

The Bread of Life

Our Lord invites those who have followed Him into the Lenten wilderness to be fed by Him. May you seek the Lord while He is near! And may the heavenly Bread you receive today in Preaching and Sacrament be for your soul the highest good!

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

Where do you go when you are weighed down? To the Lord's house! That is where you are made glad (*Introit & Gradual*). That is where the Lord is found to be your refreshment and nourishment (*Old Testament*). That is where the children of promise are nurtured and cared for by their mother (*Epistle*). And that is where the bread of Life is given to you (*Gospel*). Here in the Lord's House is where your prayer is heard and answered – where the Lord Himself gives you the comfort of His Grace to mercifully relieve you (*Collect*).

The Holy Eucharist

In the Blessed Sacrament, we are given the Bread of Life. Christ is both our Food and Host. He himself feeds us miraculously with His own Body and gives us to drink of His own Blood. Then we are truly satiated and fully satisfied.

Music For Laetare

Jesus, Priceless Treasure The CHIEF HYMN (# 347) by Johann Franck (1618-1677), is a confession of faith in Christ throughout all situations of life. While studying at the University of Königsberg, Franck became acquainted with Lutheran hymn-writers Simon Dach (1605-1659) and Heinrich Held (d. 1659), who encouraged him in his poetic work. He wrote 110 hymns and is considered second only to the great Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676) as a superb hymn-writer of his era.



The tune, by Johann Crüger (1598-1662) was written for Franck's text. Crüger was one of the most distinguished church musicians of his time, and is the composer of 71 hymn tunes. He served as kantor of St. Nicholas Church in Berlin and was an instructor at the Greyfriars Gymnasium.

In Lent, Christians emphasize repentance and forgiveness that goes on continually in the Christian life. This hymn leads the Christian to sing about Jesus, our ever-present help in trouble (Psalm 46). Yet though sin and hell assail me, Jesus will not fail me.

The PRELUDE is a partita (multi-movement musical work with variations on a common theme) on "Jesus, Priceless Treasure" by Johann Gottfried Walther (1684-1748). Walther, a cousin of J.S. Bach (1685-1750), wrote over 130 chorale preludes for organ and is well known for his 1732 *Musicalisches Lexicon*, an exhaustive dictionary of music and musicians, the first in the German language.

An Explanation of the Common Service

The Lutheran Church may justly claim that, in the Common Service, she possess and uses "the completest embodiment of the Common Service of the Christian Church of all ages;" a Service "which may be tendered to all Christians who use a fixed Order, the Service of the future as it has been of the past."

What is the origin of the Introit?

Introit comes from the Latin *introitus*, meaning "beginning" or "entrance." It is so called, either because originally it was chanted as the Minister entered the Church, or because it is the beginning or entrance of the Service.

It takes its rise from the use of the Psalms with which the Service in the synagogue began, and in all probability the Service of the Apostolic church also. Read Psalm 100.

Of what does the Introit consist?

It consists of the Psalm-verse with its Antiphon and the Gloria Patri.

What is the meaning of the word Antiphon?

Antiphon means "voice answering voice," and refers to the responsive singing of verses, as was common in the ancient Church.

What is the purpose of the Antiphon?

The Antiphon announces, in a brief passage of Scripture, the leading thought of the Day, and brings the Psalm into proper relation with the Day's Service. For example, in the Introit for Christmass, the Antiphon announces the birth of Christ.

The thought of the Day is emphasized by the repetition of the Antiphon after the Gloria Patri.

Explain the use of the Psalm-verse in the Introit.

It is a single verse which has survived the ancient custom of singing an entire psalm at the beginning of the Service. In it the Church appropriates and celebrates, in psalmody, the Gospel fact which is proclaimed for that day in the Antiphon.

Why does the Introit include the Gloria Patri?

Because most of the Introits are from the Psalms, and the addition of the Gloria Patri fundamentally distinguishes the use of the Psalter in the New Testament Church from its use in the synagogue. The Messianic references in the Psalms Jesus declares to have been written concerning Himself (St. Luke 24.44); and in the confession of that truth, the Christian Church has always concluded the Psalms with this ascription of praise to the Holy Trinity.

Thus the Church perpetuates the confession of the co-eternal Godhead of our Lord and the Holy Ghost, with the Father, which was denied in the controversies of the fourth century.
