

### The Holy Spirit, the Comforter

God's Kingdom comes whenever He sends us His Holy Spirit. And the Spirit is never sent apart from Our Lord in the Gospel preaching and Gospel Sacraments. Draw near with the Faithful of God, then, to hear and receive the Spirit of the Church!

### The Theme of Today's Liturgy

Today we get to sing to the Lord the "new song" born from the marvelous things and the salvation Our Lord openly shows (*Introit*). This salvation is the Holy Spirit who is the "good and perfect gift from above" (*Epistle*). The Spirit's salvation is to guide us into all truth (*Gospel*). And by the Spirit we pray the Father that we may "love what you command and desire what you promise" (*Collect*).

### The Holy Eucharist

The Holy Spirit comforts you in the Holy Eucharist by opening your spiritual eyes to believe that the bread is Christ's Body and the wine is Christ's Blood given to be your forgiveness, your life and your salvation.


**The Prelude** Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice — Matthias Weckmann (1616-1674)

**The Postlude** Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice — Jan Bender (1909-1994)

**Proclaim the wonders God hath done!** It is fitting on Cantate (Latin: "sing") Sunday to sing Luther's (1483-1546) first congregational hymn, "Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice" (# 387). Having rediscovered the Gospel and the joy that comes through Christ's salvation, Luther wrote this hymn in 1523. It likely also had as its inspiration "Salvation Unto Us Has Come (# 377).

Stanza nine fits well with today's Gospel from St. John 16.5-15:

Now to My Father I depart, The Holy Spirit sending And heavenly wisdom to impart, My help to thee extending He shall in trouble comfort thee, Teach thee to know and follow Me, And in all truth shall guide thee.



The tune is said to have been transcribed by Luther after he heard it sung by a traveling artisan.

# An Explanation of the Common Service

The Lutheran Church may justly claim that, in the Common Service, she possess and uses "the completest embodiment of the Common Service of the Christian Church of all ages;" a Service "which may be tendered to all Christians who use a fixed Order, the Service of the future as it has been of the past."

Matthew 28.19.

### What is a Creed?

A statement of what one believes. The word is derived from the Latin *Credo*, I believe.

### Why have we a Creed in the Service?

Because it is necessary to state publicly our acceptance of the truths of God's Word. The most appropriate place for such a confession of faith is in the principal Service. Matthew 10.32, Matthew 16.15-18, Romans 10.9.

### Why is a Creed recited at this point in the Service?

In it the congregation owns its acceptance of the Word of God just read, and recalls and confesses in a brief summary the whole faith of the Gospel, a part of which is brought to its attention on that day.

### What is the Nicene Creed?

It is that confession of faith or summary of the Gospel teaching which was developed in the Church from the baptismal commission —

The first and second articles of the Nicene Creed were adopted in 325 by an assembly of 318 bishops, at Nicaea in Bithynia, Asia. The third article was adopted by the Council of Constantinople in 381. The second article was formulated for the express purpose of defining the true doctrine concerning the divinity of Christ, over against the teaching of Arius that Jesus was not the eternal Son of God, co-equal with the Father.

#### THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 98. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

The "old song" was one of despair sung on the way out of the Garden of Eden. The "new song" is based not on our creativity, but on the salvation and mercy of Our Lord toward the whole earth (v 1-3). Everything in creation joins in this song (v 4-8). It reaches its climax until the Lord comes (v 9). Yet the Lord's coming will not produce another song of fear, but will continue the song of joy. For the Lord's judgment means the end of death and the beginning of new life!

### **Today's Announcements**

CANTATE means "sing." This is the first word of Psalm 98 and the Introit appointed for this day. Psalm 98 is a joyous psalm that ascribes glory and praise to God for His great redemptive work—giving His only-begotten Son Jesus Christ to die for the sins of the world, and then to rise to new life on the first Easter morning. Christ is the Right Hand and Holy Arm of God, God in the flesh. Christ is the Righteousness revealed to the nations. Christ is our salvation, "the salvation of our God." By God's grace through faith in Jesus Christ, we, like all Christians of all time, are saved. Those who follow the propers carefully will note that the Gospel readings appointed for Jubilate (last week), Cantate (this week), and Rogate (next week) are all from the sixteenth chapter of St. John.
