

Thy Strong Word

Welcome to the place where the surest and most certain promises are made and guaranteed and kept. For the promise is from the Lord and is as good as His Word. May you today find comfort in His strong and sure promise.

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

We desire a God whom we can count on, who never lets us down, and who cannot be overpowered – a God who holds the whole world in His power (*Introit*). That's the God David prayed to, relied upon, and leaned on and trusted in (*Old Testament*). That's the God the nobleman expected from the mouth of Jesus (*Gospel*). And that's the God who promises to shield and defend us from whatever threatens to undo us (*Epistle*). So we pray in confidence that Our Lord will keep His church (and us) in continual godly living (*Collect*) which relies solely on His true Word and sure promise.

The Sermon

Under Solomon the borders of the Davidic kingdom would expand to their farthest reach in all of history. Never since has Israel enjoyed a kingdom so large. Today the land is in ruins, shell-shocked, the ground moist with the blood of hundreds of generations. But still David's prayer was answered. A Son of his loins reigns forever. And His power and authority know no limits. But His Kingdom is not like earthly kingdoms. The nobleman cries out "Sir, come down before my child dies!" Christ answers "Go your way; your son lives." And so it was, and so it is. He said "Let there be light", and there was light. His strong Word did cleave the darkness. At His speaking it was done. Now the same Word cleaves sickness and death. By Divine breath death is defeated, and life prevails.

The Holy Eucharist

We come to the Eucharist desiring forgiveness, the strength to face the days ahead, rescue from our bondage to sin, and refreshed life. And that is precisely what Our Lord's Body and Blood give us—forgiveness of sins, life and salvation.

The Mass: Preface

The Preface opens with a Salutation, in which the celebrant says "The Lord be with you" and the people respond, "And with your spirit." This is the final preparation for the greatest event of the day, and indeed the greatest thing in all of life, the giving and receiving of the Blessed Sacrament. By this prayer, the celebrant petitions the Lord to be in the hearts and minds of the people who are about to receive this great Gift, that is, that He may grant them abundant faith. Their response, "And with your spirit," here as well as in other places, is a petition that the spirit of the celebrant and the Holy Spirit would be the same, that is, that the celebrant would be entirely faithful and true, by the Holy Spirit's power (which incidentally is why the more recent "and also with you" is unfortunate, to say the least).

Next, a verse is said responsively, the celebrant intoning, "Lift up your hearts," and the people replying, "We lift them up unto the Lord," calling to mind a penitential section from the book of Lamentations: "Let us search and try our ways, and turn again to the Lord. Let us lift up our heart with our hands unto God in the heavens. We have transgressed and have rebelled: thou hast not pardoned" (Lamentations 3.40-42). That is, we lift up our hearts for cleansing here, begging for mercy, in a brief word reminiscent of the Kyrie we had uttered earlier.

And than, as if in immediate response, our faith rises in remembrance of the Lord's mercy, and gives thanks. In fact, the thanks we give for His mercy is not merely in the next words, the celebrant's invitation, "Let us give thanks unto the Lord our God," and the reply, "it is meet and right so to do," but more robustly in the great Sanctus, which is itself the actual giving of the thanks prescribed in the Preface.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 119:1-16. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

Psalm 119 is about the Lord's Word and our desire to hold fast to His Word. "Law," "testimonies," "precepts," "statues," "commandments," and "judgments" speak both of the demands Our Lord makes on us, and the certainty of His promises. For His promises are as binding and true as laws. They are the laws He has made for Himself toward us. So our Lord lays down the law for us to follow. But He also says that His promises are as binding, sure and dependable as any legal document. The blessing applies to those who rely on that Word, and whose faith is seen as they live in and through Our Lord's Word. Our prayer is that we base our confidence and living not on what we think is best, but on what our Lord does and gives in His Word.
