

Signs of the End

In this time of empty and false promises, Our Lord gives His sure and certain Word. You are welcomed and invited today to take Our Lord at His Word and to receive Him as He comes to you. May He calm, relax, and settle you!

The Theme of Today's Liturgy

The end is near! That should trouble you, if you truly know yourself and how you measure up-what you have done and what you have left undone (*Confiteor*). So we pray that Our Lord deal with us mercifully and not let us be ashamed (*Introit*). And then, holding to Our Lord's mercy, we may face our end with the confidence that death is nothing more than sleep in Jesus (*Epistle*), and the end of time nothing more than the coming true of our Lord's Word and promise (*Gospel*).

The Sermon

Holy Scripture presents a realistic anthropology. It shows man to be exactly what he is: "Who can bring a clean thing out of an unclean?" Sinful men bring forth sinful men. So it is that fallen men cannot rightly discern the times. We live in the end times. And the signs are all around us. The great tribulation is begun. But no man knows is how long it will continue. And in the midst of all this confusion the Lord reminds us "Surely I am coming quickly!" So consider your life. Consider your transgressions. But do not despair. For the elects' sake these days will be cut short, that you be saved. The coming of the Son of Man will be seen by all. But the Son of Man who comes is He who died for you. By His Blood He brings a clean thing out of an unclean thing, as you are born from above and set apart from the world. So you await His coming in faith, anticipating with joy the Last Day.

The Holy Eucharist

As we see change and decay all around, as we recognize that the Last Day continually draws nigh, the Holy Eucharist brings us great comfort and hope, as the same Lord who will sit as Judge of all men then gives His Body and Blood to us now for our forgiveness and our strength. Seeing the symbols of Bread and Wine faith rightly says "There is the Christ!", for that is where He has promised to be.

O heart, this image cherish: The Christ on Calvary, How patiently He suffered, And shed His blood for me!

The CHIEF HYMN, "Farewell I Gladly Bid Thee" (# 407) is a glorious explanation of the Christian's response to life in this world. Earthly life is fleeting, filled with disappointment, hardship, and fear. All roads lead to death. Nevertheless, Christians face life with confidence and find our joy in being a baptized child of God.

Death is an enemy; yet for the Christian death is defeated, and we look forward to death as our entry into eternal life. "He has been truly blessed who reaches heaven above; He has found perfect healing who rests upon Thy love."



The author was Valerius Herberger (1562-1627), pastor of St. Mary's Church in Fraustadt, Germany, and the first publication provided this note:

"A devout prayer with which the Evangelical citizens of Frawenstadt in the autumn of 1613 moved the heart of the Lord so that He mercifully laid down His sharp rod of weath under which nearly two thousand fell on sleep. And also a hymn of consolation in which a pious heart bids farewell to this world. Both composed by Valerius Herberger, preacher at Kripplein Christi."

Today, this hymn tune is most often associated with the Palm Sunday hymn: "All Glory, Laud, and Honor." However, it was written for this hymn, as is evident by the tune name, which is the German title of the text: *Valet will ich dir geben*. The tune is by Herberger's kantor, Melchior Teschner.

THE PSALM FOR THIS WEEK IS PSALM 31. PRAY IT EVERY DAY!

Psalm 31 may be prayed in three parts (v 1-8, 9-18,19-24). Throughout it is a Psalm of trust and confidence in the Lord. That trust is oftentimes tested (v 10-13). Yet the prayer is that we are not ashamed in our trust--that our hope is not empty or in vain. And we are not! For the Lord's mercy is such that He does not help us only when we help ourselves, but He preserves His faithful when and how He pleases (v 23). So we take heart, and our trust grows, even when we are troubled!
