

The Resurrection of Our Lord
April 5, 2015



The Lord is Risen! Alleluia!

This is the Queen of Feasts, the Sunday of all Sundays, at which the Lord of Lords both presides and is Himself our food and drink! May the Resurrected Lord, in His Word and Supper, raise and uplift you to newness of life!

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

"Christ Jesus lay in death's strong bands, for our offenses given. But now at God's right hand He stands and brings us life from heaven. Therefore let us joyful be, and sing to God right thankfully, loud songs of alleluia. Alleluia!" (*Chief Hymn*). There is no more fitting summary for this day when Christ Jesus "overcame death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life" (*Collect*). Our prayer, then, is that we "keep this feast with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth" (*Epistle*).

The Holy Eucharist

Christ Jesus is our Paschal (Passover) Lamb who was sacrificed for us. But the Passover Lamb is not simply killed, it is also eaten as the sustaining food for the journey to the Promised Land. In the same way, Christ our Passover is also our meat and drink to nourish and sustain in this life to the life of the world to come. So Our Lord doesn't just live—He now also lives in you and through you and with you!

Isaiah 25.6-9; 1 Corinthians 5.7-8; St. Mark 16.1-8

Gloria in Excelsis

What is the Gloria in Excelsis?

It is one of the oldest morning hymns of the Christian Church—a hymn of adoration, celebrating God's glory as manifested in the merciful gift of His Son. It is so called from the first words of the Latin, meaning literally, "Glory in the Highest."

By whom and when were the opening words sung? By the Angels at the birth of Christ (St. Luke 2.14).

What does Luther say of this part of the Gloria?
"It did not grow; nor was it made on earth; it came down from heaven."

How may the contents of this hymn be outlined?

- I. Adoration of God the Father
- (a) In the words of the Angels,
- (b) In a rich outburst of praise and thanksgiving in the words of the Church.
- II. Adoration of God the Son,

By acknowledging Him as the Lord, the Only-begotten Son, the Christ, God, the Lamb of God.

- III. Petition to God the Son,
- (a) As the One Who procures mercy, by taking away the sin of the world;
- (b) As the One Who dispenses mercy, sitting at the right hand of God, the Father.
- IV. Praise to God the Son,

In a three-fold ascription of equal holiness, power, and glory with the Father and the Holy Ghost, as the reason for our prayer and praise.


An Explanation of the Common Service

The Lutheran Church may justly claim that, in the Common Service, she possess and uses "the completest embodiment of the Common Service of the Christian Church of all ages;" a Service "which may be tendered to all Christians who use a fixed Order, the Service of the future as it has been of the past."

Therefore let us joyful be And sing to God right thankfully Loud songs of Alleluia!

The CHIEF HYMN, "Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands" (# 195) is Martin Luther's (1483-1546) Easter hymn. One of the finest Easter hymns, it is based on an early German hymn, the SEQUENCE HYMN, "Christ is Arisen" (# 187).

The sequence hymn, "Christ is Arisen," is based on the ancient Sequence Victimae Paschali (Latin: "Paschal Victim"), sung following the Alleluia.



The vigorous tune, "Christ Lag in Todesbanden," is based on the tune from the German sequence hymn "Christ ist erstanden" and the plainsong tune for the Latin Sequence Victimae Paschali.

The PRELUDE is three settings of "Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands."

- ₹ Georg Böhm (1661-1733) served as kantor in Lüneberg and likely was a mentor to J.S. Bach.
- J.S. Bach (1685-1750) ranks among the greatest composers of all time and served as kantor in Leipzig.
- Heinrich Scheidemann (1595-1633) was a prolific early Baroque composer who wrote more organ compositions than any other composer of his time. He served as kantor in Hamburg.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 118. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

This is the Easter Psalm! The central theme is v 15-20. The strength of the Lord's arm (v 15-16) is shown when He pulls His Own from the jaws of death and hell. The "gate" through which the Righteous One enters (v 19-20) is the tomb itself. In other words, the grave is changed into a gateway in the life of the world to come. And this is the Lord's doing—part of His marvelous plan (v 23). This is the prayer, then, the Faithful pray with Christ their Lord.
