

The Coming Redeemer

If you seek deliverance from the things that can harm you; if you seek help and salvation; then you have come to the right place. Here, in this Holy Mass, the Redeemer comes to you to be your Rescue and your Savior. Receive Him as He comes to you, as He comes for you, in His Word of Forgiveness and in His Body and Blood.

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

Our Redeemer comes mightily to "cause His glorious voice to be heard" and to give you "gladness of heart" (*Introit*). He is "the Sun of Righteousness" who comes with healing in His wings (*Old Testament*). This is why we are told the signs of His coming so that "when these things begin to happen" we might "look up and lift our heads" (*Gospel*), because Our Lord will "stir up our hearts and to make ready the way of His only begotten Son" (*Collect*).

The Sermon

Dear Christian, listen to the Lord. See the fig tree. The leaves are already budding. The signs are clear. And that is what our Lord promised. When you see these things happening, know that the Kingdom of God is near. The Day of the Lord comes. It comes quickly, it comes unexpectedly, it comes soon, He comes soon. And so it is, that seeing the signs all around you, that you may have the comfort and hope that God promises through His Apostles and Prophets. For Jesus Christ has become a servant to the circumcision for the truth of God, to confirm the Promises made to the fathers, that you, O Redeemed of Christ, might glorify God for His mercy.

The Holy Eucharist

True redemption draws near as Christ our Redeemer comes to us in His Body and Blood. He laid down His life for us on the cross, that we might receive Him in His most Holy Sacrament. In Him, we do not fear, rather we pray that He would hasten His Coming.

The Mass: Elevation and Adoration (Part 2)

Although the Lutheran Church has always considered the practice of elevating the consecrated elements an optional thing, there is also the matter of the adiaphoristic controversy of the sixteenth century, in which the fathers declared, "when a plain and steadfast confession is required of us, we should not yield to the enemies in regard to such adiaphora" (FC, Epitome X:6). So although we would not wish to condemn those who do not elevate the elements, we also ought to regard the current state of affairs in the churches, where even in our own circles there have been found those who deny that the Sacrament is Christ Himself, and others who say that the Sacrament does not become the body of Christ until it is consumed — an odd interpretation of *is* if ever there was one! — and so also deny that the consecrated elements are truly Christ's body *before* they are consumed.

Hence it becomes even more appropriate and fitting to elevate the elements and adore them with the eyes, and so declare that we know them to be what Christ says they are; for surely we cannot think it wrong to adore Christ's Body, which is Christ Himself. To be sure, His purpose is not to present His Body here for adoration but for oral reception, but is it not fitting to emphasize in our ceremony the truth that it is His Body that we are about to receive? Do we not agree that His true Body is where He says that it is? These ceremonies, then, are no mere smoke and fire, but most appropriate settings for the Mystery that is Christ among us, and for us. "No one, unless he be an Arian heretic, can and will deny that Christ Himself, true God and man, who is truly and essentially present in the Supper, should be adored in spirit and in truth in the true use of the same, as also in all other places, especially where His congregation is assembled" (FC SD VII.126).

Prepare for Next Sunday

Gaudete—Third Sunday in Advent December 14, 2014

Isaiah 40.1-8; 1 Corinthians 4.1-5; St. Matthew 11.2-10

"Rejoice"

In Mansions Fair and Spacious Will God the Feast Prepare! The CHIEF HYMN, "The Bridegroom Soon Shall Call Us" (# 67), is part of a much larger work by Johann Walter (1496-1570), the first kantor of the Lutheran Church.

Walter's original hymn was published in 1552 in Wittenberg, and it was 34 stanzas. The most popular version was published in 1628 and includes stanzas 31, 8,9,16, 18, 17, and 13 of the original.

This hymn makes a gracious transition from the theme of the End Times of the previous church year to Advent and the beginning of a new year. The first stanza calls to mind the Gospel for the Last Sunday in the Church Year, the Parable of the Wise and Foolish Virgins, Matthew 25:1-13. The stanzas paint a glorious picture of Heaven as we watch for Christ's Second Coming, even as we prepare for the celebration of His Birth.



The music for Walter's hymn is by Michael Prätorius (1571-1621) from his collection Musae Sioniae. Prätorius served as a musician in Lüneberg and Wolfenbüttel, Germany. His incomplete, three-volume Syntagma Musicum is considered one of the most remarkable examples of musical scholarship in existence.

Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates The PROCESSIONAL HYMN (# 73-second tune) is based on Psalm 24. Written by Georg Weissel (1590-1635), pastor in Königsberg, Germany, it was published in 1642. From a young age, Weissel possessed poetic talent, and wrote 20 hymns, mostly based on the church year.

The tune is by Johann Freylinghausen (1670-1739) and first appeared with this text in the Neues Geistreiches Gesangbuch in 1704. He was pastor in Halle, and his musical work includes the composition of 22 hymn tunes.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 80. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

Verse 3 (repeated in v 7 & 19) is the key verse in Psalm 80. It is a prayer that the Lord restore us and look on us with His compassion and mercy. For only then are we saved. The rest of the Psalm is built on that prayer. It acknowledges that we are troubled, in need of help, and deserve God's anger (v 1-6). It questions why God has destroyed what He built (v 8-13) and it pleads with God to return. But in all that, the hope is the same—that the Lord will not treat us as we deserve but look on us with the kindly affection of a Father. For that is our only hope!



Thus saith the Lord in the Holy Gospel according to St. John, the fifth chapter: "These are they which testify of Me." The Scriptures of which Jesus speaks we call the "Old Testament." The

Holy Scriptures testify of Christ. He is the center of both Testaments of Scripture. Moses taught of Jesus. The Prophets of old prophesied of Jesus. He is the fulfillment of all prophecy. All the Scriptures – New and Old – testify of Him.

As the Church prepares for the Feast of the Nativity of our Lord, she does so penitentially. The Church fasts before she feasts. She prepares for celebration. Advent is to Christmas as Lent is to Easter. Advent is a time of heightened prayer, fasting, repentance and preparation.

Patience is a virtue, one the world lacks. True patience requires faith. The world places plastic santas on still green grass at Thanksgiving. It erects decorated trees in November. It starts shopping for gift exchanges in July. It puts well-lit Nativity scenes, complete with Christ Child and Wise Men, on coffee tables in early December.

But the Church is not like the world. The Church waits expectantly, hopefully, prayerfully, Her lamps filled with the oil of faith. She believes what Scripture says. She understands the *Adventus Domini*, the Coming of our Lord. She patiently, progressively lights the candles of Advent, as she awaits the coming of the true Light.

Our focus for Advent midweek Masses this year is on the Epistle or second reading appointed for each Wednesday, two of which are taken from the Old Testament. The sermons for the Advent midweek Masses will have the following themes:

Advent II: Wednesday, December 10

Malachi 3:1-5, 4:5-6 "WHO CAN ENDURE ...?"

Advent III: Wednesday, December 17

Isaiah 7:10-15 "ASK A SIGN FOR YOURSELF ..."

Advent IV: Wednesday, December 24

2 Peter 3:8-14 "...A THIEF IN THE NIGHT"

Join us **Wednesdays** at **9:30am & 7pm** as we remember the coming of our Lord in the Flesh, receive His gifts as He comes to us in His Grace, and prepare for His Coming in Glory.
