Now We Wear Ashes



They are a sign of our mortality, a reminder of the dust from which we were made, and the dust to which we return. Now the altar is vested in violet, the color of repentance. Now we kneel and beat our breasts. Now, like the tax collector in the Temple, we confess that we are not worthy even to lift our eyes to heaven. Now we cry out *Kyrie Eleison! Christe Eleison! Kyrie Eleison!* The healing we need, the cleansing we require, and the heart that God justly demands are all beyond our means.

Soon, after a brief rose respite, we see the veils conceal the symbols of the Glory of God, as His Glory was veiled in torn Flesh, in darkness, in humility and in suffering. 

of the Formula of Concord. He also wrote a multi-volume exposition in answer to the 1545 Romish Council of Trent, the council that invented Roman Catholicism as it was known until the Second Vatican Council of the late 1960s. Chemnitz's *Examen* soundly refutes the doctrinal errors of the Pope's church. Chemnitz also wrote several other important doctrinal works, one on the Two Natures of Christ, one on the Lord's Supper, and his expansive *Loci*, a systematic approach to Christian doctrine based on "theological common places", or the clear passages of Scripture on which Christian doctrine is based.

The *Enchiridion* is a catechism for 16th century Lutheran Pastors. It is an excellent exposition of Christian doctrine. I am looking forward to leading our Thursday night Adult Catechesis group through its study of the book. All Zion adults, friends, and visitors are welcome at our Thursday night study. Three Thursdays a month we sing Vespers in the Church at 6:30 p.m., and study from 7:00 till 8:00 p.m. We usually all have dinner together after class at a trendy local Detroit joint. If you would like to join us, contact the church office, so that we can have enough copies of Chemnitz's *Enchiridion*.

May God bless you richly in Christ Jesus as you reverently, penitentially prepare for the joyous Feast of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ!

blessed is He who comes in the Name of the Lord!" This is the ancient chant, from Matthew 21:9, of the Words of the faithful as our Lord entered Jerusalem. After these Words are chanted, the palms are blessed on Palm Sunday, and the faithful process into the church, palms in hand, in commemoration of our Lord's "Triumphal Entry" on the Sunday of Holy Week. Many of our members take their palms home to adorn crucifixes or icons, or to weave them into crosses.

The ashes imposed on the faithful on Ash Wednesday are made from the palms from the previous year. When you are finished with your palms at home, bring them back to the church and give them to a Deacon or an usher. We will keep them until next year, burn them, and from them make the ashes for Ash Wednesday 2017 A.* D.

South America

I recently returned from a trip to Colombia. I was in the capital city of Bogotá. While we have been working for three years in a different city, Medillín, the Lord opened the door to a significant opportunity in Bogotá. I was the keynote presenter at a three day conference on the doctrine of the Church, which theologians call "Ecclesiology". The response was excellent, several congregations in Bogotá have begun a process to seek fellowship with the Missouri Synod. Our local Missionary, Fr. Carlos Mario Marín, has worked daily between my visits to develop relationships with other Confessional Lutheran Pastors and lay-leaders who seek fellowship with a true Lutheran body.

After Easter I may make another short trip back to Colombia to put the Pastors there in formal contact with the appropriate Synodical officals, who can make the process official. Before then, I have an invitation to present a theological paper at the seminary in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The seminary there is the best seminary in South America, and is led by a personal friend and colleague, the Rev. Dr. Sergio Fritzler. I hope to be in Argentina for a few days in April.

The church in Bolivia has invited me to return to Cochabamba in August and to present a week-long conference there. It is my hope to make the theme of the conference the same as that of my presentation in Argentina. This will be my third trip to Bolivia.

Spain is not in South America. There was never a Reformation in Spain. While the Reformation was taking place in Europe, in Spain the Lutherans were simply murdered. Spain became a bastion of Roman Catholicism, and has remained so until

Roman Catholicism, and has remained so until very recently. In a remarkable development, a classmate and friend of mine from my seminary days, Fr. David Warner, has been placed in Spain as a Missionary. We currently have several Mission sites in the country, one Spanish Pastor, and one additional LC-MS Missionary in the south of Spain, near Sevilla. The Synod asked me to provide Pastoral care to our Ordained men and their families in the Spanish Mission. I hope to make a quick trip there in May.

The Colombia, Argentina and Spain trips will all be during the week, so I'll be at Zion to preach and celebrate on Sunday. Fr. Frank Pies has graciously agreed to take my place for two Sundays while I'm in Bolivia. As I travel during the week, our Bishop Emeritus, Fr. David Stechholz, has agreed to provide emergent Pastoral care if necessary.

Please pray for our South American and Spanish Missions. Pray for Fr. Ted Krey, a Zion member, who is the Regional Director of Central and South American and Caribbean Missions (and also of Spain). And pray for the Luther Academy, an organization that provides theological education all over the world.

I thank God that Zion is uniquely positioned to bring Confessional Lutheran doctrine to Pastors and lay-leaders in other parts of the world. The saints in South America and Spain thank you.

Thursday Adult Catechesis By the time you

receive this issue of the Trumpet, our Thursday night Adult Catechesis group will have finished Koehler's Small Catechism. A catechism is a handbook that teaches the Christian faith by asking questions and providing answers from the Bible. Koehler's Catechism is based on Luther's Small Catechism, but instead of the "Synodical questions" (or Schwann's Questions, for those of us a bit longer in the tooth) Koehler provides doctrinal discussions that are better suited to an adult student than those of our Synodical catechism. Our Thursday class will have completed the entire book. That is no small feat. The class will have worked through all 331 catechetical questions and their sometimes lengthy answers, and importantly through the 703 verses of Holy Scripture on which the questions and answers are based.

Continuing to study and grow, our Thursday adult group has decided to study the *Enchiridion* of Martin Chemnitz. Chemnitz was a theologian of the Lutheran "Golden Age", and a principal author
