and instead give us His grace so that we might cheerfully live as pleases Him (*Collect*).

The Sermon

He forgives sins. They called Him a blasphemer. A man who forgives sins? Yes, O Ye of little faith, a Man who forgives sins. For which is easier for God to say, "Arise, take up your bed and go to your house!" or "Your sins are forgiven you!"? Or is it that they doubt that He is God? Who then blasphemes? Dust returns to dust, arms and legs grow feeble, minds and eyes grow dim. Men of Adam's flesh must go the way of all flesh. But it is He who offers true healing when He forgives sins, for that healing lasts unto eternity. And that you may know that the same Son of Man who forgave the paralytic gave to mere men the Office to forgive sins, He breathed on His Disciples and said "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any they are forgiven them. If you retain the sins of any they are retained." And so He is proved to be Jacob's Ladder, for it is He alone who bridges heaven and earth. And so it is the very gate of heaven to which He invites you this day.

The Holy Eucharist

With the forgiveness comes healing. It was true of the paralytic. And it is true of everyone who partakes of Our Lord's Body and Blood. For the Blessed Sacrament not only forgives our sin, it also heals us body and soul by strengthening us in our weakness and putting within us the Life that never dies.

The Mass: Creed (Part 2)

The Creed in its original form is in the first person plural: "We believe..." This is because it was an expression of unanimity among the bishops present at the Nicea Council. When the Creed began to be confessed in the churches while at Mass, the form was altered into the singular, as we have it now: "I believe." When people at worship make this confession, they are declaring their personal agreement with the ecumenical Christian faith as it was insisted upon by these assembled bishops who made their stand against the Arian errors. The use of the singular also suggests a baptismal reference as it is found in the Apostles' Creed (which is confessed at Baptism). That is to say, it is because of Baptism in Christ that we declare our allegiance with those who rejected the Arian errors.

The errors of Arius and his followers were regarded as a most serious breach in the faith because they amounted to a denial of Jesus. Arias had said that there was a time before Jesus existed; Arius' followers had tried to blend their false views with those of the Christians, saying that Jesus is "God" in a manner of speaking, or that He was of *like* substance with the Father. The Nicene fathers rejected all refusals to see Jesus for who He truly is, and this is why the Creed is so emphatic about His divinity: "God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God," and then the following clause, "begotten, not made," a declared rejection of Arius, and "being of one substance with the Father," a declared rejection of any who attempted the compromising view, and finally, "by whom all things were made," a confession which no Arian could stomach. Thus the Creed is the mark of an unyielding Church Militant, making its stand against all error.

At Mass, the placement of the Creed after the Gospel proclaimed and preached is a confession, an implicit declaration as to the source of our faith, namely the Gospel. The Gospel is heard and confessed.

In addition it is appropriate to genuflect at the words "and was made man," to mark our acknowledgement of His deep humility. The term *man* here implies more than simply His union with our humanity, but His state of humiliation under the curse of the Law.

In the Creed's third article, it is also appropriate to make a profound bow from the waist in honor of the Holy Ghost, at the words "who with the Father is worshipped and glorified."

The Prelude Praise the Almighty, My Soul, Adore Him — Jan O. Bender (1909-1994)


The Postlude Praise the Almighty, My Soul, Adore Him —Gustav Zanger (1848-1889)

The CHIEF HYMN, "Praise the Almighty, My Soul, Adore Him," (# 26) is based on Psalm 146 by Johann David Herrnschmidt (1675-1723). The *Handbook to The Lutheran Hymnal* comments: "His hymns are scriptural but do not possess much poetic force." Though this is the only hymn of his included in the hymnal, it certainly is an exception to that statement. Perhaps the fine English rendering is thanks to the translator, Alfred E. R. Brauer, an Australian pastor who assisted in the production of the 1925 *Australian Lutheran Hymn-Book*. It is a well-crafted poetic expression of Our Father's love and provision for all our needs, especially salvation through His Son, for which we give Him praise and thanks.

The OFFERING HYMN, "Kyrie, God Father in Heaven Above" (# 6) is a paraphrase of the Latin Kyrie, Fons bonitatis. The German translation is ascribed to Johann Spangenberg (1484-1550). Countless settings of the Kyrie were used in the medieval church; this one gained favor among German Lutherans and was, in some locations, sung in addition to or in replacement of the Latin Kyrie. Its continued use among us connects us to the plainsong musical heritage of the medieval church that served as the foundation for Renaissance, Baroque, and Classical musical styles.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 78. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

This Psalm may be prayed in its entirety or broken into three parts (v 1-16; v 17-39 and v 40-72). The Psalm recounts God's rescue of the children of Israel in the Red Sea (the Exodus), how He led them through the wilderness, how they grumbled and complained against Him, and how He was faithful to his promise even tough they were unfaithful to his Word. As you pray this Psalm, remember that you fit in the picture as one of the children of Israel. But also look for how God continually restates His promise and makes good on His Word.
